



The ongoing political unrest wiped out as much as 70 percent of retail sales across the country in the last one month, pushing many medium and small retailers to the brink of closing their businesses.

Apart from retailers, around 24 lakh hawkers and street vendors have seen a sharp fall in sales, as the number of buyers plunged amid fears of arson and bomb attacks.

Bangladesh Shop Owners' Association that represents 25 lakh retailers in the country said their average sales dropped to around Tk 900 crore from Tk 3,000 crore a day.

It said the slump in sales began since the BNP-led alliance enforced the non-stop

blockade on January 6.

"We keep our stores open but there is hardly any customer," said Shah Alam Khandaker, secretary general of Bangladesh Shop Owners' Association.

Retailers said people are mostly buying essentials especially perishable commodities. The sales of relatively nonessential SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

#### Arson, bomb attack on vehicles continue

2 more arson victims die; petrol bombs hurled at Maitree Express; 2 Jamaat men, one cop hurt in 'gunfight'

Two more petrol bomb victims died of their injuries yesterday raising the death toll to 68 since the political violence sparked early last month.

Abul Kalam Azad, 40, who was injured in a petrol bomb attack in Gaibandha Friday night, died at Rangpur Medical College Hospital yesterday afternoon.

Truck helper Hasib, 30, who was injured in a similar attack Saturday night in Bogra, died early yesterday at Shaheed Ziaur

Rahman Medical College Hospital. Criminals hurled at least three crude bombs at India-Bangladesh train Maitree Express in Ishwardi yesterday afternoon when it was heading towards Dhaka from Kolkata.

None was hurt. Meanwhile, Gaibandha police filed a case on Saturday against 90 leaders and activists of the 20-party alliance in connection with the petrol bomb attack on a bus on Friday night that killed eight people and critically injured 14 others.
