I get a lot of messages from various female fans about their stories and how they can't play music or sing since their parents don't support them. They seek my advice so that they can break through... it really saddens me when I put myself in their shoes. I really want this situation in Bangladesh to change! Every career track has its own drawbacks, we shouldn't vilify the media as a society like this.

That would be "Dirty Diana", a Michael Jackson cover that I did a few months back. That cover went pretty big. Nagib Hawk did an excellent job with the music and videography of that cover.
