Barisal, Rajshahi residents denounce blockade, hartal

They claim govt failed to give security to people

Demanding withdrawal of the ongoing blockade and hartals, enforced by the BNP-led 20-party alliance, a group of Barisal city dwellers and Rajshahi University cultural activists demonstrated in their respective areas yesterday.

In Barisal, carrying white flags, Sammilito Barisalbasi, a citizens' forum, brought out a procession in the city and formed a human chain before Ashwini Kumar Hall, reports our correspondent. They demanded that the safety and security of the people

be ensured. The government failed to provide security to the people, they said. In this situation, all should unite to restore peace across the country, they added.

Meanwhile, Rajshahi University Kendrio Sangskritik Jote, the biggest platform of the cultural activists at RU, formed a human chain in front of the central library, reports our RU correspondent.

They expressed their deep concerns over the countrywide arson attacks killing innocent people. They said if such situation continued undemocratic forces could emerge in the country. They sought congenial atmosphere in all educational institutions.

Road crashes kill 5, injure 21

Five people were killed and 21 others injured in road acci-

dents in four districts yesterday.

In Sylhet, two people were killed and 10 others injured as a CNG-run auto-rickshaw collided head-on with a bus and fell into a roadside ditch on Dhaka-Sylhet highway in Burunga village.

The deceased were Azir Uddin, 50, of Nij Burunga village and Shayesta Mia, 38, of Ishagaon village.

In Kushtia, two people were killed and two others injured when a truck hit a rickshaw-van at Ranakhoria in Mirpur upazila.

The deceased were Shajhan Pramanik, 55, and Farida Khatun, 45, of Milpara area of Kushtia town.

In Jessore, Abdul Kader, 37, of Jessore Sadar died when a

truck hit his motorcycle in Churomonkathi area of Sadar upazila.

In Tangail, nine people, including eight SSC examinees, were hurt when a battery-run auto-rickshaw carrying them hit a roadside tree at Shimla Bazar in Gopalpur upazila.

Bangalees need to know more about own history

Scholars, researchers tell inauguration of 11th Congress on Bengal Art

Bangalees need to study their cultural history more and more to know their glorious identity, noted scholars and researchers told the inauguration of a four-day biennial international conference in the capital yesterday.

People out of a natural propensity dig out their cultural history and heritage to relate their identity to the ancestors, said University Grants Commission Chairman Prof AK Azad Chowdhury.

It is however unfortunate that there is no scope for studying ancient and medieval Bengal art in the country's 75 public and private universities, said noted historian and museum expert Prof Enamul Haque, founder chairman and founder director general of ICSBA and Bangladesh National Museum respectively.

The International Centre for Study of Bengal Art (ICSBA) organised the 11th "Congress on Bengal Art" at Brac Centre Inn.

Monarchs and monks built mosques and monasteries in Bengal but many of its historical relics are being ruined despite government's conservation efforts, said Cultural Affairs Secretary Dr Ranjit Kumar Biswas.

Bengal's history dates back to the Indo-Gangetic civilisation, said Finance

Minister AMA Muhith as chief guest. The ICSBA awarded Muhith, Prof Nazma Khan Majlis of Dhaka University and Dr Sudipa Ray Bandyopadhyay of Calcutta University honorary fellowships for outstanding interest and contribution to the study of

Bengal's history, art and archaeology. Around 28 of the conference's 55 participants are foreign scholars from graphs to the ICSBA.

India, Germany and Austria, said the organisers. The conference will have research paper presentations and be hosted on two days onboard a water vessel in the Shitalakkhya river.

Founded in 1995, the ICSBA is dedicated to studying archaeology, architecture, sculpture, painting, epigraphy, numismatics, religion, ethnography and the spectrum of folk and decorative arts.

It has brought out 20 books and annually publishes "Journal of Bengal Art" containing research works on Bengal's art and cultural history.

Prof Enamul and late Prof Zulekha Haque, former chairperson of Eden Girls College's history department, donated their personal collection of 20,000 books and 60,000 photo-

ROK opens dev chances for Bangladesh

South Korea has introduced a new sort of Official Development Assistance (ODA) programme opening a scope for Bangladesh to avail opportunities in the areas of technology and finance, according to officials at the Economic Relations Division and foreign ministry.

The country has already invited project proposals from partner countries, including Bangladesh, under the new programme titled "Industrial Technology ODA".

Counsellor and Chargé D'affaires of the Bangladesh Embassy in Seoul, Khandker Masudul Alam, has written to the foreign ministry over the matter to disseminate the information among the relevant ministries and stakeholders, including busi-

ness bodies. "Interested organisations should start discussing their envisioned projects with KIAT (Korean Institute for Industrial Advancement) as soon as possible to maximise our gain from the ODA scheme," Alam mentioned in the letter, dated January 12.

mutation certificates, and other papers, yet they are losing land out to the grabbers who are forging their land documents with assistance from government officials, said Anil Marandi, presidium member of Jatiya Adivasi Parishad.

The land survey and digitisation of the records are scheduled to start in June. Speaking as chief guest, Shyam Kishore Roy, the divisional commissioner of land reform in Rajshahi, assured that the

government would watch that the minority communities could update their land records without being overcharged. He, however, called upon the NGOs to create awareness among Adivasis about preserving updated land records for

safety of their land. According to ASUS Executive Director Rajkumar Shaw, 1.5 lakh indigenous people of 20 communities live in Rajshahi district, and most of them suffer due to land-related problems. Referring to the incidents of eviction, grabbing of grave-

yards, property, murder, and rape, he said the indigenous people barely got support from the administration in these incidents. The speakers reiterated a nine-point demand including establishing a separate land commission for plain land Adivasis and a

national commission for indigenous affairs, and keeping repre-

sentatives of the communities in the land survey.
