

Biman flight survives midair engine trouble

A Biman flight to Dubai from Chittagong made an emergency landing in Dhaka after the number one engine of the Boeing 777-200ER developed a problem about eight minutes into the flight.

Flight BG 047 took off from Chittagong at 12:33am yesterday. One of the engines suffered an in-flight engine surge, damaging the engine. The loud noise caused passengers to panic, Biman officials said.

The captain shut down the engine and asked the Air Traffic Control at Shahjalal International Airport for an emergency landing.

"The aircraft landed normally and safely with passengers disembarking the aircraft in the normal way. An alternative aircraft was made available and it took off from HSIA at 3:36am for Dubai," said a Biman Press release. The 777 is capable of flying safely with one of its two

engines running. The aircraft in question was manufactured in 2001 and it would re-enter service once all necessary engine repairs were done, the release said.

TALKS ON FRESH RECRUITMENT Saudi delegation due tomorrow

A high-profile Saudi Arabian delegation will arrive in Dhaka tomorrow to discuss the procedure for recruiting workers from Bangladesh.

"The team will sit with the expatriates' welfare minister and the bodies concerned [with manpower export] during their stay in Dhaka," Sarwar Alam, counsellor (labour wing) at Bangladesh embassy in Riyadh, told The Daily Star over the phone yesterday.

Ahmed F Alfahaid, deputy minister for international affairs of the Saudi labour ministry, will lead the delegation which would leave on February 11. Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment Secretary Khandaker Md

Iftekhar Haider said the Saudi delegation would make the visit to inspect the interested migrant jobseekers' database as part of the procedure for the recruitment.

Indonesian woman sets fire to expatriate Bangladeshi

Too costly for Tiger nations to fight poaching jointly

Set up anti-poaching network

Thirteen countries which are home to the world's dwindling population of wild tigers yesterday agreed to establish an intelligence-sharing network to fight traffickers, concluding an anti-

poaching conference in Kathmandu.

Around 100 experts, government and law enforcement officials attended the five-day summit, co-hosted by Nepal and conservation group WWF to hammer out a regional plan to fight poaching in Asia.

"We cannot allow wildlife crime to con-

tinue to wrap its tentacles deeper into the region," said Tikaram Adhikari, director general of Nepal's department of national parks and wildlife conservation.

"Our individual efforts may win us a few battles, but we can only win the war only if Asia

presents a united front to stop the poaching, end the trafficking and wipe out demand," Adhikari said in a press statement.

Nepal has twice been recognised for going a full year with no poaching incidents SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

UN to be in touch with AL, BNP to resolve differences

Political issue separate from peacekeeping

The United Nations will continue to be in touch with the leaders of the Awami League and the BNP to help them resolve differences, said a UN spokesperson.

"We'll continue to be in touch with the leaders of the two main parties, trying to make sure that they can resolve their differences," said Farhan Haq, deputy spokesman for the UN secretary-general, while addressing a regular press briefing on Thursday.

"We've made our concerns known," Haq said, replying to queries about the political situation in Bangladesh.

Reminded that Bangladesh is a peacekeeping contributory country, the spokesperson said the political process is

separate from the issue of UN peacekeeping. "Well, the political process is separate and apart from the issue of peacekeepers in UN missions, who are under the control ultimately of the mission."

Jordan vows to eradicate ISIS

Broadens campaign against jihadists; coalition air strikes in Syria 'kill US female hostage', 30 militants

Jordan yesterday vowed further retaliation against the Islamic State group for the burning alive of one of its pilots, as thousands rallied in Amman in solidarity with his

grieving family. Jordan said dozens of its jet fighters struck ISIS on Thursday, and had widened their campaign from Syria to include targets

in neighbouring Iraq. Foreign Minister Nasser Judeh told CNN the operation was "the beginning of our retaliation over this horrific and brutal murder of our brave young pilot." Earlier this week, ISIS released a video of

the gruesome killing of airman Maaz al-Kassasbeh, whose death has sparked grief and deep anger in Jordan.

Meanwhile, ISIS yesterday claimed that a female American hostage had been killed in an air strike in Syria by the US-led coalition. SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

Termites halt desertification

They are considered to be pests with a taste for anything made out of wood, but for ecologists they could become a vital weapon against the steady advance of deserts around the world.

Mounds of soil made by termites when they build their high-rise nests have been found to hold back the encroachment of deserts in dry, savannah grasslands threatened with desertification, scientists have found.

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
