bombs in the name of politics. Hasina mentioned that the country is now passing through an unbearable situation where more than 50 people have been killed and over a hundred injured in petrol

bombs hurled by anarchists. The air of the burn units at the hospitals turned heavy with the foul smell of the burnt people, she said. "You know who are committing such inhumane acts ... The country's people know it very well."

She compared these killings with what the Pakistani occupational forces did back in 1971. "Again it seems that they have unleashed killings like in 1971," she added.

"When the country's economy was marching ahead recouping the losses of destructive acts by the BNP-Jamaat nexus, they are now again waging war against people and are engaged in killing spree," she said.

Recalling the destructive activities carried out by the BNP-Jamaat alliance before the January-5 election, Hasina said, they committed similar misdeeds at that time leaving over 100 people, including 20 members of police, BGB and army, dead. "Even, mosques, temples and pagodas were vandalised and torched."

Besides, she said, hundreds of copies of the holy Quran were burnt to ashes in front of Baitul Mukarram National Mosque while railway carriages and locomotives were destroyed or damaged by uprooting fishplates and tracks.

Mentioning Bangladesh's stance against terrorism, the PM said her government is showing zero tolerance to all forms of terrorism and is committed not to sheltering anybody or any organisation to carry out subversive acts against any country using Bangladesh's soil. She reiterated that the BNP's elec-

tion boycott was a political mistake. She also asked why the countrymen should pay the price for their political wrong decision. "They're trying to create a horrible situation in the country by killing innocent people," Hasina said.

Stop cycle of violent crimes

"The violent crimes being committed by some members of the opposition cannot justify the killings, injuries, and wrongful arrests by the government," he said in a statement published in the HRW website.

Over the past month, nearly 60 people have been killed, hundreds injured, and thousands arrested across the country, he said.

All political leaders should give clear statements that their supporters should not use unlawful violence, the statement added.

The violence and clampdown by government security forces began in early January, with protests to mark the first anniversary of the controversial 2014 elections which saw the ruling Awami League win a landslide victory after the BNP-led alliance boycotted the polls.

The current cycle of violence, including deadly arson attacks, follows the same pattern as documented by Human Rights Watch a year ago, when more than 500 people were killed in the election-related violence, the statement said.

It noted that one of the most horrific aspects of the violence in HRW. Bangladesh was petrol bomb attacks, often hurled indiscriminately at vehicles attempting to pass through strikes and transport blockades called by the alliance. and Congress, the party that has dominated Indian politics over the last century, will win three seats, its worse ever performance, the polls showed. The BJP's campaign has been

marked by infighting with party workers frustrated that Kiran Bedi, the first woman officer in the Indian Police Service, was appointed as the party's chief ministerial candidate, even

though she only became a party member three weeks ago.

Earlier this week, the BJP ordered scores of its top national and state leaders to campaign for this weekend's high-profile election to the Delhi assembly.

Modi took out full-page advertisements on the front of several major newspapers in the capital on Friday in a last-minute effort to sway voters.

The BJP, which under Modi won India's biggest election mandate in three decades last May, has come first in three of four state elections over the past year. It may also form a coalition government in the fourth regional assembly.
