#### Charities stop funding UK rights group linked to 'Jihadi John'

Two charities have stopped funding a rights group in contact with the man thought to be Islamic State group executioner "Jihadi John" before he left for Syria, Britain's charities regulator has said.

Rights group Cage describes its work as supporting people arrested or raided as a result of the "war on terror" following the 9/11 attacks in It worked with Mohammed

Emwazi for over two years and, when he was identified by the Washington Post as "Jihadi John" last month, its research director Asim Qureshi described him as a "beautiful young man" and blamed British intelligence for radicalising him.

"Bangladesh's dysfunctional politics will weigh heavily on the country's business environment in 2015, it says.

There is little scope for a peaceful resolution of the crisis in the coming months unless the government stops or delays legal proceedings against BNP chief Khaleda Zia whose putative arrest will almost certainly trigger another intense round of violent

unrest by BNP supporters across the country, the report observes. Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will not accept the BNP's key demand to step down as "the AL maintains that the BNP forfeited its chance to participate in the political process by boy-

cotting the elections.' "The only conceivable trigger for reducing political tensions and levels of unrest is for the government to curb its zeal to prosecute Zia."

The report says that in addition to "personality clashes", the ideological differences over political Islam will limit the scope for political reconciliation even in the long term.

International pressure on Bangladesh is not likely to play any important role in reducing tensions and even if the crisis deepens the army is unlikely to intervene, mentions the report.

It also points out that "Bangladesh's instability is causing concern among its neighbours as well as donor nations, all of whom have urged the various stakeholders to resolve their differences peacefully."

According to the report, transport blockades are, in particular, likely to continue for the foreseeable future, along with associated risks of violence.

"Disruptive BNP-led protests pose substantial risks to commercial activity and supply chains, particularly in Dhaka and Chittagong. BNP and Jamaat -led protests and hartals can cause severe disruptions to traffic and commercial activity."

It also warns that security forces may use force to break up demonstrations, posing high human security risks.

"Bangladeshi security forces have been accused by multiple human rights organisations of using excessive force to maintain law and order," it says.

# Syrian warplanes kill leaders of al Qaeda affiliate: source

As many as 13 senior leaders of al-Nusra Front, including the terror group's military commander, were killed in two Syrian airstrikes Thursday, a Middle Eastern security source who was briefed by Syrian intelligence told CNN.

Abu Hammam al Shami was among those killed in the strikes against al-Nusra, al Qaeda's largest affiliate in Syria, the source said. Syria's state news agency SANA also reported al Shami's death. The special operation that took

place in Hobait, in Idlib province, was part of a wider effort by Syrian forces to destroy areas believed to be gathering points for al-Nusra militants around the province, according to SANA. According to a 2014 al-Nusra video,

al Shami joined the group after years of training in Afghanistan and Iraq. Also killed in the northwestern

province of Idlib was a senior Saudi operative in the group, the source said.

There were initial indications that al-Nusra leader Abu Mohammed al

Jolani was wounded in one of the strikes, the source said Thursday. But on Friday, the source told CNN the latest assessment of Syrian intelligence was that al Jolani was not injured The strikes took place in the towns

of Salgin and Hobait, both near the city of Saraqeb in Idlib. One strike targeted a meeting of senior al-Nusra Front leaders; the other was on a home being used as a base, the source said.

A spokesman for the U.S.-led coalition that is hitting ISIS targets in Syria said its planes weren't involved. "Within the last 24 hours, we have

not conducted any airstrikes within 200 miles of the province of Idlib," the spokesman said earlier Thursday.

Al Shami was featured in a March 2014 video released by al-Nusra Front, in which he discussed his failed attempt to mediate between his militants and ISIS after rising tensions between the groups.

The video included a biography by the group of al Shami, which was translated by the Long War Journal.

The ministry prepared a draft of Child Marriage Restraint Act-2014 and sent it to the law ministry for vetting with the prime minister's advice. The move drew huge criticism at

home and abroad with a number of national and international rights bodies asking the government not to marriage. lower the marriageable age for girls.

According to the latest report of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), the rate of child marriage in Bangladesh is around 66 percent.

NHRC Chairman Prof Mizanur Rahman at a programme in the capital said, "On behalf of the National Human Rights Commission, we earlier informed the government in writing that anything that allows girls to be married off before 18 is not acceptable Salma Ali, executive director of

Bangladesh National Woman Lawyers' Association (BNWLA), said, "This [the draft act] is not acceptable at all. We will not accept it." She said the government was trying

to lower the marriageable age to show the international community that Bangladesh the percentage of child marriage is low, which was "actually an eyewash". The act will also contradict several

laws and international conventions which consider someone below 18 as a child and to which Bangladesh is a signatory, she pointed out. Meher Afroz Chumki said the new

act was going to incorporate the spe-

In his keynote paper, Prof Emeritus Zillur Rahman Khan of the University of Wisconsin, USA, proposed proportional representation in parliament where allocation of parliamentary seats would reflect the percentage of votes earned by contesting political parties in the general election.

He suggested that the parliament have two houses, with one checking any excesses of the other. Considering the size of Bangladesh's population, he suggested increasing the parliamentary seats to 500 in the lower house and

100 in his proposed upper house. Zillur Rahman, also chairman, RC 37, International Political Science Association, floated the idea of holding the next general elections under an elected interim government composed of elected leaders from two largest parties with their top leaders serving as co-chairs.

Akbar Ali Khan, former adviser to a caretaker government, said elections under the present arrangements were unlikely to be fair, with election officials getting involved in corruption.

He supported Prof Zillur's idea of proportional representation in parliament and a bicameral legislature.

"The political parties are very divisive and exchange rebukes. If the parliament is representational, there will be exchanges between them," Akbar Ali Khan said.

He also suggested enhancing the power of the president, and referendum on nationally important issues. "President's power in our country is

less than that of a section officer. A section officer can write a note against a government policy and his or her higher officials can correct it. But, there is no provision in the constitution for the president to have a different opinion," he said.

Former chief election commissioner ATM Shamsul Huda said under the present system, a political party might have brute majority in parlia-

ment by having marginally higher votes, which was quite unacceptable. Such anomalies could be avoided by proportional representation sys-

tem, Huda said, stressing on reforms to

the Election Commission, Public Service Commission, Anti-Corruption Commission, the judiciary, police and bureaucracy to institutionalise democratic values.

BNP Chairperson's Adviser Enam Ahmed Chowdhury said a dialogue between the government and the opposition political parties was a necessity to find solutions to the present political problem.

"Repression on the opposition cannot bring any solution," he said.

Economist M Syeduzzaman suggested stronger local government system and establishing Ombudsman to hold accountable the bureaucracy and the police.

Bangladesh Bank's former governor Farashuddin observed that the reforms could not be made overnight and that fixing the existing system first would be wise. Gradual and needful reforms could be made, he said.

Political scientist Prof Rounaq Jahan said there are many good laws in Bangladesh but those are not being implemented.

Before considering the issues of referendum and sharing of power between the president and the prime minister, it was important to investigate the factors behind the culture of impunity, she said.

She also said she was worried over the political future of Bangladesh, especially since the present generation thinks this situation to be normal. Political science professor Ataur

Rahman of Dhaka University noted that Bangladesh would become a conflicted society if the major political parties kept on locking horns the way they were doing. PRI Executive Director Ahsan H

Mansur, Shujan Secretary Badiul Alam Majumder, former commerce secretary Sohel Chowdhury, daily Ittefaq acting editor Tasmima Hossain also spoke at the discussion moderated by Brac University Pro Emeritus Manzoor Ahmed.

## Iran's role worries anti-ISIS coalition: US general

The US military's top officer said Friday Iran is bolstering the firepower of Shiite militias in Iraq but it remains unclear if Tehran is a help or a hindrance to the fight against Islamic State jihadists. General Martin Dempsey, speaking

to reporters aboard his plane en route to Bahrain and Iraq, said he would raise his concerns about Iran's influence in talks with Iraq's leaders --days after Baghdad launched a largescale operation to recapture Tikrit from the Islamic State group. The Shiite militias, armed and

advised by Iran, are playing a major role in the Tikrit offensive. But the US-led coalition -- which

has no dealings with the Shiite fighters -- has been markedly absent from the operation and allies fear Iran's activity could aggravate sectarian tensions. Dempsey said US-led air strikes in recent months to the north near Baiji

heralded in 2007 but new research last year cast doubt on the claims, saying data used to find it was probably just misinterpreted signals from stars.

Astronomers had used a spectrometer to spot the planet, which measures "wobbles" in the wavelength of light emitted by a star caused as a planet orbits it. GJ 581d was said to be a super-Earth

with a mass seven times that of our own planet orbiting a red dwarf star that could also support up to four other planets. It was believed to be in the habitable "Goldilocks zone" in its solar

system, where it is neither too hot nor too cold for liquid water to exist and support life on the surface. Researchers revisiting the evidence claimed the body was actually just "stellar activity masquerading as planets" and its existence was widely dis-

missed without further questioning. But now astronomers from Queen Mary University, in London, and the University of Hertfordshire have claimed the statistical techniques used to discount GJ 581d is "inadequate" for planets of its small size.

Dr Guillem Anglada-Escudé, lead author of the paper published in Science, said: "The existence (or not) of GJ 581d is significant because it was the first Earth-like planet discovered in the 'Goldilocks'-zone around another star and it is a benchmark case for the Doppler technique. "There are always discussions

among scientists about the ways we interpret data but I'm confident that GJ

581d has been in orbit around (its star) Gliese 581 all along."
