Spare education plea goes in vain

SSC exams rescheduled, again

Syeda Ishrat Jahan, mother of SSC examinee Antara Ibnat, was worried about how her daughter was doing in the exam. She was anxiously waiting outside the exam centre in the capital's Siddheswari Girls High School yesterday.

The mother pleaded with the politicians to call off hartals considering the future of her daughter.

Her appeal echoes the concerns of the guardians of around 15 lakh candidates appearing in this year's SSC and equivalent exams, which have already been disrupted by the ongoing blockade and hartals.

But their pleas fell on deaf ears as the BNP-led alliance is set to observe a fresh spell of 72-hour hartal from today, forcing the government to reschedule the upcoming exams again.

Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid yesterday morning urged the 20-party alliance not to call hartal on exam days. He even pleaded with them to reconsider hartal during exam hours (including the time required for going to exam halls and returning home after the exams).

But later in the afternoon, the minister had to reschedule today's exam for Friday (February 13) and Tuesday's exam SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

The White House may declassify still-secret sections of an official inquiry into the 9/11 terrorist attacks which refer to possible Saudi Arabian support.

Questions over the 28-page section of the congressional report have been raised this week following the deposition of imprisoned former al-Qaeda operative Zacarias Moussaoui in which he claimed major Saudi figures were donors to his group in late 1990s.

Saudi officials have denied this.

According to White House spokesman Josh Earnest, US intelligence last year began re-evaluating the decision to classify the section following a request from congress,


