
## THE GREAT SUMMER **DELIGHT**

The ruling Awami League-blessed mayoral aspirant Annisul Huq, jailed former BNP lawmaker Nasir Uddin Ahmed Pintu and five others yesterday collected nomination papers to contest the Dhaka city corporations polls.

Hug, former president of Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI), took the form from Returning Officer (RO) of Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) Shah Alam at the latter's Agargaon office.

Pintu collected the nomination form through one Rafiqul Islam from RO of Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) Mihir Sarwar Morshed at his Gulistan office.

The polls to the bifurcated Dhaka city corporations and Chittagong City Corporation are scheduled to be held on April 28.

With yesterday's seven mayoral aspination forms for the polls. Besides, 985 councillor aspirants have also collected nomination forms as of yesterday.

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## 7 more mayor Tough time awaits Nasir in CCC polls

Mohiuddin's supporters irked

Disgruntled supporters of ABM Mohiuddin Chowdhury might negatively impact the electioneering of AZM Nasir Uddin, the Awami League-backed Chittagong mayor hopeful.

Former three-time mayor Mohiuddin yesterday said the AL men were disappointed with his departure from the polls race.

He was in a views-exchange meeting of Chittagong north and south district AL with reporters. Nasir was present at the meeting at the city's Institution of Engineers, Bangladesh.

Mohiuddin said the discontent would go away over time and the party men would work unitedly to ensure win for Nasir.

General secretary of city AL, Nasir collected his nomination paper yesterday for the Chittagong City Corporation (CCC) polls slated for April 28.

Local BNP leaders, who have been waiting for the party's decision on contesting the election, said the polls would give the party an opportunity to revamp itself. Party grassroots are also confident that their favourites would come out successful.

Returning from Dhaka on Saturday, Mohiuddin announced that he quit · the polls race and would work to ensure win of Nasir. But several hundred supporters of the ex-mayor gathered in front of his house in Sholoshahar : for two days and demanded he contest the polls.

Followers of Mohiuddin blamed intra-party feud for his defeat in the rants, 22 people have so far collected nomi- · last CCC polls in 2010 when he lost to BNP favourite M Manjur Alam by around 96,000 votes. Nasir was in the anti-Mohiuddin camp then.

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### Return of woolly mammoth?


A huge step towards recreating the woolly mammoth has been taken by scientists who inserted more than a dozen of its genes into the live DNA of an elephant.

Researchers studied the structure of DNA from mammoths preserved in the Arctic to reproduce exact copies of 14 of the extinct animal's genes.

These were then integrated by experts at Harvard University in Massachusetts into the elephant genome - and functioned as normal DNA.

### War at the Eden

First semifinal between New Zealand and South Africa today

Four years after it was meant to happen, two of the world's most bitter sporting rivals -- New Zealand and South Africa - will face off in a World Cup semifinal at Eden Park.

"When South Africa plays New Zealand, consider your country at war, " legendary Springbok Boy Louw once said.

His focus was rugby, but the passion will be no less in Tuesday's cricket showdown at Eden Park which serves as New Zealand's rugby and cricket fortress.

During the Rugby World Cup in 2011, the All Blacks and Springboks were expected to meet in a semifinal at Eden Park, but Australia did not follow the script and knocked the South Africans out in the quarters.

But there is no spoiler in the Cricket World Cup and the battle for a place in the final is set.

Eden Park has been the scene of some magnificent battles between New Zealand and South Africa over the years but rarely has one intoxicated the nation with such magnitude as this semifinal.

There have been calls in the news media for a public holiday so the nation can stop and watch.

Although New Zealand and South Africa have both held rugby's ultimate trophy neither has made a cricket World Cup final, further spicing up a match already fuelled by SEE PAGE 8 COL 2
