Rowdy protest over killing of student

Aggrieved students of Sher-e-Bangla Agricultural University in the capital yesterday vandalised at least 30 vehicles after a fellow student was killed in a road accident near the university.

The dead, Ali Ahmed Alif, 20, was a first year student at faculty of agriculture. Hailing from Bancharampur of Bramhanbaria, he used to live in the capital's Bhatara area. A bus hit Alif from behind soon

after he got down from it on Agargaon Notun Rasta around 8:45am, Abdul Quayum, officer-in-charge of Sher-e-Bangla Nagar Police Station, told The Daily Star. Critically injured Alif was taken to Pangu hospital where

on-duty doctors declared him dead. As the news spread on the campus, around 200-250

students took to the streets with sticks and brickbats around 11:30am, said witnesses.

They then vandalised the vehicles on Mirpur road and another road near passport office at Agargoan. The body of Alif was sent to his village home in Bancharampur after his namaz-e-janaza was held on the

Detectives yesterday arrested a former journalist of private channel Ekushey Television from the capital's Shahbagh in a sedition case.



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MONITORING FARMLAND

Drones used for first time in Bangladesh

For the first time in the country, agriculturalists have started using drones to monitor farmlands in the southern districts of Barisal and Patuakhali.

The radio-controlled unmanned aerial vehicles or UAVs, equipped with a set of high-end cameras, take high resolution photos of the soil and crops, said Dr Ziauddin Ahmed, geographic information systems and remote sensing scientist of International Maize and Wheat Improvement Centre (CIMMYT).

"Using the images taken by the octocopters, scientists can rapidly assess the condition of crops on a large scale without going through the tedious and time-consuming manual sampling," he said.

"Issues like crop growth, nutrient deficiency and water abundance, disease attacks and insect infestation

2 Pakistanis arrested

Police in Saudi Arabia has arrested two Pakistani nationals in Riyadh on Monday allegedly for murdering two Bangladeshis and two Indians.

Asad Jan, 24, and Adam Khan, 22, have allegedly confessed to the killings after being arrested by the Directorate of Intelligence and Investigation in the Saudi capital, reported Saudi Gazette.

The murdered Bangladeshis were taxi drivers, in their 30s and 40s, it added.

"We have noticed the report in the newspaper. We don't have available information about the Bangladeshi victims. But we are working with the Saudi police in this regard," Sarwar Alam, counselor at the Labour Wing of Bangladesh embassy in Riyadh told The Daily Star over phone yesterday.

The killers said they lured their first victim, an Indian, to a deserted area where he was choked and later stabbed. They said they killed the Indian man for sleeping with a Sri Lankan woman, the ex-girlfriend of one of the murderers, according to the Saudi Gazette report.

They dumped the body behind a warehouse and parked the victim's car behind a shopping centre in Riyadh's Al-Foutah District.

Donations to Islamic State jihadists have dramatically declined in the wake of brutal executions by the group that have shocked public opinion in the Middle East, the chief of US intelligence has said.

"I think there is change afoot in the Mideast," said James Clapper, director of national intelligence, referring to perceptions of the ISIS group in the region.

"It's not going to occur overnight. But I think these brutalities, publicized brutalities by ISIL (ISIS), beheadings, immolation and the like, have really had a galvanizing effect even in the Mideast,"

Clapper said at an event in New York organized by the Council on Foreign Relations on Monday.

As a result, donations to the extremists in Islamic countries were dropping off, according to Clapper. "There's been a big decline," he said.

But he added that private donations accounted for "less than one percent" of the group's income, with most of its revenue coming from bank robberies, extortion and oil smuggling in areas under ISIS control.
