Firing by ex-BCL leader kills bystander

Wounds 7 over control of auto-rickshaw stand STAFF CORRESPONDENT, Sylhet

A 17-year-old bystander was shot dead while a pedestrian and six transport workers suffered bullet wounds after, as police and locals allege, a former Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) man and his accomplices tried to gain control over an auto-rickshaw stand at Dakshin Bazar in Sylhet's Beanibazar upazila on Friday night.

A butcher's employee, deceased Niju Ahmed resided in the upazila's Koshba village.

Abul Kalam, Shuaibur Rahman, Bimol Chandra Pal, Tarek Ahmed, Nurul Haque, Ripon Ahmed and Faisal Ahmed have been admitted to Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College Hospital.

Locals said the issue was money, regularly collected by the stand's management committee of transport workers from vehicle drivers stopping

The upazila unit's former BCL convener Jamal Ahmed with some 60 men arrived around 10:30pm and they started shooting when some 40 of the committee's workers started hurling brick chips at them, said witnesses.

Inu tells Dhaka Reporters Unity press conference, terms Amnesty International's report unexpected STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Terming BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia "villain of the country's current politics", Information Minister Hasanul Haq Inu yesterday said they would have to "defeat" her to march towards democracy and peace.

Addressing a press conference Dhaka Reporters Unity organised at its auditorium in the capital, he also termed unexpected Amnesty International's Thursday's web report condemning "excessive police force" used to tackle violence centring the ongoing blockade of the BNP-led 20-party alliance.

"Amnesty International had tried to hide militancy by shifting the blame on the government," the Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal president responded to a query, urging the rights watchdog to properly gather information before preparing reports.

"BNP is gradually moving away from the path of democracy and heading towards violence. If the party does not refrain from such acts, it will soon turn into an organisation of terrorists," said Inu.

The government will

Wrongly Placed River Demarcation Pillars in Dhaka

Try liable officials

Demand Bapa leaders, say High Court order of 2009 also violated

Officials who wrongly installed river demarcation pillars in violation of a 2009 High Court order must be immediately brought to trial, said leaders of environmentalist group Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon (Bapa) yesterday.

They also demanded that all encroachments including those in Dhaka's rivers must be removed and earth filling, construction and land lease in the river areas be stopped until the pillars are installed in light of the order.

The HC made it clear that officials not doing their job of saving rivers in light of the observations into consideration, the order would be legally liable for their fail-

ure, said Bapa Joint Secretary Sharif Jamil while reading out a statement at a press conference Bapa organised in the capital's Dhaka Reporters Unity.

Despite the order, the relevant district administrations for the Shitalakkhya, Balu, Turag and Buriganga rivers went ahead with the faulty demarcation excluding an extensive river area, he told The Daily Star afterwards.

Following public outcry, the national taskforce for safeguarding rivers formed several enquiry committees to look into the anomaly.
