7-MURDER ACCUSED NUR HOSSAIN

Dhaka, Delhi ready for extradition

Bangladesh is waiting for India to fix a date for handing over Nur Hossain, the main accused in the Narayanganj seven-murder case, as all formalities have been completed.

If Nur is handed over to Bangladesh, it would be the first instance in which a suspect is handed over to Bangladesh under

the extradition treaty between the two countries.

The home ministry sent a letter to the Indian external affairs ministry through foreign ministry on March 1 seeking date and time of handing over of Nur Hossain, who was arrested by Kolkata police for intruding into India, sources in the home ministry said.

Talking to The Daily Star, Mozammel Haque Khan, senior secretary to the home ministry, said the fixing of the date depended on India.

Kamaruzzaman seeks time

Condemned war criminal Muhammad Kamaruzzaman yesterday filed a petition with the Supreme Court seeking a four-week adjournment of hearing on his review petition against its verdict that upheld his death penalty.

The petition was submitted to the SC around 3:30pm on ground that Kamaruzzaman's principal counsel Khandker Mahbub Hossain was "unable to conduct the hearing of the review petition due to unavoidable circumstances and personal difficulties", defence lawyer Shishir Manir told The Daily Star.

Man killed jumping off a bus amid bomb blasts; another petrol bomb victim dies

Panicked by a crude bomb attack on a bus, a man jumped to his death from the roof of the moving vehicle in Joypurhat yesterday.

Another victim of a petrol bomb attack died at Dhaka Medical College Hospital yesterday, raising the death toll of the blockade violence to 84, which began on January 6.

In Chittagong, Detective Branch of Police in a drive held Nayeb-e-Ameer of Jamaat city unit Ahsanullah Chowdhury early yesterday.

Ujjal, 30, son of Bhupen Chandra of

Chitrapara in Joypurhat town, was going to Bogra from Joypurhat on the roof of the bus, reports our correspondent in Dinajpur.

When the bus reached Karimpur on Joypurhat-Bogra highway, some six people on two motorbikes exploded two crude bombs aiming at the bus.

Ujjal jumped off the bus and received severe head injuries.

Locals rushed him to Joypurhat Modern Hospital where he died around 7.00pm yesterday, police said.



A Dhaka court on March 18 will decide whether it will frame charges against the eight accused in connection with the killing of blogger Ahmed Rajib Haider in February 2013.

Mufti Jasimuddin Rahmani, chief of emerging militant group Ansarullah Bangla Team, and seven students of North South University are among the accused.

After hearing arguments from both the defence and the prosecution yesterday, Judge Ruhul Amin of the Third Additional Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court of Dhaka fixed the date for passing an order on the issue.

Advocate Mosharraf Hossain Kajol and four more lawyers placed their arguments for discharging their clients from the charges while the prosecution for framing charges against all the accused. Almost a year after Rajib
