Exercise caution

Rights boss to law enforcers tackling blockade violence

National Human Rights Commission Chairman Mizanur Rahman yesterday said the law enforcers should be careful while using force to tackle the ongoing blockade violence, and they should make sure that human rights are not violated.

"We think sometimes force should be used to protect people's rights and ensure their security. At the same time, the National Human Rights Commission is urging the law enforcers to exercise caution You have to apply force within the ambit of the law," he told the "Rally for Peace" at the Central Shaheed Minar.

His comments came days after President Abdul Hamid and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina had ordered the law enforcement agencies to take stern action to stop the countrywide violence. On Thursday, Amnesty International condemned the government move to use "excessive police force" for containing the violence.

Referring to the statements by the Amnesty, Human Rights Watch, and Asian Human Rights Watch on using "excessive force" by law enforcers, Mizan said, "Please tell us about the ways that should be followed [by the law enforcers] to stop the brutality and the war waged against the common people."

The blockade and hartals, he added, have put the lives of around 15 lakh examinees of SSC and equivalent exams into uncertainty. "Please call off the programmes if you are doing politics for the people's welfare. Don't push the future generation into darkness." Organised by the NHRC, a proces-

sion paraded the city streets from in front of the National Museum at Shahbagh to the Central Shaheed Minar, with the slogan -- "No to Violence and Terrorism".

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Khaleda without power for 19 hrs

Later around 10:20pm, Desco employees restored the power connection within five minutes keeping nearby street lights switched off.

After snapping and restoring power, the staff left the scene in the shortest possible time. But two of their men, however, could not dodge the media as they lagged behind their team-mates to get on their pick-up van.

Moksed Ali, a lineman who was involved in disconnecting the electricity supply, told the media that they have conducted the drive following directives from Gulshan police.

Another staff, who was involved in the restoration, just said: "On instructions of higher authorities, we have restored the line." He denied disclosing his name and designation.

However, cable, internet and phone lines to the office remained disconnected as of 3:00am today.

The BNP chief earlier had been kept confined to the office for more than two weeks till January 18 in the name

of "stepping up her security". The move to disconnect electricity

and other connections came hours after the BNP on Friday evening called a 72-hour hartal from this morning on top of the ongoing blockade that enters its 27th day today.

BNP's Joint Secretary General Rizvi Ahmed, who announced the hartal through a press release, was detained by the Rab almost at the same time of cutting the connections.

A number of ruling Awami League leaders, who earlier in the day said disconnecting the lines was aimed at forcing Khaleda to leave the office, couldn't say anything about last night's development.

Shipping Minister Shajahan Khan, however, claimed that labourers and employees affected by the blockade cut off the lines. "The government did not snap the lines," he told journalists at Madaripur.

The minister at a rally in the capital on Friday afternoon threatened to snap the utility connections to Khaleda's office if she did not call off the anti-government agitations by February 2.

Yesterday evening, Khaleda came up with her reaction through her press secretary Maruf Kamal Khan Sohel, who briefed newsmen at the Gulshan

"This is the government's worst kind of cruelty. I have no words to express my reaction. I am stunned," Maruf quoted her as saying.

Khaleda also said, "A civilized government cannot do this... it is beyond the imagination in a civilized society.

"Cutting off power, cable and internet lines without any notice is violation of my civil and human

struggling to control hundreds of onlookers crowding the spot. A wall of the factory collapsed as over enthusiastic bystanders tried to enter the building after the fire was put out.

During a spot visit, at least five mangled and exploded gas cylinders were seen. There were cracks on several walls of the building.

DMC morgue sources said most of the deceased had been burnt beyond recognition.

A three member probe committee was formed by the fire service. The committee is to submit its report in three days.

UN chief backs regional force to fight Boko Haram

Clashes kill 3 Chad soldiers, 123 Boko Haram militants in Cameroon

UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon yesterday welcomed an African Union proposal to set up a regional five-nation force of 7,500 troops to fight Nigeria's Boko Haram Islamist militants.

Support for the initiative, announced at an African Union summit being held in Ethiopia's capital Addis Ababa, came hours after the Chadian military said three soldiers and 123 militants were killed in two days of fighting with a Chadian army contingent in northern Cameroon.

"I welcome the decision of the AU and regional countries to establish an MJTF (Multinational Joint Task Force) against Boko Haram," he told reporters on the sidelines of the summit.

"They have committed unspeakable brutality. Those terrorists should be addressed with a regional and international cooperation. Not a single country, even the regional countries, can handle this alone," he said. "The United Nations is ready to fully cooperate with the African Union."

Ban nevertheless said that "military means may not be the only solution."

"There should be very careful analysis of the root causes why this kind of terrorism, and extremism, violent extremism, are spreading," he told reporters.

At least 13,000 people have been killed and more than a million forced from their homes by Boko Haram violence since 2009. The group also carried out the mass abduction of 276 girls from the town of Chibok in April last year.
