Even commuters were seen waiting for buses to go to their offices and other destinations in the capital yesterday morning.

Riots as Taliban attack Pak churches

14 killed, dozens wounded

Fourteen people were killed and more than 70 injured when two Taliban suicide bombers attacked churches in Pakistan's Lahore yesterday, sparking mob violence in which two other suspected militants died.

Up to 4,000 Christians later took to the streets of the eastern city, many armed with clubs as they smashed vehicles and attacked a city bus station in a rare show of anger by the beleaguered minority.

The bombings occurred during prayers at two churches located around half a kilometre apart in the city's Youhanabad neighbourhood that is home to more than 100,000 Christians, officials said.

Doctor Mohammad Saeed Sohbin, medical superintendent of the nearby General Hospital, told AFP: "We have received 14 dead bodies and 70 injured," adding that the figure did not include the suspected militants who were lynched or the bombers.

Zahid Pervez, the top health official in Lahore, confirmed the death toll and told reporters that 78 people were wounded in both attacks.

Broken window panes, blood and shoes were scattered across the blast sites.

Police spokeswoman Nabila Ghazanfar said two policemen guarding the churches were among those killed in the SEE PAGE 8 COL 2

Pakistan, Windies claim last spots AFP, Sydney

Pakistan and the West Indies secured the two remaining places in the World Cup quarterfinals on Sunday after coming through must-win matches in the last of the tournament's group games.

Pakistan, the 1992 champions, beat

Ireland by seven wickets in a winner-takes-all clash in Adelaide. Earlier in Pool B, the West Indies saw off the United Arab Emirates by six

wickets in Napier. West Indies' win saw the 1975 and 1979 champions edge out Ireland for a last-eight place on net run-rate.

The quarterfinals begin with Sri Lanka's match against South Africa in Sydney on Wednesday, while defending champions India face Bangladesh in Melbourne on Thursday.

Australia take on Pakistan in Adelaide on Friday and fellow tournament co-hosts New Zealand play the West Indies in Wellington on Saturday.

The Ireland-Pakistan match took place almost eight years to the day since the Irish knocked the Asian giants out of the 2007 World Cup. That defeat for Pakistan in Jamaica was

followed the day after by the death of coach Bob Woolmer. There was no repeat of Ireland's cele-

brated victory as Pakistan posted their fourth straight win of this World Cup, including a victory over highly-fancied South Africa, after starting the tournament with two straight losses.

Sarfraz Ahmed scored his maiden one-day international hundred and Pakistan's first of the tournament as they made 241 for three, chasing 238

to win, with 23 balls to spare. "This was a pressure game," said buoyant Pakistan captain Misbahul Haq.

"Of course we can win the World Cup. We have the momentum. The bowling is doing really well, the batting is beginning to do its part."

10 hurt in clash over eviction

At least six indigenous people and four members of law enforcement agencies were injured yesterday in a clash when indigenous people brought out a procession in protest at the setting up of BGB battalion offices in Babuchhara of Dighinala.

Witnesses said the clash erupted when a peaceful procession brought out by Dighinala Bhumi Rakhha Committee was barricaded by joint forces comprising army, police and ansar personnel.

Top criminal Masud caught in India

Mollah Masud, a top Bangladeshi criminal for whom Interpol issued red notice, has been arrested in India.

The Criminal Investigation Department of West Bengal arrested Masud on February 8 in a case filed with Barrackpore Police Station under Section 14 of Foreigners Act

relating to illegal stay in the country.

"Procedure to bring him back is underway," said a press release of Bangladesh

Police yesterday as Interpol's New Delhi office informed them about the arrest.

Born in Jhalakathi, Masud was the second-in-command of Moghbazar-based "seven star" group led by Subrata Bain. He came to the limelight after several murders in 1992-93.

There are at least eight cases filed against him for murder, possessing illegal firearms and extortion, said Officer-in-Charge Mashiur Rahman of Ramna Police Station.
