### Parties unwilling to resolve crisis thru' dialogue

Observe European Parliament members, voice concern over situation in Bangladesh

A number of European Parliament (EP) members yesterday voiced concern over the escalation of political tension in Bangladesh, saying they do not see any willingness among the major political parties to reach a "compromise" and resolve the crisis through "dialogue".


Describing their discussions with stakeholders in Bangladesh, they said they did not see any scope of any compromise and did not even see any window of compromise, according to a video uploaded on the EP website on the discussions.

The observations were made while discussing the feedback from the EP Subcommittee on Human Rights mission in Brussels that recently visited Bangladesh. A three-member delegation of the Sub-committee on

Human Rights of the European Parliament, led by Cristian Dan Preda, visited Bangladesh from February 16-20. The EP members said everybody in Bangladesh's politi-

cal arena was on a very rigid stance.

## 3 'robbers' killed in 'gunfight' with Rab

Three alleged robbers were killed in a "gunfight" with Rapid Action Battalion in the Sharankhola range of the Sundarbans under Bagerhat district yesterday.

Two of the dead were Saddam Mollah, 27, son of Shona Mollah from Barguna's Patharghata upazila, and Sohel, 25, son of Mohammad Mostafa Member from the same area. The third victim, aged between 25 and 30, could not be identified immedi-

The three were members of a local rob-

bery gang known as Sagar-Saikat Bahini, said Rab officials.

With them, 41 people have so far been killed in "shootouts" with law enforcers since the BNP-led 20-party alliance enforced an indefinite countrywide blockade on January 6, according to The Daily Star reports.

Lt Col Faridul Alam, commanding officer of Rab-8, said they had information that some members of Sagar-Saikat Bahini had set up a den at Katleswar Khal, locally known as Katlar Khal, under the SEE PAGE 10 COL 3

### No trace of Jubo Dal leader for two weeks

The wife of a Jubo Dal leader, whose whereabouts remain unknown for two weeks, has made an emotional plea for her husband's safe return.

Noor Alam, general secretary of the city's Pallabi thana unit of Jubo Dal, was picked up by some plainclothes men two weeks ago, his wife Rina Alam claimed yesterday.

"I want my husband back. Please do not make me widow and my children orphans," a sobbing Rina told a press conference in Dhaka Reporters' Unity.

Anxiety and uncertainty have gripped Noor's family after they had heard about the recovery of some bullethit bodies and shootout incidents that left several people having political affiliation dead in recent days.

Fearing a miserable fate of Noor, Rina sought the prime minister's intervention in finding out her husband.


