Coaching role for Vettori

Daniel Vettori has signed a three-year deal to coach the Big Bash League's Brisbane Heat.

A foundation player with the Twenty20 side, the 36year-old Vettori will become the first stand-alone coach of the Heat since the inception of the BBL in 2011.

Vettori, who also coaches Royal Challengers Bangalore in the Indian Premier League, will take up his role with the Heat after the IPL, which gets underway next week.

"It is a big job but one that I am excited about tackling," said New Zealand's Vettori in a Heat statement.

Lehmann defends aggression

Australia cricket coach Darren Lehmann has defended wicketkeeper Brad Haddin and the



team's vocal aggression during their World Cup final win over New Zealand.

Haddin and his teammates have come under fire for their send-offs of New Zealand's batsmen at the Melbourne Cricket Ground on Sunday, though no action was taken by the match referee and 'Black Caps' skipper Brendon McCullum played it down in his post-match media conference.

Haddin compounded anger in New Zealand by saying they had got what they deserved after being "too nice" during their pool phase clash in Auckland, which Australia lost.

"He's copped a bit (of criticism), hasn't he?" Lehmann told Adelaide radio station 5AA.

"We like to play our game, no one got reported out of the game, so we must have played it fair.

"It was a little bit disappointing, but people are entitled to their opinions and you're going to have good and bad times.

"You accept that and you move on.

"We're happy with the way we played, obviously. We knew we wanted to be really aggressive against them. And look, sometimes it works, sometimes it doesn't."

Ace all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan said that Bangladesh should start as favourites against Pakistan in the upcoming

three-match ODI series at home to break their jinx against Pakistan. The Tigers have failed to win a game against their South Asian neighbours since their famous 1999 World Cup victory in England.

Shakib exuded confidence while speaking to reporters at his residence yesterday. Soon after the press conference at his place he left for Kolkata to take part in the Indian Premier League, where he will be featuring for the Kolkata Knight Riders.

"What I personally believe is that we should start this series as favourites. And I believe we should win the ODI series against Pakistan and I think everybody in the team thinks likewise. I think it's the best opportunity for us to win a series against Pakistan," a confident Shakib said. He believed that the Tigers can use the momentum they gained from the impressive performance in the recently concluded World Cup in Australia and New Zealand.

The allrounder also gave his opinion regarding the much-talked about issue of umpiring decisions against Bangladesh in the quarterfinal against India at the Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG) on March 19. It was an event which led to a series of events and eventually witnessed the resignation AHM Mustafa Kamal from his post as ICC president.

"Actually it's better not to comment regarding this issue. The umpires take decisions on the field which are sometimes right and sometimes wrong. I think we are focusing too much because it was a World Cup match but the reality is that these kinds of things also happened against Bangladesh on many earlier occasions.

"We could have won many matches had we gotten the right decisions. So, I don't think there is any point in reacting too much regarding this issue, especially for the players. Just for example, we could not have done anything if the run-out decision against [Chris] Jordan hadn't gone in our favour. So some go in favour of you and some don't. Human beings can make mistakes, so

I don't think there is any point commenting on it," he responded.

Shakib, however, was more interested in the upcoming challenge awaiting his side rather than focusing on the current off the field controversies, as he wants to see his side win more ODI matches so that they

can grab the number eight position in the team rankings and avoid playing qualifiers for the 2019 World Cup to be held in England.

"We should try to improve our rankings as the top eight sides directly qualify for the next World

Cup. So we have to try and win as many matches as possible. It will be a huge achievement for our team if we can achieve the number eight ranking and sustain it for direct entry in the next World Cup. For a long time we have been between the number nine and ten positions and we only

> once achieved the number eight position. And I am sure the 2019 World Cup will be in everybody's mind," said Shakib.

"We have a busy home schedule this year. We can win against any team in our home conditions as we proved it in the past two years. So I don't think anybody should have any doubts about it. If we play our best cricket then it's very much possible to beat any team whether

they are world champions or runners-up. We played seven matches and won all of them against New Zealand. What I personally believe is that we will win a number of matches this year," hoped Shakib, who will return home on April 12.

Ailing cricket legend Martin Crowe gave a heartwrenching speech at last night's NZ cricket awards that left retiring Black Caps spinner Daniel Vettori, and the crowd, teary-eyed.

"Before you send me on my way, I just want to say that on March the 29th at the MCG it was an incredible day, I was very exhausted but I stood on the edge of the boundary and saw Australia lift the Cup," Crowe said.

"And then I noticed the boys starting to walk in my direction - I didn't realise that the dressing room was right where I was.

"And I saw Dan Vettori ...and I just burst open with all the emotion that I had. He gave me a huge hug and I just said, what a career, what an inspiration.

"And I've got your seat warm Dan, in the Hall, right next to me buddy. You're going to have to shave though I'm afraid. They only allow moustaches, eh Paddles. And only the doctor, W. G Grace, is allowed

the full nasty."




Brendon McCullum's inspirational captaincy has lifted New Zealand and the flam boyant batsman should continue leading the side in all three formats at least until next year's World Twenty20, former captain Stephen Fleming said.

Since last year, New Zealand at home have won Test series against India, West Indies and Sri Lanka and dazzled in 50 overs and breezed into their maiden World Cup final at Melbourne.

Great rivals Australia won the title but for six weeks, the Black Caps displayed an aggressive brand of cricket which earned them eight successive victories and the admiration of millions.

Former captain Daniel Vettori and seamer Kyle Kills have since retired but Fleming hoped that the 33year-old McCullum will stick around to continue the "good work".

"I hope he opts to carry on in charge of the side across all formats for the foreseeable future," Fleming wrote in his column on the International Cricket Council's website on Thursday.

"He has lifted the Black Caps up by their bootstraps ... and he ended the World Cup with his position watertight.

"He is a positive leader who leads by example and although Kane Williamson is regarded as the next cab off the rank in terms of captaincy, it would be ideal if McCullum stayed on to continue the work he and coach Mike Hesson have begun, at least until the end of that ICC World Twenty20 at the earliest."
