Gold smuggling has gone up remarkably of late. Big haul of the most-sought-after metal makes headline all too frequently. But most of the smuggled gold enters and exits the country quite safely. The Daily Star in its 3-part extensive reports tries to shed some light on the trans-border crime in which Bangladesh has become a transit destination for international smuggling syndicates.

Into the cobweb of gold rackets


It is like a cobweb -- extremely complex and intricately designed. The way gold is smuggled in from abroad is so ingeniously planned that it often outclasses Hollywood crime thrillers.

A consignment changes several hands in its journey from the source to the destination, but there are stages when a carrier doesn't even know who takes over from him. So, even if someone is caught with a shipment, most of the time it's impossible to trace back to the gang leaders.

To get the smuggled gold through the airport security and to its destination, the smuggling syndicates

collude with unscrupulous staff of Biman Bangladesh Airlines, Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (Caab) and intelligence and law enforcement agencies.

The extent of complicity of the government agencies is mind-boggling; so much so that the smuggling syndicates provide carriers with special identity cards which, upon being produced, help them avoid SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

Lions floor miserable Tigers

The Tigers turned up at the iconic Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG) for the first time to make a statement against the Lankan Lions yesterday. The mood in the

Bangladesh camp ahead of the World Cup fixture was that it could be a stage where the Tigers would look to prey on the Lions.

But after a nearly eight-hour bout it was the Tigers who were immediately taken to the treatment table with serious injuries after being subjected to severe assault from two Lions -- Tillakaratne Dilshan (161) and Kumar Sangakkara (105). The left-right combination produced an imperious 210 runs for the unbroken second wicket in an imposing Sri Lanka total of 332 for 1.

On a day when World Cup debutants Afghanistan created small piece of history by defeating fellow Associate members Scotland by one wicket in a thriller, nothing went right for

the Tigers. UN chief worried at heightened tensions

UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon remains "very concerned" over heightened tensions and continued violence in Bangladesh, and has renewed his appeal to all political leaders for finding a peaceful solution to the ongoing crisis. On the arrest warrants

against BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia, UN chief's spokesman Stéphane Dujarric said, "We are obviously aware of the arrest warrant that was issued against the leader of the BNP. The secretary general remains very concerned."

Dujarric made the statement in reply to a question at a daily press briefing at the UN headquarters in New York early yesterday. SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

Blogger Avijit Roy hacked to death

Unidentified assailants killed writer and blogger Avijit Roy and badly wounded his wife Rafida Ahmed Banna on Dhaka University campus last night after the couple came out of the Ekushey Boi Mela.

The incident happened around 8:45pm on the footpath along Suhrawardy Udyan near TSC.

Two attackers hit Avijit, 42, with machetes from behind making gaping holes in his head. They also hacked his wife when she tried to save him. Banna, 40, suffered injuries in the head and lost a finger, said Sirajul Islam, officer-incharge of Shahbagh Police Station. The couple were taken to Dhaka Medical College

Hospital where Avijit died around 10:20pm. Banna, herself a writer and blogger, is being treated there in a critical condi-

The OC said they recovered two bloody machetes and a bag from the spot, and were working to identify the killers. Witnesses said law enforcers and people were around

when the attack took place, but no one came forward to resist or catch the attackers even as Banna screamed for help. Avijit, son of Ajay Roy who taught physics at Dhaka

University, used to work in the US as a software engineer. He had been threatened many times by Islamist fundamentalists, said family members and fellow bloggers.

Things may not seem that bad in the capital, but elsewhere the almost two-month-long blockade coupled with

frequent hartal has hit every aspect of people's lives very hard. With inter-district communications snapped,

businesses have come to a near-halt, education is in tatters, farmers are counting heavy losses and people

venture out of their homes in constant panic. In this series, we look at how the blockade and shutdowns are


