Khaleda on current political standoff; says she is aware of public sufferings but anti-govt movement to continue

Appearing before the media for the first time since January 19, BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia yesterday said the ongoing antigovernment movement will continue until it reaches a "logical conclusion".

Saying that she is aware of people's sufferings due to blockade and hartal, Khaleda urged the countrymen to put up with this for the time being in the interest of the nation.

Reading out a statement to journalists at her Gulshan office, where she has been staying since January 3, the BNP chief reiterated that the present political crisis can be overcome only through an election under a non-party caretaker administration. She expressed the view also in her January 19 press conference.

BNP chief Khaleda Zia has resorted to lies in an attempt to divert people's attention from the arson deaths and to shift the blame on the government, said the Awami League in an instant reaction to Khaleda's speech yesterday.

The ruling party demanded that Khaleda disclose when and where Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina promised to hold a participatory elections dissolving parliament after January 5, 2014 elections, which Khaleda claimed in her speech.

Linked to several Facebook pages run by fanatics; family alleges he was picked up 5 days ago

Detectives have arrested KM Ziauddin Fahad, the alleged editorial administrator of Basherkella, a Facebook page that staunchly supports war criminals, propagates religious extremism and often attacks the state machineries through its posts.

Fahad has been described by the Detective Branch of police as the chief coordinator of the publicity

wing of Islami Chhatra Shibir, student wing of Jamaat-e-Islami that vehemently opposed the liberation of Bangladesh in 1971. A number of Jamaat top-notches are currently on death row or facing different terms of imprisonment for their crimes during the Liberation War.

Joint Commissioner (DB) Monirul Islam of Dhaka Metropolitan Police said Fahad had been arrested from his sister's house at Comilla Cadet College at 4:30pm on

Thursday. A laptop and two cell phones were seized from his possession.

Fahad had been using different social media platforms to spread propaganda against the country's VIPs and renowned personalities, and also against the police, the Border Guard Bangladesh, the Rapid Action Battalion and the international war crimes tribunals, says a media state-

ment of the DB. According to the statement, Fahad using fake names used to run more than 50 Facebook pages, including Basherkella, Titumirer Basherkella, Basherkella USA, Awami Tribunal, BAKSAL Nipat Jak, I am Bangladeshi, Digital Rupe BAKSAL, BAN Bashkhali News-24, Islami online activist, Tarun Projonmo and Vision 2021.

Two of his most commonly used fake names were Biplob Darshan and Truth

3 hurt in bomb attack on bus

3 policemen injured in blasts during raid

At least three passengers suffered burns when alleged blockaders hurled a patrol bomb on a long-haul bus on the

Dhaka-Aricha highway in Savar early yesterday. The attack was carried out on the very night of the resumption of night coach services across the country after over a month due to the indefinite blockade enforced by the

BNP-led alliance. In Chapainawabganj, at least three policemen and a Shibir activist were injured in a clash between law enforcers

and Shibir men in the town's Shibtala yesterday morning. Injured bus passengers are Sumon Sheikh, 25, Abdur Rahim 50, and Akkas Ali, 70, were undergoing treatment at Dhaka Medical College Hospital and Enam Medical

College Hospital in Savar. Md Abdul Motaleb Mia, officer in-charge of Savar Model Police Station, said criminals hurled a firebomb at the bus of Rajanigandha Paribahan heading for Dhaka from

Rajshahi in Genda of Savar around 2:00am. Firefighters later put out the blaze.

Sumon, who had 13 percent of his body burned, said he got on the bus from Sreepur of Ashulia. When the bus reached Genda area, a patrol bomb shattered a window of the bus and the vehicle was in flames instantly.

"I along with other passengers jumped from the bus
