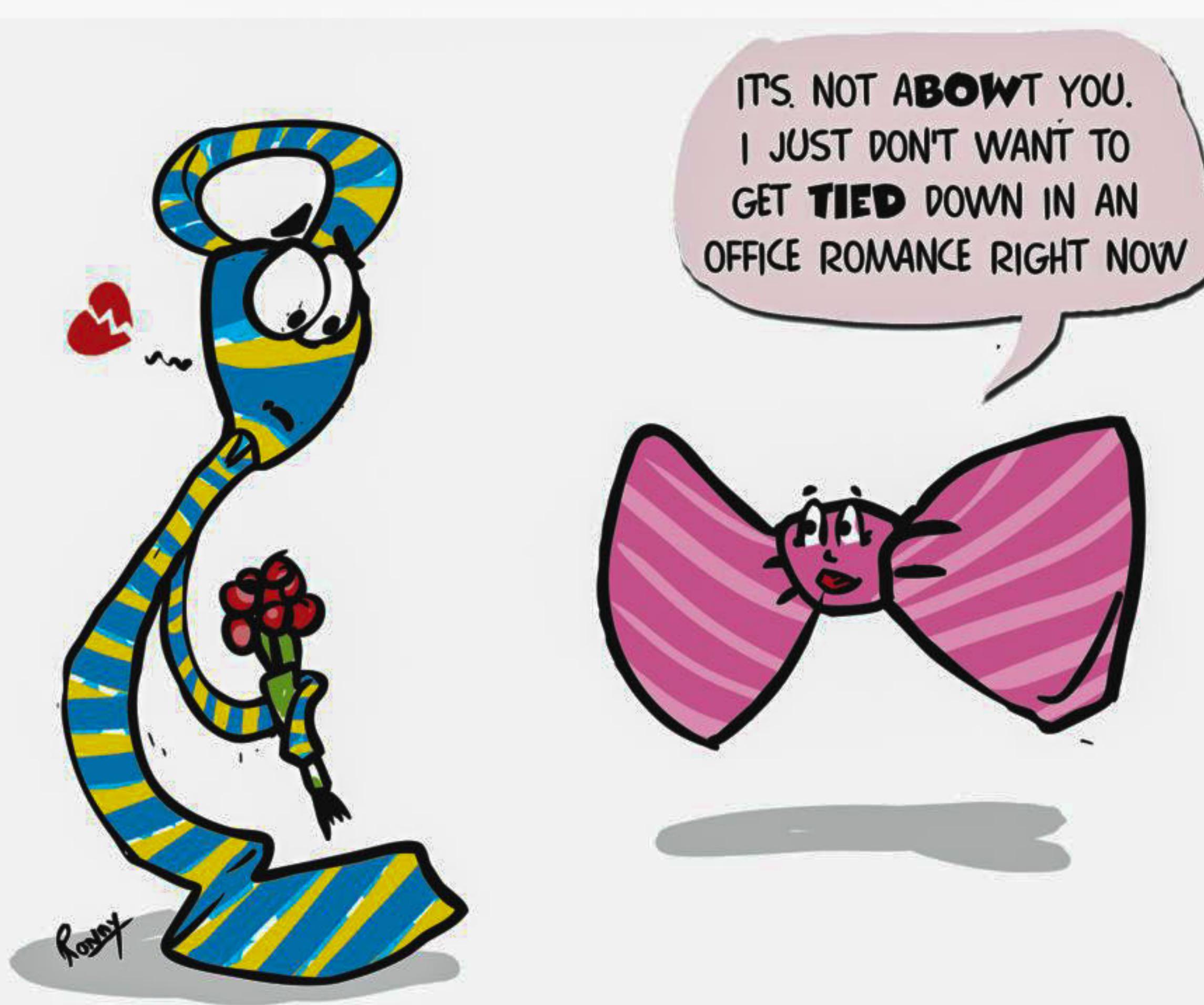
HANDS (AND EYES) OFF UNTIL YOU'RE OFF THE CLOCK

"Serving the world's poorest through profitable and sustainable enterprise is not just good for the world, it's great business. Our pioneering platform builds ecosystems by leveraging crowd and we couldn't be happier that BRAC University will be joining our mission with their participation in the 6th annual Hult Prize."

Selected teams were chosen from over 20,000 applications received from over 500 colleges and universities in over 150 countries. The Hult Prize regional final competitions will take place on March 13 and 14, 2015 in Boston, San Francisco,



London, Dubai and Shanghai.

Following the regional finals, one winning team from each host city will move into a summer business incubator, where participants will receive mentorship, advisory and strategic planning as they create prototypes and set-up to launch and scale their new ventures. A final round of competition will be hosted by President Bill

Clinton and the CGI at its annual meeting in September 2015, where CGI delegates will select the winning team, which will receive USD 1 million in start-up funding to launch their sustainable social venture.
