Verdict in Zubair killing case Feb 4 COURT CORRESPONDENT

A Dhaka court will deliver its verdict in Jahangirnagar University student Zubair Ahmed murder case on February 4.

On completion of the arguments from the prosecution and defence, Judge ABM Nizamul Haque of the Speedy Trial Tribunal-4 of Dhaka yesterday fixed the date for the delivery of the judgment.

The court also cancelled the bail of seven out of the 13 accused and sent them to jail while the rest were shown fugitives as they escaped from the court dock in February 2014.

Since then police have been trying their best to nab them but failed to arrest any of the fugitives.

Earlier, the court recorded statements of 27 prosecution witnesses, including complainant of the case.

Zubair Ahmed, an honours final year student of English, was tortured and stabbed allegedly by some activists of Bangladesh Chhatra League on January 8, 2012. He succumbed to his injuries in a Dhaka hospital the following day.

Hamidur Rahman, former deputy registrar of JU, filed the murder case with Ashulia Police Station the same day.

People's voice against blockade atrocities getting louder

With the blockade death toll mounting by the day and with no end in sight, the general people are increasingly converging at the capital's Jatiya Press Club to protest the atrocities on innocent civilians, which they say is a result of the two major political parties scrambling for power.

At least four organisations arranged protest programmes there yesterday, in which they held accountable the Awami League and the BNP for the civilian casualties and demanded an immediate stop to violence and a permanent solution

to the ongoing political deadlock. Alluding to the BNP-led alliance's blockade, which is marked by arson attacks and street rampage, Nagorik Oikya Convener Mahmudur Rahman Manna told a human chain that democracy could not be protected by perpetuating terror or throwing bombs.

He also slammed Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina for her comments that there would be no vote under an unelected administration. "You and your government are unelected, too," he said, observing that the ruling party retained power through a fraudulent election.

Manna called for a national dialogue to settle the debate, once and for all, on how to hold the national election in a free and fair manner every five years.

People raised their voices elsewhere too.

In Rangpur city, several thousand students of 24 schools and people of all walks of life formed a 5km human chain from Rangpur Zilla School to Begum Rokeya University.

Demanding withdrawal of the indefinite blockade, which started January 6, the speakers said if the political parties really wanted the welfare of students, they would

accept the call.

Some 18 lakh students are supposed to sit for the Secondary School Certificate (SSC) and equivalent exams beginning on February 2, said Syed Mamunur Rahman, a physician at Rangpur Medical College Hospital and member secretary of Jago Rangpur, the organiser.

Its convener Mosaddek Hossain Bablu, a freedom fighter, was present.

At its human chain in front of the Jatiya Press Club, left student body Samajtantrik Chhatra Front urged the people to reject both parties for development and safety of the

is contradictory, speakers said. Bangladeshis are generally pious but never fanatics. However, through the 5th and 8th amendments, Islam was made state religion while antiliberation forces were rehabilitated during 1975 and 1990, said Sultana

"As a result, the state held the character of a communal and reactionary one. It had a profound impact on politics and on social, economic and cultural spheres," she said.

Gonoshasthaya Hospital opens 6-bed burn unit

Offers free treatment to blockade arson victims

Coming to the aid of the increasing number arson attack victims, Gonoshasthaya Nagar Hospital yesterday opened a six-bed burn unit on its Dhanmondi premises in the capital, declaring to provide treatment and medicine free of cost.

Initially four doctors will provide round-the-clock, basic lifesaving treatment. Upgraded facilities including intensive care and high dependency units and more beds will be gradually introduced, the hospital authority told a press briefing on the pre-

"What we will do is ensure necessary and emergency treatment, essential for a burnt patient at the initial stage," said Prof Mohammed Shawkat Ali, head of the forensic medicine department.

He said the hospital was thinking of opening burn units at its branches in Savar

of Dhaka and Tongi and Sreepur of Gazipur. Despite being a private hospital run by trustees, the Gonoshasthaya hospital

welcomes donations from philanthropists and different tiers of society, said Prof AKM Rezaul Islam of the surgery department.

The launching comes at a time when people irrespective of age and identity are being targeted nearly every day centring the ongoing blockade of the BNP-led 20-party alliance.

Over 500 patients, including 50 arson victims, are now admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital's 300-bed burn unit, a situation doctors there say they deal with often. Apart from the medical equipment,

this correspondent found mosquito nets on the beds of the Gonoshasthaya hospital's burn unit on the third floor. "A burn patient without dressing and

lying inside mosquito net is less vulnerable to infections," explained Dr Zafrullah Chowdhury, the hospital's founder and trustee.

He suggested avoiding dressings for
