## MU's 4-4-2 gets van Gaal twitchy

Manchester United manager Louis van Gaal feels a "twitch" in his backside when his team adopt a 4-4-2 formation, he told British newspapers in comments published on Friday.

United's supporters revolted over Van Gaal's preferred 3-5-2 system during their 2-0 Premier League win at Queens Park Rangers last weekend, chanting "4-4-2!" at half-time.

But Van Gaal, who led his native Holland to last year's World Cup semi-finals with a three-man defence, says watching United play in a 4-4-2 formation makes him uncomfortable.

"We have won more with 4-4-2 in a diamond (midfield), but when you analyse the game then we have twitched our asses on the bench," the United manager said.

"I have twitched my ass because we were out of balance. I told my players I was squeezing my ass, but (they said) it was the wrong expression."

## Real agree Silva deal

Cruzeiro have agreed to sell defensive midfielder Lucas Silva to Real Madrid, the Brazilian champions said on Thursday.

Spanish media reported the fee would be around 15 million euros (\$17.4 million).

Silva, 21, is considered to be one of Brazil's most promising young players and has represented his country at junior level.

## UAE players sport black armbands

UAE players wore black armbands and striker Ali Mabkhout refused to celebrate his opening goal as the death of Saudi King Abdullah was marked at the Asian Cup on Friday.

Mabkhout walked away with his arms down after scoring the opener against Japan in their quarterfinal in Sydney, in a mark of respect for the Saudi king.

The Asian Football Confederation (AFC) lowered its flag at its Kuala Lumpur headquarters to half-mast and expressed "deep sadness" at the king's death.

AFC president Shaikh Salman bin Ebrahim Al Khalifa said it was "a big loss for the people of Saudi Arabia, and will be sorely felt by the entire Asian continent".

## A night of upsets

The United Arab Emirates shocked holders Japan and Iraq sent their arch-rivals Iran crashing out as a stunning night of upsets turned the Asian Cup on its head on Friday.

A double-header of quarter-finals ended in two penalty shoot-outs in Canberra and Sydney, with UAE and Iraq surviving moments of intense drama to come out on top.

Their stars shone with UAE wizard Omar Abdulrahman and Iraq's Younis Mahmoud, hero of their 2007 title run, both slotting outrageous "panenka" penalties in the shoot-outs.

But Japan's leading lights Keisuke Honda and Shinji Kagawa had a night to forget, and 10-man Iran were left cursing Australian referee Ben Williams.

## Nadal, Sharapova survive

A stunned Roger Federer was dumped from the Australian Open Friday in his worst showing since 2001 as Rafael Nadal and Maria Sharapova bounced back to stay in the title hunt.

In the tournament's biggest upset, the Swiss world number two had no answer to Italian Andreas Seppi, crashing out in the third round 6-4, 7-6 (7/5), 4-6, 7-6 (7/5).

The defeat was the 17-time Grand Slam winner's earliest exit in Melbourne in 14 years and aside from his second round Wimbledon flop in 2013, was the Swiss legend's worst performance at a major in more than a decade.

In contrast, Nadal was back to his best against Israel's Dudi Sela, comfortably winning 6-1, 6-0, 7-5 after being pushed to the brink in a five-set

epic in the second round when he suffered dizzy spells and cramps.

"The other night was one of the toughest times I have spent on the court and my body wasn't very well and I felt very lucky to get through," he said.

"In general I think I was playing better than I did the other day. I was feeling better tonight."

Sharapova was also on fire, blitzing past Zarina Diyas of Kazakhstan 6-1, 6-1 to erase memories of her big scare in the second round when she had to save two match points.

"I started really focused, I knew I had a tough, long match previously, so I wanted to start off strong and finish strong," said the Russian second seed.

Murray was also in form, easily beating Portugal's Joao Sousa 6-1, 6-1, 7-5 and is yet to be seriously tested at Melbourne Park.

He will next meet Bulgarian 10th

seed Grigor Dimitrov, who struggled against 2006 Open runner-up Marcos Baghdatis with the fired-up Cypriot pushing him to five gruelling sets.

Murray has now reached the round of 16 for the seventh consecutive year as he bids to track down an elusive Australian title after losing to Federer in the 2010 final and Novak Djokovic in 2011 and 2013.

"Grigor has improved a lot over the last couple of years and it should be a fun match," said the Scot.

Dimitrov, Sharapova's boyfriend, looked headed for defeat when Baghdatis won the third set before rallying to claim an exhausting 4-6, 6-3, 3-6, 6-3, 6-3 victory.

Rising star Bouchard also progressed, but made heavy work of downing France's Caroline Garcia, taking 56 minutes to get through the first set before moving up a gear to win 7-5, 6-0.

## Shooters leave for Kuwait

Former Brazil coach Luiz Felipe Scolari had his credit cards and chequebook stolen Thursday when thieves broke into his car while he was in a shop, G1 web portal reported.

Scolari, 66, who stepped down after Brazil's humiliating World Cup semifinal loss to Germany last year, returned to his vehicle to find a window smashed and his documents gone at Novo Hamburgo, near the southern city of Porto Alegre, G1 quoted police as saying.

He led them to seventh place in the league, missing out on a Copa Libertadores berth.

## Magical match-point ousts Federer

Andreas Seppi's stunning upset of Roger Federer at the Australian Open on Friday was a three-hour affair but the shot that ended the Swiss's 11-year run to the semifinals at Melbourne Park will be replayed for years to come. Serving at 6-5 on his first match point of a nerve-jangling fourth set tiebreaker, the 46th-ranked Italian had to scramble hard across court as Federer rushed to the net with a forehand approach shot that burned down the line.

Seppi stuck his racquet out in pure desperation and as he hurtled over the tram-lines with inertia, the lofted shot sailed down the line past Federer, who moved across but did not take a swing at the ball.

Whether it was a leave or had Federer beaten cold, the Swiss master himself was unsure, but the ball ultimately dropped on the baseline and 15,000 spectators inside a packed Rod Laver Arena roared as 30-year-old Seppi sealed the match 6-4, 7-6(5), 4-6, 7-6(5) and toasted the finest win of his three-title career.

"I guess maybe if he hits it normally, maybe yes," Federer said when asked if he had a shot at the volley.

"But the way he hits it you think, 'this can't possibly land in'. You kind of go and you're there and you're like, 'No, I'm going to let it go'. As you're telling yourself that,

you look behind you and you already know it's done.

"Because he was also running into the sun, so I have to cover cross-court just in case. That's where everybody goes. I don't know. Ask him how he felt hitting it. It's clearly a big blow because I actually hit my forehand pretty good."

For Seppi, it was a "strange shot".

"At the beginning I thought I couldn't even reach the ball. Then, yeah, when I hit it, I didn't see it going there. I just saw when it bounced in. Was, yeah, for sure one of the important shots of my life."

Seppi ended his perfect 10-match losing record to Federer and an improbable 23-match losing streak to top-10 opposition.

The 17-times grand slam champion was never at his best against Seppi but was magnanimous in defeat.

"I can't remember well. But I think he said, 'unbelievable last point. Congratulations'. Something like that," said Seppi.

He will bid for his first quarterfinal at a major against young Australian Nick Kyrgios, who beat Malek Jaziri in straight sets 6-3, 7-6(6), 6-1.

"Against Roger, you know, I never went close," Seppi added.

"I never had the chance. To have this win in my career, it's for sure something big, yeah."

## Ribery not happy

France's Franck Ribery says only Cristiano Ronaldo and Lionel Messi seem capable of winning the Ballon d'Or and has voiced his frustration after Bayern Munich teammate Manuel Neuer missed out.

Portugal's superstar Ronaldo won the prestigious award for the second year running earlier this month in Zurich with Messi second and goalkeeper Neuer third.

Much to his frustrations, Ribery missed out on scooping the 2013 title, also finishing third behind the superstar pair despite strong displays in helping Bayern win that year's Champions League title.

"I was really angry, but it is the same every year: you don't know what you have to do in order to win the vote," Ribery told Munich daily AZ.

The Frenchman questions whether it is even worth a Bayern Munich player even bothering to attend the gala award ceremony in the future.

Between them, Ronaldo and Messi have won the award for the last seven years and Ribery questioned what more Neuer could have done to dethrone them after winning the World Cup with Germany.

"It clearly appears that winning the World Cup isn't enough," Ribery fumed.

"For the last two or three years, Neuer has been the world's best goalkeeper and had won titles with the club.

"In Brazil, he was the best goalkeeper and is a world champion, but that's clearly not enough. I don't understand it!

"If a Bayern player is again nominated, we should consider whether it is worth travelling to the award ceremony.

"For what? Perhaps to have a photo taken? No!
