Kohli, problem go hand in hand

Virat Kohli has delighted Indian fans with his exploits in the middle but reports of an ugly spat with a journalist at the World Cup will only enhance his reputation within the press corps of being volatile and tetchy.

As the team's media manager moved quickly to limit the damage of an embarrassing encounter involving India's Test skipper, a contradictory view of events in Perth was emerging from the nation's cricket journalists.

The incident took place at the Murdoch Oval, where India were training ahead of Friday's Pool B match against the West Indies at the WACA.

After finishing his net session, the 26-year-old batsman started swearing at an Indian national daily reporter over a story about the cricketer's private life, according to reports from journalists covering the World Cup.


Kohli, currently India's best batsman across all formats, later realised it was a case of mistaken identity and apologised to the target of his abuse through another journalist.

"There was a misunderstanding and no abusive language was used, Virat has spoken to the concerned gentlemen immediately and that ends the matter," the team's media manager RN Baba said in a statement on Wednesday.

In a column published in the Hindustan Times, the journalist subjected to Kohli's tirade said he was still in "shock".

"Go and tell him that he is an international player and he should learn how to behave," Jasvinder Sidhu told the intermediary to inform Kohli after receiving the apology.

"How can he abuse and intimidate someone?"

Oz break records in Afghan rout

Australia hit the highest World Cup score in tournament history on Wednesday as they thrashed Afghanistan by a record 275 runs, a result which was also the greatest winning margin in tournament history.

The home team made 417-6 at the WACA led by opener David Warner's 178-run blitz, his fourth one-day international century and his country's highest individual World Cup score as the four-time champions went past the previous best of 413-5 made by India against Bermuda in 2007.

It was the third 400-plus total at this World Cup after South Africa twice went through the barrier.

In reply, Afghanistan could manage just 142 from 37.3 overs, although Nawroz Mangal, who top-scored with 33, gave their smattering of fans at the ground something to cheer about when he hit Mitchell Marsh for successive sixes.

Johnson did much of the damage to claim 4-22 from 7.3 overs. Fellow left-armer

Mitchell Starc continued his amazing vein of World Cup form with 2-18 and has 10 wickets so far at just 9.3 runs apiece.

Australia were sent in to bat and the decision was greeted by a chorus of cheers from the crowd.

There was a surprise at the toss, with experienced all-rounder Shane Watson dropped to allow James Faulkner to return after a side strain, but the onslaught that followed was extremely predictable. Warner led the way and accelerated markedly after reaching three figures from 92 balls.

Dropped on 114, the left-hander seemed set to compound Watson's misery by passing his Australian ODI record of 185 not out against Bangladesh in Dhaka in 2011 only to sky a delivery to mid-on from the bowling of Shapoor Zadran (2-89).

Australia face Sri Lanka at the SCG in their next match on Sunday, while things don't get any easier for Afghanistan as they face unbeaten New Zealand on the same day at Napier in a bid to add to their lone win against Scotland.

Mark feels for Pakistan Clarke awaits an ODI triple ton

Former opener Mark Richardson, part of the New Zealand squad which abandoned their tour of Pakistan after a bomb blast in 2002, said Wednesday he felt sorry that the country has become a cricket no-go zone.

New Zealand flew back home at the start of the second and final Test in Karachi on May 8, 2002, after a blast close to their hotel killed 13 French naval staff.

"The over-riding memories are sad ones when the bomb went off in Karachi on the morning of the game," Richardson, 43, told AFP.

"We had security concerns but we had started very comfortably. We had visited a fast food restaurant in Karachi and we were feeling very comfortable and then 'kaboom' and it was frightening and unfortunately we were on the plane back home later that day.

"It was a sad end," remembered Richardson, who played 43 Tests and four one-day internationals.

"We felt for our hosts, it wasn't like a daily occurence. They were as shocked and as freaked out as we were. You feel for Pakistan."

Richardson remembered the destruction cricketing nation.

and the panic the bomb caused.

"It was very dusty, the glass doors in my room caved in. Luckily I was in the bathroom and I had another wall protecting me so I didn't get hurt by glass. There was damage to the hotel even though we were some way away from the blast. People lost their lives which was tragic.

"There was shrapnel flying over our hotel from 100-150 metres, the power of the blast was frightening. Our bus was due to go in about five minutes and had the blast been five minutes later, our bus would have gone straight through that zone. We were lucky with the timing."

That was the beginning of the end for international cricket in Pakistan as security in the country deteriorated.

Tuesday marked the sixth anniversary of the militant attacks on the Sri Lankan team bus, which killed eight people and left seven Sri Lankan players injured.

Those brazen attacks suspended all international cricket in Pakistan, forcing the national team to play their home games in the United Arab Emirates.

The staple of the National Cricket League so far has been the barrage of centuries that have been hit everyday. Whether it was Rony Talukder notching up one century after another or Alok Kapali's double-ton, an illustrious batting display was almost guaranteed every single day. Yesterday however, the winds shifted direction.

As rain poured across four venues, the dampness was evident, even in the batsmen's performances. Barisal started their innings against Rajshahi at the BKSP on 59 for two. Al-Amin was the highlight, blasting his way to a run-a-ball 67, smashing 11 fours and a six after Mosaddek Hossain added 88. Barisal ended the day at 338 for seven, with three players reaching 50.

At Fatullah, chasing Sylhet's mammoth total of 507 that prospered on Kapali's unbeaten 211, Chittagong stumbled after resuming the third day on 45 for one. None of their players could make any noticeable contributions as they limped to 157 for six at the end of the day with a

follow-on looming.

Away at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium, Rangpur began the day on 231-5 but managed to add only 70 runs before being bowled out by Dhaka. Dhaka's openers Rony Talukder and Abul Mazid, who scored tons of runs in the first few rounds, failed again after no show in the first innings. Mazid departed for 11 before Rony Talukder was lbw on 21. Dhaka were 63-2 stumps, a lead of 92 runs going into the fourth and final day today.




