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Khaleda will never succeed

Says PM, slams BNP chief for not paying tributes to martyrs

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia has no more strength to stand again following the failed hartal and blockade programmes.

"They [BNP-Jamaat] have failed and they would never succeed ... All have turned their backs on the BNP chief ... To whom will she now set her face?" she said.

Hasina, also the president of Awami League, was speaking as the chief guest at a discussion, organised by her party at Krishibid Institution Auditorium in Dhaka, to mark the Independence Day.

Continuing her scathing attack on the BNP chief, she said Khaleda has proved herself a cohort of the Pakistani occupation forces by not paying tributes to the language martyrs on February 21 and to the Liberation War heroes on March 26.

When the current government was taking Bangladesh ahead towards development, Khaleda with Jamaat's help unleashed destructive acts across the country and started killing people like the Pakistani forces had done in 1971, she said.

AL leaders Amir Hossain Amu, Tofail Ahmed, Sheikh Fazlul Karim Selim, Matia Chowdhury, Mahbubul Alam Hanif and AFM Bahauddin Nasim, among others, spoke at the programme. Cultural Affairs Minister Asaduzzaman Noor recited a poem.

She recalls Senator Kennedy's message he delivered in Dhaka in February 1972 immediately after independence, "I have come here to say that America cares."

"Today, 44 years since independence of Bangladesh, the message remains the same: 'America cares',"

Biswal adds. She was addressing the Independence Day reception as the guest of honour on Thursday evening at the Bangladesh Embassy in Washington DC, according to a mes-

Terming the stampede the "worst incident ever" in many decades, minor-

ity leaders alleged that the rumour was spread by local pickpockets and muggers to rob devotees of their ornaments and money. They also claimed the tragedy resulted from utter mismanagement by the authorities concerned and

the indifference of law enforcers.

Bangladesh Puja Udjapon Parishad President Kajal Devnath alleged that the stampede was planned by petty local criminals who had been on the lookout for creating a chaos at the site every now and then since the morning.

A gold bangle worn by one of the deceased was reported to have gone missing, said Kajal who visited the scene after the stampede occurred.

Though ASP Forkan claimed that police did their best to prevent the tragedy from taking place, witnesses and victims said nobody was seen to discipline the crowd milling around the place.

Hindu leaders have long demanded protection from petty local criminals during the ritual, said Kajal.

On March 24, 2011, the cabinet's purchase committee approved the CCCC-Arup as the "consultant" for the feasibility study for the project. The consultant's report was approved in April 2013, which serves as the source of a host of very important decisive technical issues, including project cost and location.

As per the Public Procurement Regulation sub-clause 55(4), "If any person (company) hired to provide consulting services for the preparation or implementation of a project, then that person (company) and any of its affiliates, shall be disqualified from

subsequently supplying goods, providing consulting services, performing physical services or work resulting from or directly related to the person's earlier consulting services."

The rejoinder referred to Public Procurement Act (PPA) 2006 section 3(2)(d), under which the terms and conditions of any agreement with a foreign country would prevail over the PPA, and the rejoinder related it to the MoU signed with China during the PM's visit in June 9, 2014; and subsequent nomination of the CCCC by the Chinese embassy.

But the MoU with Chinese government does not say anything about the CCCC. The relevant part of the MoU says, "The Chinese side will support capable and reputable enterprises to undertake the Multi Lane Road Tunnel

Project..." According to officials of the Central Procurement Technical Unit (CPTU) of the planning ministry, there is nothing binding in the MoU with China that forces the government to accept whatever company to be nominated by China and also, the PPA 2006's provision was not appli-

cable here. Why the BBA would relinquish its authority and dignity in picking up the most qualified company in the project, even in a restrictive procurement process like a government-togovernment deal, was not explained in the rejoinder. When The Daily Star contacted a BBA senior official yesterday on this matter, he said the BBA did not relinquish its authority as it would evaluate the CCCC's technical capability during upcoming negotiations over

its commercial proposal. In such a case, if the BBA ever disqualified the CCCC it would again have to get a new nominee from China

upon wasting a lot of time. The PPR restricts a consultant from getting construction job because of conflict of interest that may lead to low quality work, said a senior official of

the CPTU. While the rejoinder claims that no state-owned company of China had any individual partner, the fact is most Chinese and other foreign companies take help from local agencies to facilitate tendering process under unofficial arrangements as most of them do not run their offices in

Saudi jets target militia bases

The fighters entered the city of Lodar in Abyan after clashes with tribal forces loyal to Hadi, and also took over Bayhan in Shabwa, where they faced less resistance.

Mosques in Riyadh yesterday preached fiery sermons against the Houthis and their Iranian allies, describing the fight as a religious duty. Saudi Arabia's top clerical council issued a fatwa on Thursday giving its blessing to the campaign.

In the Iranian capital Tehran, Friday prayer leader Ayatollah Kazem Sadeghi

described the attacks as "an aggression

and interference in Yemen's internal affairs".

Residents said aircraft targeted bases around Sanaa of Republican Guards allied to the Houthis, including one near the presidential compound in a southern district, around dawn and But Houthi fighters and forces also struck near a military installation that houses missiles.

The Republican Guards are loyal to former president Ali Abdullah Saleh, the Houthi's main ally who retains wide power despite having stepped down in 2011 after Arab Spring pro-

Earlier air strikes south of the city and in the oil-producing Marib region appeared to target military installations also affiliated with Saleh.

Yemeni oil flows through the Marib pipeline, its main export route, at a rate of around 70,000 barrels per day (bpd). The well-armed tribes are the de facto authority in the central province so their support for the air strikes was significant.

Warplanes also hit two districts in the Houthis' northerly home province of Saada, tribal sources said. The strikes hit a market in Kataf al-Bokaa in the north of Saada, killing or wounding 15 people, they said. Shada district

was also struck. The coalition began air strikes on Thursday to try to roll back Houthi gains in the Arabian Peninsula country and to shore up the authority of embattled President Hadi, who has been holed up in Aden after fleeing Sanaa in February.

Hadi left Aden on Thursday and is due to attend an Arab summit meeting in Egypt on Saturday, where he aims to build Arab support for the air strikes. He arrived in Saudi Arabia on Thursday by way of Oman, where a foreign ministry official said he had a medical check up before heading on to the kingdom.

The Saudi campaign raised morale among some Gulf Arabs who view Tehran's growing influence in the region with suspicion.
