Hasan celebrates call-up

Abul Hasan celebrated his return to the national side with a matchwinning all-round

performance as Islami Bank East Zone posted a comfortable 98-run victory over Walton Central Zone at the Shere-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur last night.

Away at the Fatullah Cricket Stadium, national colours like Mushfigur Rahim, Sabbir Rahman and Nasir Hossain sparkled with the bat as BCB North Zone secured an 88-run victory against Prime Bank South Zone to set up a final clash with the East Zone for Sunday at Mirpur. The date was changed for the final match as the Bangladesh Cricket Board has arranged a reception for the Tigers on Saturday at the Manik Mia Avenue.

Hasan, called up for the first two ODIs against Pakistan later this month ahead of Al-Amin Hossain for his batting ability, helped East Zone get

past the 200-run mark as he scored 51 off 53 balls with three fours and a six batting at number eight and then tormented his opponents' top order by taking the first three wickets that included Rony Talukdar and Mahmudullah Riyad.

Central Zone finally failed to recover from the damages as left-arm spinner Arafat Sunny then took the



charge and took four wickets to dismiss them for 120 runs.

At Fatullah, the North Zone showed a strong batting display after recovering from early hiccups to set a 322-run winning target for their opponents, who ultimately were bowled out for 233.

World Cup hero Rubel Hossain gave the early breakthrough removing Junaed Siddiqui, who made a hundred in the previous game, but Naeem Islam joined Mahmudul Hasan to repair the innings, sharing 83-run for the second wicket. Hasan missed his half-century for two runs while Naeem hit highest 80 off 107 balls. Mushfigur, Sabbir and Nasir then made full use of the good platform to keep the strong South Zone bowling attack, led by Mashrafe Bin Mortaza, at bay.

Mushfigur hit 78 off 66 balls with five fours and four sixes while Sabbir smote seven boundaries and three over boundaries during his 34-ball 66 and Nasir smashed six fours in his 22-ball 39-run knock.

Bangla Games called off

The Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) yesterday postponed next month's Indo-Bangladesh Bangla Games for indefinite period after the West Bengal Olympic Association refused to take part citing lack of preparation.

The fourth edition of the competition featuring nine disciplines was scheduled to be held in Dhaka over May 7-14, some five years after the third edition was held in Kolkata in March 2010.

"They are lacking in preparation following the demise of West Bengal Olympic Association's treasurer and have also some internal problems and that's why we postponed the Games at their request," said Mizanur Rahman Manu, the BOA vicepresident and co-coordinator of the event.

"However, I talked to their president this [Thursday afternoon and they wished to take part in the Games during Winter," said Manu, adding that they were a bit disappointed with such a decision and hopeful to stage the Games in the middle of January next year.

Bangladesh had started their preparation in February in a bid to regain supremacy that they had lost in the third edition where the hosts won 32 gold, 27 silver and 26 bronze medals against Bangladesh's 28 gold, 29 silver and as many bronze. The BOA already spent Tk 50 lakh for the preparation.

With the announcement of postponement, the athletes also expressed their frustration.

"The preparation is going on at good pace and I have improved my timing. But the postponement disappointed me. However, I think this will help me in the SA Games,"

In February last year Tamim had suffered a neck strain after the second

Bangladesh as a team played exceptionally well in the World Cup in Australia-New Zealand but Tamim was not at his best except for his 95-run knock against Scotland. And overall the opening was a big problem in the World Cup. Keeping that in mind the selectors have picked up an uncapped player in Rony Talukdar, who in all probabilities will open the innings with a fit Tamim in the first one-day international against Pakistan on April 17.

Reception on hold

As the Tigers were all set to travel to Chittagong this morning to attend a reception for their outstanding performance in the World Cup, the

Election Commission late last night postponed the programme until the city corporation polls are over in apprehension of violation of electoral code of conduct.

The national cricketers were to travel to the port city amidst mixed reactions on whether attending the reception at the Chittagong Outer Stadium at 3:00pm would provide political mileage to BCB vicepresident AJM Nasir Uddin or could hamper their preparations for the home series against Pakistan, which is just over a week away.

Talking to the media, Returning Officer Abdul Baten at the Chittagong EC office at 9:30pm said, "We all are respectful to the achievement of the Bangladesh cricket team. We also want the programme to be held. But if the programme is arranged now, there is a possibility of a showdown by [Awami

League-backed mayoral candidate Nasir that could breach the electoral code of conduct. The programme can be arranged at any time after the elections.

Nasir is the general secretary of Chattagram Jela Krira Sangtha (CJKS) which is one of the organisers of the function along with Bangladesh District and Divisional Sports Organisers Forum and the Chittagong Divisional Sports Association. Nasir on Wednesday spoke at the press conference of the reception programme at MA Aziz Stadium.

The event was scheduled to take place a day before the Bangladesh Cricket Board's own grand reception, which is to take place at Dhaka's Manik Mia Avenue on Saturday. The board planned a reception for the cricketing heroes, who reached the quarterfinals for the first time down under last month, ever since they returned home on March 22 but the delay was due to off the field happenings surrounding AHM Mustafa Kamal, who resigned from the post of ICC president after the controversy surrounding the handing over the World Cup trophy to the champions team.

Mani fears for cricket

Former ICC president Ehsan Mani on Wednesday expressed grave fears about cricket's future, saying he is "more concerned about the health of the game today than I have ever been". Mani criticised the world governing

body's decision to reduce the 2019 World Cup to 10 teams and said that many of the game's 10

Full Member nations faced serious challenges. "A year has passed

since the changes at the ICC," Mani said at the launch of the new Wisden Cricketers' Almanack

at Lord's, in reference to last year's takeover at the ICC by the boards of England, India and Australia.

"I am more concerned about the health of the game today than I have ever been. When I look around, five of the 10 Full countries are in desperate need of help.

"They are faced with two main challenges: one, not enough money;

two, not enough quality cricket." The five teams referred to by

Mani are Pakistan, the West Indies, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh and Zimbabwe, and he expressed particular concern about the health of the West Indian game.

"It is desperately sad to see that some of the West Indian players prefer to play in the IPL [Indian Premier League] and other T20

leagues around the world rather than for West Indies," he said.

"This is simply because of money. This problem must be addressed. It is the responsibility of

the ICC to ensure that the priority for players should be to play for their country before anything else."

Mani expressed concerns over the futures of the Associate nations, who may not feature at the next World Cup if the two qualifying berths made available to teams outside the world's top eight are taken by Bangladesh and Zimbabwe.
