### Worst defeat in decades

England cricketing great Sir Ian Botham has labelled his country's crushing defeat to the Black Caps as their worst performance in four decades.

England fell to an eightwicket loss in their cricket World Cup pool match after the Black Caps needed just over 12 overs to chase down the paltry target of 124.

"There have been other terrible performances of course, but this was just embarrassing - it wasn't even a contest," Botham wrote in the Daily Mirror.

"In nearly 40 years of playing for and watching England in one-day cricket, I have not seen a worse performance than the one I saw in Wellington on Friday."

Botham said New Zealand were playing the game the modern way and that was why he had tipped them to win the tournament.

"But even so, I never imagined that they would do what they have done to an England team that are now in crisis."

In The Guardian, cricket correspondent Mike Selvey rated the result as eclipsing England's 111-run loss to Australia in their tournament opener.

"England cricketing disasters can come with the bar set very high, but even by their lofty standards this was par excellence," he wrote.

The Independent's cricket correspondent, Stephen Brenkley, said England were swept aside by a team who were more confident and more aware of what a modern ODI entailed.

"Southee and the other Kiwis seized the moment; England ran away from it."

As soon as the match was abandoned yesterday afternoon, Bangladeshi journalists gathered their belongings from the press box and rushed towards the field at the Brisbane Cricket Ground, the Gabba, hoping to catch a quote or two from the players.

On days such as this, when there is no match to write about, the players' reaction becomes 'gold'. And while most of us were busy getting prepared, the Australian journalists seemed least bothered with regards to a possible post-match interaction.

Most of them were busy typing out their analytical pieces.

When enquired about the issue, a couple of them said that the Australian players wouldn't talk, because the match was abandoned without a ball being bowled. This essentially meant that none of the players would receive their match fee and hence weren't likely to get involved in any match-related activities.

And who would blame them? Match fees after all constitute a great deal of their earnings. It also instigates more competition among the players.

A Bangladeshi cricketer for instance, receives a bit more than a lakh from the cricket board for every ODI that they play in. Australian cricketers probably receive more from their own board.

## Underestimation can be suicidal

Sri Lanka will play a full-strength team when they tackle Afghanistan in the World Cup on Sunday, with skipper Angelo Mathews insisting it would be disrespectful to underestimate the tournament minnows.

The 1996 champions lost their opening fixture in Pool A, as did Afghanistan, and that defeat make Sunday's clash at the University Oval all the more important to Sri Lanka's hopes of making the quarterfinals. "We are playing the full team. Every

game is important for us, whether you play Afghanistan or Australia, every game is important, so we'll take every single game very seriously, and we'll play the best XI possible on that day," said Mathews.

His plan to play his strongest side hinted at a reprieve for key swing bowler Lasith Malinga who was smashed to all parts of the Hagley Oval in Christchurch last Saturday in his team's 98-run loss to New Zealand.

Malinga, 31, ended with figures of none for 84 off his 10 overs as the Black on that day, " Mathews said. Caps piled up 331 for six.

The loss to New Zealand also saw

"They're a very dangerous team. You can't take them lightly because they can upset a team, and they've got nothing to lose," the captain said.

Afghanistan seamer Mirwais Ashraf, who took two for 32 in the defeat by Bangladesh, admitted Wednesday's had been a brutal introduction to World Cup cricket and that they had been punished for basic errors.

Their naiveté was illustrated in the third over when Bangladesh opener Tamim Iqbal edged a ball from Hamid Hassan and was caught behind.

"We are new in this big event," said Mirwais. "It was a little bit disappointing, that decision," said the 26-year-old.






