23 Bangladesh nationals evacuated

A group of 23 Bangladeshi expatriates, who had been stranded in Al Hudaydah and Sana'a cities of strifetorn Yemen, reached Djibouti yesterday.

They were granted threeday visa by the African country and would be sent home soon, SM Mahbubul Alam, counsellor at the Bangladesh High Commission in Kuwait, told BBC Bangla last night.

"We will contact different airlines. If tickets are available, we will send them to Dhaka," he said.

Currently, around 300 Bangladeshis are stranded in Sana'a, 15-20 in Hudaydah and 10-12 in Mukha cities.

Hasina asks party's Dhaka city leaders

The Gono Bhaban yesterday denied The Daily Star reporter access to cover the PM's meeting with Awami League's Dhaka city north and south unit leaders without giving any reason. The Daily Star, however, carries the report based on information obtained from secondary sources.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday directed Dhaka city Awami League leaders to work for the party-backed candidates in the upcoming city corporation elections and pursue voters through door-to-door campaign.

"You [city AL leaders] will have to go from door to door of the voters, win their hearts through pointing out successes and development work of the government and the BNP-Jamaat's violence and subversive activities," the PM was quoted as saying by a city AL leader.

However, subsection 14 (A) of article 6 of the code of conduct for city corporation elections says, "... ministers, state ministers, deputy ministers or anybody of their status cannot participate in election campaigns or electoral activities..."

Food-borne diseases kill an estimated two million people annually, including many children, in developing countries, the World Health Organisation said as people yesterday observed the World Health Day.

"Food contaminants, such as harmful parasites, bacteria, viruses, prions, chemical or radioactive substances, cause more than 200 diseases -- ranging from infectious diseases to cancers," it said.

Food production has been industrialised and its trade and distribution have been globalised, said WHO Director General Margaret Chan in a statement.


The aircraft, also operated as a fighter jet, skidded due to collapse of its nosegear moments after it landed at 4:17pm, airport sources said.
