## Curtains rise on Sufi Fest today

The first edition of the Sufi Fest Dhaka 2015 will see its curtains rise today, at the Army Museum grounds in the capital's Bijoy Sarani. Cultural Affairs Minister Asaduzzaman Noor will inaugurate the three-day festival that brings together 15 artistes and musical groups from eight countries.

Bangladeshi artistes will open the festival on each day, with Arnob and his group setting the festival in motion. Their music draws melodic and lyrical inspiration from a wide range of sources, from Rabindranath's poetry to the simplicity of folk or the mysticism of bauls.

Tunisian group Mechket, who promote Tunisian Sufi music and offer an opportunity to the public to enjoy Sufi in a modern

perspective, will perform next. Their music is a combination of Turkish, Indian and Tunisian music. The compositions are distinguished by offbeat tracks

keeping with the traditional music genre and marked in particular by a freshness and desire for renewal and innovation.

Sidi Goma, a group of artistes

from Gujarat, India of African ancestry will then take the stage. Sidi Goma mingles native African music styles, rhythmic and melodic structures with local cultural influences to create a unique sound.

The evening's final performer will be Javed Ali, the Indian playback singer who has made a name for himself for his soulful voice and the type of songs he performs. Son of popular qawwali singer Ustad Hamid Hussain, Ali is adept in Hindi, Bangla, Kannada, Tamil and Telegu. He has worked extensively with AR Rahman, most notably in songs like "Kun Faya Kun ("Rockstar") and "Guzarish" ("Ghajini").

The event begins at 6pm but gates will open at 5pm, with seating based on first-comefirst-serve.

#### The picturisation of the national anthem sung by Bachchan for his forthcoming film "Shamitabh" was done at Jorasanko Thakurbari in north Kolkata. Though the R Balki-directed film is slated to be released on February 6, the decision to include the national anthem in the movie was taken only a couple of days ago. "We went to music director Adesh Srivastava's studio in Mumbai who felt it (the anthem) does not require any music," Bachchan told reporters at

the press launch of the film in Kolkata. Balki wanted to shoot it at Shantiniketan but it

has been done at Jorasanko because of lack of time.

As "Rabindranath Tagore wrote the song, we decided that why don't we shoot it where Gurudev was born. Shoojit Sircar has shot the song at Jorasanko," he said.



Bachchan said he was proud to have sung the national anthem.

Describing Tagore's ancestral home as an "amazing monument", Bachchan said "It's for the first time I have been there and such an iconic place and I doubt perhaps anybody has ever sung the national anthem there. I feel so proud."

In "Shamitabh", his third film with Balki after "Cheeni Kum" (2007) and "Paa" (2009), Bachchan is essaying the role of a frustrated, drunkard person with a baritone voice while South superstar Dhanush is a small town man. Akshara Haasan daughter of the inimitable Kamal Haasan -- dons the hat of a journalist who brings the two together and turns Dhanush into a superstar with Bachchan his dubbing artiste.

"It's the tale of two persons with different talents. What one has, the other one does not have it and both fill that void. And when it reaches the height, then ego comes into play because both started thinking that the popularity gained was because of the other one," Big B said.

Asked if he would ever render his voice to poems of Rabindranath Tagore as he has sung Tagore's songs, the megastar said "My Bengali is not that good. I think it should be recited by somebody who knows the language. But if somebody wants to do it in Hindi or English I will be glad to do so."



Saraswati, the goddess of knowledge, music and arts in Hindu religion, is worshipped every year in the Bangla month of Magh (early February). For obvious reasons, Saraswati Puja holds special significance to students; and Jagannath Hall ground hosts its biggest celebration in the country.

"'Hajar Tarer Bina' is based on Kazi Nazrul Islam's fight and struggle during his imprisonment," said its director Farzana Chowdhury. It reflects how the rebel poet's muse kept his fighting spirit alive and glowing in the darkness of prison.

"Mahua", the other piece, is the directorial vision of Maksudul Alam Milton. The storyline features Mahua, a girl kidnapped and raised by the 'bedey' (snake-charmers) community. The story is taken from a popular folklore that has the zest of love and romance.
