Thailand's junta chief yesterday met China's defence minister for talks aimed at deepening their military ties, as strains begin to show between the kingdom and its traditional ally the United States following last year's coup.

China has openly courted

Thailand's generals since May's coup, which took place days after democratically elected prime minister Yingluck Shinawatra was ousted by a court ruling following months of street protests.

In contrast, Washington has been critical of the generals' power grab, calling for the return of civilian rule.

Thai prime minister and former army chief Prayut Chan-O-Cha met Chang Wanquan for talks in which he called for greater cooperation with the Chinese military.

"Thailand wants China to support Thailand for research and development in the defence industry and to transfer knowledge to this industry as well," government spokesman Yongtuth Mayalarp told reporters after the meeting.

## Jordan vows to eradicate ISIS

In a statement posted on jihadist websites, the group said the woman was buried beneath the rubble after a raid by a Jordanian warplane in Raqa, the selfproclaimed capital of the militant group.

The statement did not show any pictures of a body and there was no independent confirmation of her reported death. T he Syrian Observatory for Human

Rights yesterday said more than 30 jihadists in the Islamic State group were killed yesterday in air strikes on Syria by warplanes of the US-led coalition. "At least 30 jihadists, and certainly

more, were killed in coalition raids on Friday against positions and depots sheltering military vehicles and tanks, east and west of the city of Raga," the Britain-based monitor said.

In Amman crowds of people waved Jordanian flags and pictures of Kassasbeh.

"We are all Maaz... We are all Jordan," they chanted, some holding placards aloft that read: "Yes to punishment. Yes to the eradication of terrorism."

Holding a portrait of the pilot with the words "Maaz the martyr of righteousness", Jordan's Queen Rania joined the marchers after weekly prayers at the Al-Husseini mosque.

Judeh declined to reveal Jordan's military plans but said it would hit the militants with all its might.

"We're going to go after them and we will eradicate them... We are at the forefront. This is our fight," he told CNN.

Jordan has conducted regular air raids against ISIS across the border in Syria as part of a US-led campaign against the Sunni extremist group.

Asked by Fox News in a separate interview if Jordan was now also targeting ISIS in Iraq, he replied: "That's right. Today, more Syria than Iraq. It is an ongoing

He added: "They are in Iraq and they are in Syria and therefore you have to target them wherever they are."

American F-16 and F-22 jets provided security to the Jordanian fighter planes, with additional support from refuelling tankers and surveillance aircraft, US officials said

On Wednesday, in response to the killing, Jordan executed two Iraqi convicts -- female would-be suicide bomber Sajida al-Rishawi and Al-Qaeda operative Ziad al-Karboli.

ISIS had offered to spare Kassasbeh's life and free Japanese journalist Kenji Goto -- who was later beheaded -- in exchange for Rishawi. Jordanian television suggested Kassasbeh was killed on January 3, before ISIS offered to spare him and free Goto in return for Rishawi's release.

Meanwhile India's external affairs ministry yesterday said a group of 11 Indian nurses trapped in the fighting in Iraq have been rescued and will return home today.

The nurses have been handed over to Indian officials in the Kurdish city of Irbil.

Last July, 46 Indian nurses, working at a hospital in the northern city of Tikrit and trapped in the fighting were freed and handed over to Indian officials. Reports say some 40 Indians are still being held hostage by jihadist fighters in Iraq.

On Thursday, the US military said it was deploying search and rescue planes to northern Iraq in a move designed to shorten the response time needed to reach pilots who end up in ISIS-held territory.

Last year, ISIS seized swathes of territory in Syria and Iraq and declared a "caliphate" in areas under its control, imposing its brutal interpretation of Islam and committing widespread atrocities.

The UN Security Council included the OMM on its sanctions list on 28 July, 2014 as it played a key role in arranging the shipment of concealed cargo of arms and related materials from Cuba to the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) in July 2013.

Dhaka as a member of the UN has decided not to allow the DPRK cargo vessel to enter its territory although the ship was carrying cement clinkers from Vietnam, diplomatic sources said.

A Bangladeshi importer was importing the clinker but he was not aware about the ship's status as it was hired by the exporting company.

An official of Chittagong Port said the ship had a capacity of 37,000 tonnes, but it was carrying 43,000 tonnes, raising questions whether it was transporting other items.

"The ship bearing the flag of Panama came to Bangladesh several times in the past. But this time we halted it after being confirmed that it is owned by the OMM of North Korea," said a senior official at the foreign ministry.

# Yemen Shia militia dissolves parliament

Installs 'presidential council' to run country

Shia militia who have seized Yemen's capital yesterday announced they had dissolved parliament and installed a "presidential council" to run the country in the face of a power vacuum. The Huthi militia said it would set

up a national council of 551 members to replace the legislature in the violence-wracked country, a key US ally in the fight against Al-Qaeda. The heavily armed Huthis swept

into Sanaa from their northern stronghold in September, seeking greater influence in running the country. Last month they seized the presidential palace and key government

buildings and encircled the houses of senior officials in what authorities called a coup attempt. That plunged the country deeper into crisis and prompted President Abedrabbo

Bahah to tender their resignations. The five-member presidential council will form a transitional government to govern for two years, the Huthis announced in a "constitutional declaration" attended by tribal and military representatives as well as by the outgoing interior and defence ministers.

The declaration came after a Wednesday deadline set by the militia for political parties to resolve the crisis passed with no agreement.

After another round of talks late Thursday attended by UN envoy Jamal Benomar, participants had said negoti-

ations would resume on Saturday.

On Friday, Benomar flew out of the country before the declaration was announced Yemen has been riven by instability

since the Arab Spring-inspired uprising that forced autocratic president Ali Abdullah Saleh from power in 2012. Saleh has been accused of backing

the Huthis -- who are from the same Zaidi sect of Shiite Islam as the exleader -- as has Shiite-dominated Iran. The fall of Hadi's Western-backed government has raised fears of complete chaos engulfing Yemen, strategi-

cally located next to oil-rich Saudi Arabia and on the key shipping route from the Suez Canal to the Gulf. Hadi said when he stepped down

that he could no longer stay in office as the country was in "total deadlock". The former career soldier took office Mansour Hadi and Prime Minister Khalid in 2012 under a UN- and Gulf-backed peace plan, in a country awash with weapons and where powerful tribes hold sway, emerging as a consensus

> But unlike his predecessor Saleh, who ruled Yemen for 33 years, Hadi had no popular or tribal base to fall back on.

The situation escalated last month when the militia seized a presidential aide in an apparent attempt to extract changes to a draft constitution which they opposed because it would have divided Yemen into six federal regions.
