While one can't be completely disappointed with the way the Tigers played at the Blacktown Olympic Park yesterday, the three-wicket defeat though is bound

to leave the players reeling.

Tamim Iqbal (81) and Mahmudullah Riyad (83) posted 168 for the third wicket, Bangladesh's second highest stand for that position, and helped the Tigers recover. With 190-odd runs and eight wickets in hand in the last eleven overs, the middle order had the perfect foundation.

However, Bangladesh's most dependable batsmen failed to lead the charge. While Mushfiqur Rahim was out for a duck, Shakib Al Hasan left after scoring 31. A score of 246 at the medium-sized ground was never going to be enough.

Tamim, who played his first competitive match after returning from injury, reckoned that the Tigers were 20 runs short.

"I think it was a tight game. For a moment it seemed as though we could win this one. We may have lost, but if we continue playing such tight matches the result will not always be against us. It was a positive outcome.

"It made us realise that if we do our jobs properly, we can win matches abroad," Tamim told reporters after the match yesterday.

The collapse towards the end, which saw Bangladesh lose eight wickets for just 62 runs, brought Pakistan back into the game. "We were 20 runs short on that ground for sure," said Tamim.

similar following. While the pacers took early wickets and gave the Tigers a good start, Pakistan's batsmen capitalised towards the end. When Taskin Ahmed bowled Misbahul Haq for 10, Pakistan were at a precarious 199 for 6 in 42.2 overs. However, any chance of a comeback was destroyed by Shahid Afridi (24) and a few late hits from Sohaib Maqsood (93).

The left-hander admitted that the death bowling could have been better from the Tigers. "We bowled quite a few boundary deliveries towards the end and that hurt us," he rued.

On a personal note, the batsman, despite being disappointed on missing out on a century, was happy with his comeback.

"Scoring a hundred gives you a different feeling all together but I am quite happy that I managed to get a good start. The kind of confidence that I received after this innings, I think is good enough to help me in the World Cup," reckoned the opener.

The way Bangladesh played yesterday's game provided an insight with regards to the team's strategies. For one, they are yet to find a number seven. It seems to be a battle between Soumya Sarkar and Sabbir Rahman. If both players are taken, then the Tigers may have to go in without either of their specialist spinners, Arafat Sunny and Taijul Islam.

Murali's money not on spin bowlers

Sri Lankan spin legend Muttiah Muralidaran doesn't believe that the slow bowlers will be holding the keys to succeeding in the upcoming ICC Cricket World Cup in Australia and New Zealand.

"If your hope is for spin to play a major role at this World Cup, then I believe you are likely to be disappointed," said the world's highest wicket-taker both Tests and ODIs in a write-up on the ICC Media Zone yesterday.

"It is true the tournament in Australia and New Zealand is taking place at the back-end of the season and normally you might expect to see dry and tired pitches offering turn for the slow bowlers.

"But, while the very best spinners have a chance of featuring near the top of the wicket-taking charts, I am not holding my breath for them to dominate that chart. "Why? Well to start with, I

am not expecting pitches to be all that tired and worn. Remember several of the Australia venues have now switched to drop-in surfaces and even in the cases of those that have not, I am sure curators will be keeping their pitches for the tournament fresh as this is cricket's ultimate showpiece and they will not want to be seen to produce conditions that are anything less than perfect,"

opined the off-spinner. "My experience of both countries is that, although both are very different, neither will offer very much assistance to spinners, especially in matches where, in 100 overs, you are unlikely to see much deterioration in the pitches."

West Indies captain Jason Holder Monday described the loss of Dwyane Bravo and Kieron Pollard as "huge" but wanted the former champions to move on during the World Cup. Drafted in surprisingly as

captain just two months before the World Cup, Holder said selection matters were beyond his control. "They are two players who

have done well in world cricket," Holder said when asked what effect will the dropping of the two key players will have on his team. "I am not the selector. It's out of our control. Not

having them would be a huge loss to any side. But it's beyond our control and we have to accept it and move on." The 23-year-old became

the youngest man to lead the West Indies in the wake of a players' strike over a payment row with the West Indies Cricket Board (WICB).

The tussle resulted in West Indies abandoning the tour of India in October last year.

Bravo and Pollard were the leading players behind the strike and their axing was described as "vengeance" by former West Indian paceman Michael Holding.

PROTEAS EDGE OUT LANKANS South Africa beat Sri Lanka by five wickets with just three balls to spare in a thrilling rain-interrupted World Cup warm-up on Monday.

Sri Lanka smashed 279 for seven in their innings, which was reduced to 44.4 overs after rain stopped play at Hagley Oval in Christchurch.

Opener Tillakaratne Dilshan laid the foundations for a big Sri Lankan total when he belted exactly 100 off just 83 deliveries, which included 15 boundaries and two sixes.

He was well supported by the Sri Lankan captain Angelo Mathews, who made a quickfire 58 off 49 balls, and Dimuth Karunaratne, who chipped in with 46 off 61 deliveries.

Kyle Abbott was the pick of the South Africa bowlers, taking 3-37 while allrounder Wayne Parnell bagged two wickets.

When the rain stopped and the South Africans started their reply, they were initially set 230 to win off 30 overs under the Duckworth-Lewis method.

RAIN RUINS NZ-ZIM WARM-UP

Opener Martin Guptill hit a fighting hundred before rain saved New Zealand's shambolic batting in a World Cup warm-up game against a spirited Zimbabwe on Monday.

Guptill hit the 86-ball century as New Zealand wilted to 157-7 in 30.1 overs after winning the toss, before heavy rain washed out the match.

Since the all-rounder suffered a side strain on February 1 the team's medical staff have not given a firm estimate of his expected recovery time, other than it was of the "typical" severity suffered by fast bowlers. They said his rate of improvement in the first fortnight, which concludes on Sunday, would "determine when he can return to batting and bowling".

Faulkner is staying with the Australian squad but in Adelaide was limited to walking laps of Adelaide Oval.

While it was expected the left-armer would miss both the February 14 opener against England and the February 21 match against Bangladesh, selector Mark Waugh suggested Faulkner's stint on the sidelines could stretch beyond that.
