# Csorba powers Abahani

 Hungarian forward Szabolcs Csorba made his mark in his very first competitive game in Bangladesh, scoring twice in a 2-0 victory for Abahani against Farashganj SC in their opening fixture of the Federation Cup at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

The new recruit of George Kottan, who had scored both goals in a 2-0 victory against Bangladesh national team prior to the Bangabandhu Gold Cup last month, scored in injury time of either half to ensure all three points for the Sky Blues in Group -3.

The Hungarian unsettled the Farashganj defence with his slick movements and struck the opening goal in the 47th minute with a dink over onrushing goalkeeper Sujon Chowdhury, having collected a deflected attempt from Abdul Baten Komol, inside the box.

Komol almost doubled Abahani's lead seven minutes into the second half, but his left-footed volley hit the woodwork.

Csorba then sealed the fate of the match deep into injury time with a powerful attempt from the middle of the box after being set up by midfielder Emon Mahmud.

Meanwhile, Muktijoddha skipper Enamul Haque scored a brace as the All Reds romped to a 4-0 win over Championship League outfit Uttar Baridhara in the second match of the day.

The former Bangladesh international broke the deadlock with a seventh-minute strike to give his side a 1-0 lead, going into the break. Baridhara managed to keep the All Reds quiet for most part of the second half, but Mohammad Biplob's 84th-minute strike opened the floodgates as Enamul followed up with a second in the 88th minute and Anwar put the icing on the cake with a stoppage-time strike.

# Sacchi causes a stir

 The agent of Mario Balotelli led the growing criticism of former Italy and AC Milan coach Arrigo Sacchi following remarks criticising the number of "blacks" playing at youth level in Italy.

Sacchi, a renowned football coach and innovator who notably helped Milan to back-to-back European Cups in 1989 and 1990, has claimed he is "not racist".

But comments made on Monday, when he said "too many blacks" played in Italy's under-20 leagues, have attracted widespread criticism on social media.

"Italy now has no dignity or pride, because we have too many foreigners playing in the under-20 leagues: in our youth sectors there are too many blacks," Sacchi said during an awards ceremony in Montecatini Terme late on Monday.

A growing number of sports personalities, including former England international Gary Lineker, hit out at the comments.

But the agent of Italy star Balotelli, born to Ghanaian parents but adopted by white Italians, called Sacchi "ignorant" and, in ironic tones, said the comments had given a

bad impression of Italians.

"Italian Football too many ignorant people in power so we're in the s... Ashamed to be Italian when I hear Sacchi's declaration. Bella figura (great impression)," said Raiola.

Lineker posted a Twitter comment on Tuesday which said: "There are too many racists in Italian football."

Sacchi, a former director of Italy's national team at under-21 level, claimed he was not racist because he signed a player like Frank Rijkaard, a Dutchman of Surinamese origin, when he was coach at Milan.

But the 68-year-old insisted that 'too many coloured players' featured for Italian youth sides at the famous Viareggio tournament, known in footballing circles as the Viareggio Cup World Football Tournament.

"I'm certainly not racist, as my coaching history demonstrates with Rijkaard," added Sacchi.

"But look at the Viareggio tournament. I would say that there are too many coloured players, also in the under-20 teams in Italy."

He later claimed his comments were misinterpreted, adding: "I've been misinterpreted, you think I'm really racist? All I said was I saw a game featuring a team who fielded four coloured players."

# Real wary of complacency

Having routed Schalke on their last Gelsenkirchen visit, Real Madrid return to Germany for Wednesday's Champions League last 16, first-leg, clash with Toni Kroos warning the Spanish giants against complacency.

Real ran riot at Schalke's Veltins Arena at exactly the same stage of the competition last February when Karim Benzema, Cristiano Ronaldo and Gareth Bale each scored two goals in a 6-1 thrashing as part of a 9-2 aggregate victory.

It was Schalke's heaviest European home defeat until the margin was matched when Chelsea drubbed the hosts 5-0 in Gelsenkirchen in the group stages last November.

Madrid have won only three of their 27 trips to Germany, but two of victories came last year when they smashed Schalke, then routed Bayern Munich 4-

0 at home in the semi-final, second-leg.

Holders Real will arrive in Germany with a lengthy walking-wounded list with Sergio Ramos, Luka Modric, James Rodriguez, Sami Khedira and Fabio Coentrao all out injured.

Carlo Ancelotti's Spanish league leaders are struggling for form after being hammered 4-0 at Atletico Madrid ten days ago and laboured to a 2-0 home win over Deportivo La Coruna on Saturday.

"You don't win anything by going through the motions, that also goes for Real Madrid," said their Germany midfielder Kroos.

"If we have two good days, we can go very far, but only then."

Real defender Pepe is rated as doubtful as he recovers from a rib injury.

Madrid superstar Cristiano Ronaldo is struggling with the patella tendon injury in his left knee that affected him towards the end of last season and at the World Cup.

The Ballon d'Or winner has not

scored in the last three games and has come under-fire since being sent off last month in the narrow win at Cordoba.

He was heavily criticised for hosting his 30th birthday party hours after Real were thrashed by Atletico.

But attacking midfielder Isco says Real are at their best when under pressure.

"What's great about this team is that it's able to pick itself up from the tough situations," said the 22-year-old who scored against Deportivo.

"I think that having been brought down to earth is going to do us good and now we're going to move forward."

"Now we have to go to Germany, to a difficult ground, but we're Real Madrid and we go for it."

"This week will be an important step for what's ahead."

Fourth-placed Schalke stumbled to a 1-0 defeat at mid-table Eintracht Frankfurt in the Bundesliga on Saturday.

It was the Royal Blues first defeat in six league games, but nevertheless they are relishing the challenge.

# Lance to pay \$10 million

Disgraced cyclist Lance Armstrong, who was stripped of seven Tour de France titles for doping, must pay \$10 million (8.8 million euros) after losing an arbitration dispute with SCA Promotions.

The Texas firm announced Monday in a statement that the arbitration panel punished Armstrong for "an unparalleled pageant of international perjury, fraud and conspiracy."

Armstrong, 43, received \$4.5 million in bonus payments from SCA for winning the Tour de France from 2001-2003 under SCA's deal with the US Postal Service team owners.

But SCA refused to pay Armstrong a \$5 million bonus for his 2004 triumph. Armstrong went to court and settled the case for \$7.5 million in 2006 after swearing he had won the race without taking performance-enhancing drugs.

Armstrong's confession of doping in 2013 prompted SCA to reopen the matter and the arbitration panel conducted a new hearing. SCA had sought \$12 million from Armstrong, including legal fees.

SCA has a lawsuit in Dallas state district court pursuing additional claims against Armstrong, who is also fighting a federal lawsuit over fraud claims that could cost him \$100 million.

# Van Gaal relishing Arsenal showdown

Louis van Gaal says he is relishing the chance to face Arsenal at Old Trafford after Manchester United earned a showdown with the holders in the FA Cup quarterfinals.

Goals from Ander Herrera, Marouane Fellaini and Wayne Rooney booked United's place in the last eight with a 3-1 win at Preston North End in the fifth round on Monday.

The third tier team took the lead early in the second half through Scott Laird but van Gaal's side ultimately proved too strong.

Their reward is a potentially classic home tie against Arsenal on the weekend of March 7 and 8 after three successive away ties against lower-league opponents.

"We have a draw at home, which is important in FA Cup matches," van Gaal said. "I am pleased we can play against Arsenal and at home."

"Every game in the FA Cup is difficult to

win because every team is giving everything.

"You have seen it also in this round, how many better situated teams have lost so I don't think that of course when you play against a lower team then the chance to win is always bigger."

"I am very happy we can play now against Arsenal and for the first time we play at home."

United and Arsenal have both won the FA Cup on 11 occasions, with their last meeting in the tournament won by United in the last eight in 2011.

Arsenal's most recent triumph came last season against Hull City, while United have not lifted the trophy since 2004.

Van Gaal admitted he feared for his side's place in this season's competition when Simon Grayson's men went ahead through Laird.

Van Gaal's response was to introduce Ashley Young and switch formation and it paid off.

"Of course, when we conceded a goal, we have to fight again for the victory," he said.

# EPL stars face tax probe

Belgian tax authorities are investigating Luxembourg bank accounts held by English Premier League stars Eden Hazard, Thibaut Courtois and Kevin Mirallas, De Morgen newspaper reported Tuesday.

The Flemish daily said the Belgian internationals have Luxembourg based companies they use to transfer money. Luxembourg taxes are considerably lower than in Belgium.

Teenager Divock Origi, who Liverpool have loaned to French side Lille was also named in the report.

Hazard and Courtois are teammates at Chelsea while Mirallas turns out for Everton.

Such practices are legal if the players can "prove that the company is run from Luxembourg, which is naturally difficult (to prove)", according to an expert quoted by De Morgen who added that the players involved risk penalties.

Last November the 'Lux Leaks' scandal revealed secret structures used by international clients, including major multinationals, to avoid taxes with tax avoidance schemes in Luxembourg.

They appeared set for a crushing win in perfect conditions at Dunedin's University Oval, claiming early wickets to leave Scotland reeling at 12 for four.

Matt Machan (56) and Richie Berrington (50) were the standouts with a 97-run fifth-wicket partnership in a Scottish innings that featured five ducks -- four of them golden.

Corey Anderson and Dan Vettori took three wickets apiece as Scotland folded after 36.2 overs, with Trent Boult and Tim Southee coming close to snatching hattricks.

New Zealand made hard

work of chasing 143 on pitch were they scored 360 against Sri Lanka last month, with Iain Wardlaw and Josh Davey both taking three wickets for Scotland.

The win was not pretty but man-of-the-match Boult said New Zealand "got the job done".

McCullum (15), Martin Guppill (17) and Ross Taylor (9) all went cheaply, leaving New Zealand 66 for three early in the innings.

Kane Williamson made a good start and reached 38 before he too suffered a rush of blood to the head.

Luke Ronchi, who scored an unbeaten 170 against Sri Lanka at the venue last month, managed just 12 before he was dismissed trying to cart Davey out of the ground.

Scotland skipper Preston Mommsen, who was among those dismissed without scoring, said the poor start derailed his side's chance of an upset win.

The loss leaves Scotland still searching for a World Cup win in their third appearance at the tournament.

Their next match is against England in Christchurch on Monday.
