
Rubel gets over difficult times

"Yes, I was under a bit of a mental stress. But at this point of time I have nothing of that in my mind. I am not thinking about those issues right now. My main target is cricket and I want to play for my country. I am going to the World Cup and this in itself is a very big deal for me.

"All I am thinking of right now is how I can do well for my country," Rubel told reporters at Mirpur yesterday.

"For a few days, I went through a tough phase in my life. But I can't be stuck, I want to move on. We have a very important mission ahead of us and we need to focus on that. We need to see how we can be successful," he added.

The right-hand paceman reckoned that the conditions in Australia and New Zealand, which are different when compared to the home grounds, would help him as a bowler. He hoped to be able to use the extra bounce to his advantage.

"We are not used to playing on bouncy wickets so we need to keep our line and length right. We have to make the most of the time that we are getting over there during preparation, in order to adjust. I like to bowl bouncers, so hopefully I can do well.

"We are also working on our death-bowling and that will be an important aspect. We are working on how we can check the run-flow towards the end," said Rubel.

Rubel, who was charged under the Women and Children Repression Prevention Act, is currently on bail.

Thailand and Malaysia, two of the six participating teams, yesterday confirmed that they will send Olympic (U-23) teams for the Bangabandhu Gold Cup international foot-

ball tournament as part of their preparation for the 2016 Olympic Qualifiers.

This means the third edition of the Bangabandhu Gold Cup has all but turned into a competition of U-23s as Bahrain and Singapore had earlier confirmed to send their Olympic teams for the tournament, scheduled from January 29 to February 8 in Dhaka and Sylhet.

However, hosts Bangladesh and Sri Lanka, the two lowest FIFA ranking sides of the tournament, will field senior sides in the national team at the Bangladesh Krira Shikkha invitational tournament, which will be Protisthan in Savar yesterday. Pakistan all-rounder Shahid Afridi said during an interview that he will try to wrest back the record of scoring the fastest ODI century when Pakistan tours New Zealand and during the World Cup, NDTV reported.

happy to see someone of de Villiers class hold the record for the fastest fifty and century in ODIs.

"He played like a champion to get the record and it was his special day," he said. South African de Villiers

broke the record against the West Indies on Sunday scoring a century from just 31 balls.

Afridi held the record for the fastest one-day hundred for nearly 17 years after blasting 102 off 37 balls against Sri Lanka in Nairobi.

Make or break Sledging no worse now against Oman

Bangladesh face a do-or-die battle against familiar foes Oman today in the third quarterfinal of the Hockey World League (Round-2) in Singapore. A win against the gulf nation will keep Bangladesh's hopes of making it trough to the third

round alive while a defeat will effectively end their campaign, making remaining place-deciding matches as mere academic activity.

Assistant manager of the Bangladesh team, Rafiqul Islam Kamal, informed that the team went through a practice session as well as video analysis session of their previous matches yesterday.

Bangladesh reached the quarterfinal stage by winning a single match against Mexico while losing against Japan and Poland. In their 0-5 defeat against Poland on Monday, Bangladesh conceded four goals from penalty corners and failed to capitalise on either of the five penalty corners they availed.

"We have conceded most of the goals from the mistakes by defenders and goalkeeper while we could not avail our chances as the opposition goalkeeper made quite a few brilliant saves," said Kamal while speaking to The Daily Star over phone, adding that they will try variations in the penalty corners in the match against Oman.

According to the latest world hockey rankings prepared on December 15 but officially released only yesterday, Bangladesh (29) lie six places behind the Oman (23), reflecting the upper hand the gulf nation have enjoyed over Bangladesh in recent years. Bangladesh lost against Oman in two major tournaments -- by 2-3 goals in the Asian Games in September, 2014 and by 2-4 goals in the Asia Cup in August, 2013 -- both in neutral venues while beating the gulf nation by 6-1 goals at home during the Asian Games Qualifiers in March last year.

Kamal admitted that Oman are an opposition worthy of respect, but feels that if Bangladesh can play to their full potential, a win is quite attainable. The midfielders and forwards are in good form and that gives the Bangladesh think-tank hope, according to Kamal.
