Amu sees business opportunities in India's north-eastern states

There is an enormous scope for expanding Bangladeshi businesses in the north-eastern states of India, said Industries Minister Amir Hossain Amu yesterday.

"The Bangladeshi business community has the capability to invest in and run businesses outside the country," he said.

The minister was addressing the inaugural session of the 10th northeast business summit "Development through Partnership with Asean and Bimstec Countries" held in New Delhi.

Indian Civil Aviation

Minister P Ashok Gajapathi Raju, and Bhutanese Health Minister Lyonpo Tandin Wangchuk, among others, were present at the seminar. Amu said they want to

ensure seamless connectiv-

ity between the regions for

collective prosperity. "We want to facilitate and promote businesses in the Indian region through mutual cooperation and support," he said.

He also talked about facilitating trade through a combined effort of the private and the public sectors.

The minister said as a neighbour of India, Bangladesh presents a large opportunity to improve business in the northeastern states of India which would benefit both the countries economically.

Economic development due to smooth business environment would be possible once the barriers are addressed, he said.

Amu hoped the summit would be able to come up with firm recommendations for mutual cooperation and commitment for promotion of investment, trade facilitation and governance of natural resources and promotion of industrialisation.

"Together as a group, Asean and Bimstec countries will be able to forge strong partnership for the benefit of the two regions," he added.

The minister said as a regional organisation, Bimstec forms a bridge between South and South East Asia and reinforces the relationships among the

countries of the regions. Bangladesh and India share a border 4,096 kilometres long, out of which 2,217 kilometres is with West Bengal and the remaining with northwestern states of India --Assam, Meghalaya, Tripura and Mizoram.

Poor diets cause 1.1 crore annual deaths globally

Consumers International report reveals on eve of World Consumer Rights Day

BSS, Dhaka

Poor diets contribute to over 1.1 crore (11 million) deaths annually around the world and it has now become the number one global risk factor for death, a Consumers International (CI) report stated.

The CI report, launched on the eve of the World Consumer Rights Day (WCRD) 2015, added that unhealthy diets are linked to four of the world's top 10 leading risk factors for death.

The four risk factors are: high blood

pressure, high blood glucose, overweight and obesity, and high cholesterol. "Consumers Rights to Healthy Food" is the theme for this year's

World Consumers Rights Day, which

will be observed today across the globe, including Bangladesh. According to the report, premature illness and disability from dietrelated diseases impoverishes families, hurts productivity and bankrupts health systems. The global economic impact of obesity alone is roughly \$2.0 trillion, or 2.8 per-

cent of global GDP, roughly equiva-

lent to the global impact of smoking or armed violence, war, and

terrorism. Inadequate consumption of fruits and vegetables increases the risk of cardiovascular diseases and some cancers and cause some 1.7 million

deaths a year, the report said. Dietary salt intake is an important determinant of blood pressure level and of overall cardiovascular risk. High blood pressure is the number one risk factor for deaths around the world. High consumption of saturated fat and trans-fats is linked to heart diseases, the primary reason causing death

globally. Apart from rich countries, diet related diseases such as cancer, cardiovascular disease and diabetes are rising faster in developing economies and have killed over eight million people before they turned 60 in low and middle-income countries in

2013. "We need a global transformation in food habit. All consumers should have the right, not only to food but also to healthy food", the CI report said.

and vegetable intake and formulating trade and agricultural policies which will make fruits and vegetables afford-

ods like baking, grilling, broiling, boiling, steaming and frying with little oil to minimise the use of fat and salt.

Breastfeeding and good weaning practice also have been advised for ensuring healthy diets.

The report highly recommended institutional changes towards healthier oil and fat (moving from saturated and trans-fats to unsaturated oil/fats) and reduction of salt content in food.

Campaigns should be launched and relevant changes should be brought in policies to limit marketing and sale of foods high in saturated and trans-fats, salt and sugar and sugary beverages, particularly to children.

WAREHOUSE ROOF COLLAPSE IN MONGLA Rescue ends with death toll at seven


