hen the news of the PM visiting the Chairperson of BNP came to us we were filled with relief. We were relieved and

impressed that our PM had risen above her personal and political animosity towards her archrival and reached out to a mother who had lost her son. Many will say it was a political strategy but few can deny that it was this unexpected gesture that revealed compassion and humanity that are prerequisites of any leader.
