

Police said one person died at the scene while several people were injured, three seriously.

The only thing that will probably be at stake when hosts Bangladesh take

on India in the last match of the AFC U-23 Championship Qualifiers (Group-E) today is pride. The two neighbouring countries are fierce rivals on the football pitch and their match-ups, whether between senior teams or youth teams -- have produced some mouth-watering clashes over the years.

Except nothing different when the youth teams of these two countries meet at the Bangabandhu National Stadium at 6:00pm today because this is the only match where they can salvage something from a campaign which has been horribly wrong for both sides.

them at a relatively better position than the hosts (-8), in terms of standings. However, both coaches were looking to salvage a win in their last match, ruling out the possibility of playing for a draw.

Bangladesh coach Lodewijk de Kruif, having termed his opponents as a strong side, asked his charges to give their best.

"They (boys) took two hammerings on their head in the games against Syria and Uzbekistan. All they can do to make it up tomorrow (Tuesday) is by winning the game," said de Kruif at the pre-match conference at the BFF House yesterday.

However, the way Bangladesh lost their matches against much higher-ranked sides brings forth the question whether they have the morale left to fight against India. De Kruif feels that his side can shrug off those heavy defeats and play their natural game.

"We will hope for the best. We will do our best and give one hundred percent and hope for a good result," vowed de Kruif, adding

that the game between India and Bangladesh is a completely different prospect since India are close to the level of Bangladesh.

Although India's senior side (173) are ranked lower than Bangladesh (162) in FIFA rankings, the Indian youths have shown a bit more fighting spirit than their beleaguered hosts thus

For this match, Bangladesh will be missing their skipper Raihan Hasan for received marching orders against Uzbekistan and will be replaced either by Tutul Hossain Badsha or Nurul Naim Faisal in defence. Midfielder Sohel Rana, who is likely to wear the captain's armband, vowed that they would not concede goals from set-pieces in this match. Bangladesh have conceded six goals from set-pieces out of a total of eight in the first two matches.

India coach Savio Madeira felt the team that will make less mistakes and pounce of opportunities, will come out as winners.

"Both teams are in the same situation. I think it is going to be another tough match. I feel the team which will makes less mistakes and avail their opportunities will come out as winners tomorrow (Tuesday)," said Madeira fearing that the home team would come all out in front of their home

#### UZBEKISTAN, SYRIA TO FIGHT FOR TOP SPOT

The eagerly anticipated encounter between Bangladesh and India will take place after Uzbekistan and Syria square off to decide which team grabs the outright qualification spot. The Syrians are in a better position with a superior goal-difference (+8) and will need only a draw for the outright spot. Uzbekistan, on the other hand, will need to beat Syria to claim that spot. However, a defeat for either team will not rule them out, as five best runners-up teams from 10 groups will also qualify for the final round along with ten group champions and hosts Qatar.

## Zidane's high ambitions

World Cup legend Zinedine Zidane says he wants to be the coach for Real Madrid or France. The former Juventus and Real star, who has been learning the ropes as coach of Real's

The 42-year-old added France, with whom he won the World Cup in 1998, to his wish list in the programme late Sunday.

"I was a player in this team and it would be good, one day (to be coach), but for the moment there is a coach (Didier Deschamps) who is doing a great job. But yes I have this target, this ambition, "Zidane said.

The former world player of the year retired from club and international football in 2006. Zidane said he has time to wait until taking on a bigger post. "I am doing fine at Madrid."



## Germany rebound

Marco Reus and Thomas Mueller's first-half goals sealed a 2-0 win in Georgia on Sunday to put world champions Germany's Euro 2016 qualifying campaign back on track. After suffering a shock defeat to Poland and drawing at

home to Ireland last October, Joachim Loew's Germany arrived in Tbilisi needing three points to stay in the hunt for top spot in Group D. Scotland's 6-1 drubbing of bottom side Gibraltar in

Glasgow means the Scots, Poland and Germany are all level on 10 points in the table ahead of Sunday night's qualifier in Dublin between Ireland and Poland. After failing to impress in their seven internationals since

winning Brazil 2014, this was a far more polished display from the world champions. Germany created 13 chances while restricting their hosts

to just two shots, and only an outstanding display from Georgia goalkeeper Giorgi Loria kept his side in the game. Having experimented with a 3-1-4-2 formation in

Wednesday's 2-2 friendly draw at home to Australia, Loew reverted to the 4-2-3-1 line-up with which he won the World Cup. Leow started with seven of the side which won the World Cup final while captain Bastian Schweinsteiger made his

first appearance since Germany were crowned world champions in Rio de Janerio. Georgia suffered an early set back when experienced centre-back Aleksandr Amisulashvili was forced off injured, to be replaced by uncapped teenager Lasha Dvali with just

four minutes gone. Reus, who also scored Germany's opening goal against Australia, hit the crossbar with five minutes gone, while

Mueller fired just wide on 12 minutes. Georgia are second from bottom of Group D after also

losing to Poland, Ireland and Scotland, but the home crowd passionately cheered every counter-attack by the hosts at the sold-out Boris Paichadze stadium.

## Spain plotting revenge

European champions Spain travel to face the Netherlands in a friendly on Tuesday with the pain from their 5-1 thrashing at the hands of the Dutch at last year's World Cup still fresh in the memory.

The hammer blow delivered by Louis van Gaal's men in Salvador last June was one from which Spain never recovered as their defence of the title they won with a 1-0 final victory over the Netherlands four years previously in South

Africa ended after just two games. Just over a year out from the European Championship in France there are plenty of questions over both sides' form.

Spain sit only second in Group C of qualifying after limping to a 1-0 win over Ukraine on Friday, while the Netherlands have plenty of work to do just to qualify having won just two of their opening five games in Group A.

However, there are high hopes for Spain's new generation of stars that have graduated from winning back-to-back European Championships at under-21 level. Isco, Koke and goalscorer Alvaro Morata all started

against Ukraine, while David de Gea is expected to get his chance ahead of Iker Casillas in goal in Amsterdam. And Isco believes it is only a matter of time before the goals begin to fly in again for Spain after a relatively lean spell in front of goal since winning the third of three consec-

utive major tournaments at Euro 2012. "Possibly in the national team we are not scoring many goals lately, but we are creating plenty of chances and it is something that can change from one game to another. It is a question of being more deadly."

Dunga says Brazil's renaissance under his leadership has been sparked by the players' burning desire to make amends for their country's World Cup humiliation.

Dunga's side secured their eighth successive victory since last year's World Cup as Roberto Firmino came off the bench to seal a 1-0 win over South American rivals Chile in a feisty friendly at Arsenal's Emirates Stadium on Sunday.

It was far from the most fluent performance of Dunga's second spell in charge of the Selecao.

But, after showcasing their dazzling skills in Thursday's 3-1 win against France in Paris, Brazil had to display the less glamorous side of their game against Chile as they delivered the kind of steely display that deserted them when they crumbled to a 7-1 defeat against Germany in the World Cup semifinals. That agonising loss on home soil sent the

football-crazed nation into a prolonged period of mourning, but disciplinarian Dunga, employing the same no-nonsense style as a manager that served him so well as a player, has quickly restored some pride in the beleaguered Selecao. He refuses to accept plaudits for Brazil's

revival over the last eight months and insists it is the positive attitude of his players, many of whom didn't feature in the Germany

against a good Chile team."
