To their utter disappointment and surprise though that delivery was deemed a no-ball due to height; and that's when Bangladesh imploded. Sharma shifted to top gear and hit Bangladesh out of the game. Such were the dire straits at that moment that at one point Mashrafe lost his concentration and placed an extra fielder outside the circle; for which he was no-balled.

All these factors just go on to show how crucial that decision was. For starters, that wasn't a no-ball. The ball was clearly dipping down upon impact. A few commentators in the box termed it questionable, but the more aggressive of them—the likes of Shane Warne and VVS Laxman, criticised Aleem Dar's decision.

How an umpire could straightaway lift his arm for a decision that marginal remains a crucial question. The general norm has always been to consult the third-umpire on such occasions. Why that query wasn't sent upstairs is a question that Bangladesh's fans will, in all likelihood, never get an answer to.

Bangladesh thought that they had done something that the teams in the big league do. They thought that they had managed to bring themselves back into the game for a second time after that catch. But after being denied in a ludicrous fashion, they went through the jitters; and could barely rise-up again when they went out to bat next.

So yes, it was Bangladesh's inexperience that led to their eventual downfall; but until the 40th over yesterday they played like any other big team in the circuit. Perhaps what was most painful for Bangladesh's fans; was to witness their team gradually fade away from the match after taking a hit for a mistake that wasn't theirs to repent.

In the absence of Parma chairman Giampietro Manenti, Riccobene and another official Enrico Siciliano represented the club at a scheduled hearing to decide its future.


Manenti and 21 other people were arrested Wednesday on moneylaundering and other charges, police said.

A first-half goal by Ivan Rakitic was enough to see Barcelona end English interest in the Champions League on Wednesday as they beat

Manchester City 1-0 in their last 16 second leg clash for a 3-1 aggregate win and a place in the quarterfinals.

Former Manchester City striker Carlos Tevez scored a double in the night's other game as Juventus pulled off an impressive 3-0 win away at 2013 finalists Borussia Dortmund to win 5-1 on aggregate.

For Tevez it represents quite a turnaround in fortunes in the competition, having gone six seasons without a Champions League goal, he has now scored six this term.

The fan may be fuming for some close calls that went against the Tigers at crucial junctures of the match that included the low full toss that got Rohit out in the deep on 90, only to be ruled out as a 'no ball' by square-leg umpire Aleem Dar; Mahmudullah's dismissal on the fine leg boundary; Mashrafee's confident leg-before appeal against Suresh Raina.

The first one was definitely not above waist-height as Aleem Dar concluded quickly without even consulting the third umpire. And had Ian Gould, the other umpire, ruled Raina out Mashrafee could have won that verdict. Mahmudullah's catch taken by Shikhar Dhawan right on the fine-leg boundary rope was inconclusive in TV replays.

These decisions sparked uproar in the social media but the harsh reality is that lower-ranked teams like Bangladesh have long been living as victims of errant umpiring decisions when they are up against the big names of world cricket.

However, it can hardly blot India's image as the most attractive and aggressive team in this World Cup. They are the deserving victors. They batted well, bowled brilliantly and fielded like hungry hounds.

Now it's time for the Tigers to return home with some pride, the pride of winning against England and pushing New Zealand to the limit in their own den. It's an inexperienced side that crumbled against the mighty Indians under pressure. But the good thing about this team is that it has the ability to overcome adversity. It's tough for the Tigers to produce four to five world-class batsmen soon, but one thing the Tigers can try and achieve is to match the Indian fielding and the sooner the better.

To India, good luck in the semi-final against either hosts Australia or Pakistan. India may prefer Pakistan over Australia (considering their experience in the 2003 World Cup final).
