POWER TRADE WITH INDIA

Bangladesh eyes 2,000MW more by 2018

Pushes for long-term regional electricity exchange plan involving 4 countries

Bangladesh is negotiating with India to get at least 2,000 megawatts more electricity by 2018.


It hopes to get at least 1,500MW -- half of Dhaka's demand -- from Rangia Raota of Assam and 500MW from Baharampur of West Bengal, said diplomatic and the Power Division sources.

The country is currently importing around 500MW of power from Baharampur through Bheramara. It is also set to get 100MW this year from the Palatana power plant in northeastern Indian state of Tripura. India was allowed free transit and transshipment facilities to build the Palatana plant.

Last year, Bangladesh agreed to allow India a transmission of 7,000MW of power from Rangia Raota of Assam to Borakpur in Bihar through Barapukuria in Dinajpur. For the transmission, India will pay wheeling charge.

Dhaka has proposed that Delhi sell it 2,000MW electricity from the Rangia Raota project. India has so far agreed to sell 1,000MW.

Indian Energy Exchange (IEX) has already sent its proposal to the Central Electric Authority of India for approval to open the cross-border trade of electricity, according to diplomatic sources.

The IEX, an automated power trading exchange, plans to trade 120MW with Bhutan and 50MW each with Bangladesh and Nepal.

This four-nation power trading would expedite the implementation of the Saarc Framework Agreement for Energy Cooperation, signed in Kathmandu on November 27 last year.

BGB man injured as traffickers open fire; detainees pushed back to Myanmar

Border Guard Bangladesh members intercepted a convoy of vehicles carrying hundreds of Rohingya intruders in Ukhiya of Cox's Bazar and detained 108 of them.

A subedar of the BGB was shot by the alleged human traffickers during the incident. He was flown to the Combined Military Hospital in Dhaka where doctors said he was out of danger.

The Rohingya detainees were later pushed back to Myanmar, according to BGB sources.

Cox's Bazar BGB Sector Commander Col Khaliquzzaman said the border guards were raiding places in the area to catch human traffickers and intruders.

Acting on a tip-off, a six-member BGB patrol team setup a roadblock at Balukhali Bridge in Panbazar on Cox's Bazar-Teknaf highway around 9:00am and half an hour

later they stopped a convoy of eight vehicles, locally known as Chander Gari.

Rohingyas were crammed in and on the vehicles. But the team soon found itself sur-

rounded by a crowd of suspected traffickers and locals, who tried to secure an escape for the convoy. This prompted the team to call in reinforcements, he said.

"A bullet came whizzing from the crowd and hit Subedar Fazlul Haque in the shoulder as soon as he reached the scene leading his six-man reinforcement team," said Khaliquzzaman.

The BGB men then fired four shots in the air to disperse the crowd but by the time they had brought the situation under control around 11:00am, six of the vehicles had left the scene with their passengers.

27kg gold seized from North Korean diplomat at airport

In a rare instance, a North Korean diplomat has been caught with 27kg gold worth about Tk 14 core at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport in Dhaka.

Customs officials said the smuggling of gold, mainly from Dubai, has increased in recent months, but this was the first instance of a diplomat being held in such scam.

According to customs and airport security authorities, First Secretary (Commercial and Economic Affairs) Son Young Nam was detained after he landed on a Singapore Airlines flight around 11:00pm Thursday. The gold he was carrying in his handbag was confiscated. The diplomat was released the next day at 2:00pm under the Vienna

Convention after he and his embassy officials gave a written confessional statement.

Young Nam admitted in the statement that he had abused his diplomatic privileges.

Foreign ministry officials said Article 29 of Vienna Convention of Diplomatic Relations states that "diplomats must not be liable to any form of arrest or detention. They are immune from civil or criminal prosecution."

But, they said, the government will take action against the North Korean first secretary as a serious crime like gold smuggling cannot be covered by diplomatic immunity.

Target 6 BNP leaders' houses; no one hurt

India book last 8 spot

Beat Windies by 4 wickets in low-scoring affair

Defending champions India survived a scare to beat the West Indies by four wickets at Perth's WACA Ground on Friday to remain unbeaten in the World Cup and so secure a place in the quarterfinals.

Set a modest 183 to win by the West Indies in the Pool B match, the Indians made hard work of the run chase before captain Mahendra Singh Doni steered them home.

Dhoni's calm 45 not out enabled India to make it four wins from four after they looked in real trouble at 134 for

The skipper and Ravi Ashwin (16 not out) put on an unbeaten 51 for the seventh wicket, as the unlikely West Indian challenge finally wilted.

Victory kept India on target to claim top spot in the pool, while the West Indies' last eight hopes are no longer entirely

in their own hands after two wins from five matches. "It was a difficult wicket, with movement and bounce early on. There was a bit of swing for their fast bowlers but I don't think it misbehaved as much as it did in the first 10

overs of the first innings," said Dhoni. "Our bowlers stuck to their line and lengths. A lot of

batsmen got out to short-pitched balls." West Indies skipper Jason Holder said he had no regrets

about batting first. "I always thought the wicket was going to be a good one. The batsmen did not stick around long enough. We didn't apply ourselves well enough and never caught up in the

game," he said. On a lively pitch that offered pace, bounce and movement, the Indians were clearly unsettled by a short-pitched

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
