Hartal coincides with SSC exams

Fate of 14 lakh students uncertain as 20-party calls fresh 72-hr shutdown from tomorrow

The BNP-led alliance has not just spurned the pleas of guardians and the education minister to withdraw the blockade for SSC examinations, it has made things worse by calling a countrywide 72-hour hartal from tomorrow.

The fresh spell of shutdown announced yesterday in protest at "threats from Awami League leaders to arrest Khaleda Zia" is likely to upset the schedule of Secondary School Certificate exams beginning on Monday, affecting 14.79 lakh examinees.

The alliance in a press release, signed by BNP Joint Secretary General Rizvi Ahmed, said the hartal to be enforced from 6:00am tomorrow is also meant to protest "attacks on the houses and offices of senior BNP leaders and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's recent statements asking police to do whatever needed to stop the violence".

There was no official announcement yet from the education ministry on the fate of the SSC exams, but sources said the tests

Amnesty International has condemned Bangladesh government's move to use "excessive police force" for tackling the violence from the ongoing blockade enforced by the BNP-led 20-party alliance.

In a report published on its website on Thursday, the rights watchdog also called upon the BNP to "exhort their members and supporters to stop the politicallymotivated criminal acts".

Arson, bomb attacks on buses; driver killed

4 suffer burns as blockade passes 25th day

· In another spate of attacks on buses, a bus driver was killed in Laxmipur and four peo-: ple suffered burns at Khilgaon in the capital yesterday on the 25th day of the non-stop blockade.

The driver, Mohammad Sumon, 36, was critically injured after the Chittagong- bound bus of Ashik Paribahan lost control · and fell into a roadside ditch near Somashpur of Laxmipur's Chandraganj SEE PAGE 2 COL 4: upazila around 9:45pm, said police.

The accident took place after alleged blockade supporters hurled a crude bomb at the bus, blurring the road with thick palls of smoke, Humayun Kabir, officer-in-charge of Chandraganj Police Station, told The Daily Star, quoting victims.

Sumon was taken to Laxmipur Sadar Hospital with severe head injury. He was transferred to Noakhali Medical College and Hospital as his condition worsened. He died there, said the OC.

CAPSIZE OF MALAYSIA-BOUND BOAT

7 bodies found, about 25 still missing

At least two dozen overseas jobseekers are still missing as the fishing trawler that had sunk off Kutubdia coast in the Bay of Bengal on Thursday morning was salvaged yesterday with seven bodies trapped in the vessel's hull.

None of the recovered bodies could be identified and those still missing are feared dead, according to coast guard sources.

So far 43 passengers have been rescued in the operation which is still on, said Tarek Mostafa, in-charge of Bangladesh Coast Guard's Kutubdia camp. Of them, six were identified as traffickers by other passengers. The six SEE PAGE 11 COL 5

Bomb attack kills 60 at Pak Shia mosque

Militant group claims responsibility

A powerful bomb tore through a busy Shia mosque in southern Pakistan yesterday, killing more than 60 people in the country's deadliest sectarian attack in nearly two years.

The blast hit the mosque in Shikarpur in Sindh province, around 470 kilometres north of Karachi, as hundreds of worshippers attended Friday prayers.

A spokesman for the shadowy Jandullah militant

group, a splinter faction of the Pakistani Taliban, said they were behind the blast.

"We claim responsibility for attack on Shias in Shikarpur very happily," Ahmed Marwat told AFP.

Pakistan has suffered a rising tide of sectarian violence in recent years, most of it perpetrated by hardline Sunni Muslim groups against minority Shia Muslims, who make up around one in five of the population.

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No gas, power if blockade continues

Shajahan threatens to cut utility lines, food supply to Khaleda's office

If BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia does not call off the nationwide blockade, power and gas connections to her office would be severed and food supply would be halted, threatened Shipping Minister Shajahan Khan yesterday.

"If you do not withdraw the blockade and hartal by February 2, you will be confined in such a way ...," he said.

He asked Khaleda to call off the hartals and blockades for the sake of over 14 lakh SSC examinees whose tests start on Monday.

"Workers and owners will gather in front of your office with burnt vehicles. You will be

surrounded. Even the food provided to you by your party leaders will not reach your room. You will have to die there

without food ...," he said. Khaleda is "confined" to her Gulshan office since January 3. At least 35 people were killed, nearly 350 people got burnt in arson attacks and thousands more got injured since

she called the indefinite blockade from January 6. Yesterday Shajahan was speaking at a rally organised by newly floated Bangladesh Sramik-Karmachari-Peshajibi-Muktijoddha Samannay Parishad at

Suhrawardy Udyan. At the rally, Shajahan, also convener of the parishad

and executive president of Bangladesh Sarak Paribahan Sramik Federation, announced a series of programmes to resist the ongoing violence in the name of blockades and hartals.

The parishad would hold demonstration rallies at the Shaheed Minars of every district on February 3. Officials, employees and workers of all offices, business institutions, industries are to stand on streets for 15 minutes from SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

No control over roadside sales of petrol STAR REPORT

Unauthorised sale of petrol and octane continues, mostly in roadside shops, making it easier for arsonists to collect the highly inflammable liquids to make firebombs.

This is despite an alarming spree of arson attacks across the country in recent weeks. Torching of vehicles has claimed dozens of lives and left scores burnt since the BNP-led alliance began an indefinite blockade on January 6.

Against this backdrop, the government has moved to check so-far unfettered sales of petroleum and clamped restrictions on selling fuel oil

in the country. Police yesterday instructed pump owners not to sell petrol, octane and diesel in SEE PAGE 2 COL 2
