





Lucky Enam is powerful figure of Bangladeshi theatre. In a career spanning over four decades, she has enriched the stage with their artistic talents and expertise. The actordirector spoke with this correspondent on International Women's Day. Excerpts:

What is your take on International Women's Day? Lucky Enam: Women have been struggling for ages to establish their equal rights in the society. This day reminds women about their struggles and encourages us to move forward with dignity. Every day is a women's day; women have made substantial contribution in nearly every sphere of society.

As an artiste, how do you celebrate womanhood? Lucky Enam: I would rather say I am an individual instead of calling myself a woman. I don't let gender define my roles in society. As a human being, I have some responsibilities for fellow humans, and I am trying to do that. I am trying to raise awareness among the society on this issue through theatre: I run the Nagorik Natyangan Institute of Drama where I teach youngsters the art of theatre, which I think can build a society.

How do you think women of Bangladesh are doing in society?

Lucky Enam: Women are shining in every sector. Education has played in important role in their development, and that's why they are now working hand in hand with men. But I think awareness about their rights is also important. Women have to work collectively to establish their equal rights.

Celebrating womanhood through art

In conversation with Arno Kamolika

Arno Kamolika is an expatriate Bangladeshi classical dancer (based in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada) who has taken Bharatnatyam as her forte. An alum-

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nus of BUET (Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology), she further studied History of Art and Architecture at University of British Columbia and worked there as a Research Assistant. In a recent interview with The Daily Star, Arno shared her views on International Women's Day.

How do you celebrate freedom and womanhood in your artistic perseverance?

Arno: As a Bharatanatyam dancer, celebrating womanhood has been an essential part of my artistic journey. In Indian classical dance, we dancers often tell a story from a Nayika's (heroine) perspective. The protagonist is always in a conversation with another being, whether it is her beloved, child, friend or a divine being. The storytelling brings forward her happiness, pathos, love, jealousy, struggle, in other words, the rasa or different states of mind that she experiences in an otherwise patriarchal

society. Classical dance becomes a language for the woman who has always been taught to be silent about expressing her feelings in this male dominated world, thus it also becomes a tool for her freedom.

How is International Women's Day significant to you as a classical dancer?

Arno: In our society, women are still somewhat invisible in a number of ways. Recognising a day to acknowledge their contribution to the society (instead of indulging into cheap consumerism) might help to increase the voice and visibility of marginalised women, and that will surely help women from all professions.

Tell us about the world you aspire

Arno: I dream of a world that allows everyone to hold their unique identities, and to exercise their freedom of expressions and preferences; a world where a woman will no more need to prove how strong she is and a man won't fear of being judged before expressing his vulnerability; a world that accommodates exploration of seemingly opposing ideas and views without any urge to react violently.

"Confidence is key" Cacoly

Shahneoyaj Cacoly is a talented filmmaker of the time. Her directorial debut "Uttarer Sur" earned her the National Film Awards. The director spoke to The Daily Star, on the International Women's Day and her new film.

As a female filmmaker, you face any obstacle at your work-place? Shahneoyaj Cacoly: Not at all although I'm the only woman in my unit. I treat work as just a work; haven't really faced any hurdles

specific to my gender. If you have confidence, your gender cannot come in

way of your progress. What do you think of International Women's Day?

Shahneoyaj Cacoly: Women are now moving forward towards advancement amid a lot of barriers. But they are growing in numbers. We need a strong unity to achieve equal rights for women, which is rarely seen in our society. I think it's a little sad that there has to be a special day when women are celebrated, but the rest of the year they are not remembered.

When is your new film, "Nodijon", going to the cinemas? Shahneoyaj Cacoly: In April; I'm thinking Pahela Boishakh (the first day of Bangla New Year). It is based on the life of a boatman; divorce and other issues related to Muslim marriage also come up in it. It recently had its international premiere at the Bangalore Film Festival. Its storyline was

very well received by the jury board there. What's your plan with film direction?

Shahneoyaj Cacoly: I have a lot of plans, but the question is of implementation. My dream is to make international standard films -- on urban culture and life. I also want to make films on the life and love stories of youngsters.
