

STRANDED BANGLADESHIS

160 more leave Yemen on Indian ship

One hundred and sixty Bangladeshis boarded an Indian ship in Al Hudaydah city of strife-torn Yemen yesterday to take temporary shelter in Djibouti before heading home.

SM Mahbubul Alam, counsellor at the Bangladesh high commission in Kuwait, also said thirteen Bangladeshis who were already in the African country are set to reach home early today.

Two flights of Fly Dubai and Turkish Airlines left Djibouti with the 13 on board around 5:00pm local time, he told The Daily Star over the phone yesterday.

Ten more Bangladeshis may land in Dhaka today on another flight, he added. A total of 32 Bangladeshis were evacuated from Yemen to the African country recently. Meanwhile, around 50 to 60 other Bangladeshis were

still waiting at the Aden seaport yesterday to embark on a ship to go to Djibouti. They had gone there hearing that an Indian ship would take them to Djibouti.

One of them, Emdad Hossain, yesterday told private television channel Jamuna that the ship was yet to reach the port. Mahbubul said the Bangladeshis would board another Indian ship by tomorrow.

The counsellor is now staying in Djibouti with a team of SEE PAGE 17 COL 6

No guarantee of final Iran deal

Says Khamenei as Rohani demands lifting of all sanctions at once

Iran's supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei yesterday said that last week's hard-won framework accord with world powers on Tehran's nuclear programme was no guarantee of a final deal and that much work remained.

And President Hassan Rohani added that

Iran would not sign any final agreement unless "all economic sanctions are totally lifted on the same day."

"What has been done so far does not guarantee an agreement, nor its contents, nor even that the negotiations will continue to the end," Khamenei, who has the final word on all matters of state, said on his website.

HC extends stay

BARAPUKURIA MINE GRAFT

on Khaleda case for six months

The High Court yesterday extended its stay by six months on the proceedings of Barapukuria coalmine corruption case against BNP chief Khaleda Zia.

The bench of Justice Md Nuruzzaman and Justice Zafar Ahmed passed the order following a plea moved by Khaleda's lawyers AM Mahbub Uddin Khokon and Badruddoza Badal.

The status of the case has not been changed although it was filed illegally, the lawyers told the court.

The Anti-Corruption Commission filed the case on February 26, 2008 accusing Khaleda and others of causing a loss of Tk 159 crore to the state exchequer by awarding a contract for operating Barapukuria coalmine to a Chinese company through abuse of power.

Later, the HC stayed the case proceedings for several times and issued a rule on the government and the ACC to explain why the case against Khaleda should not be scrapped.

The last time the court extended the order for six months was on September 2, 2014.

The court was set to deliver the verdict on Khaleda's petition, which challenged the legality of the case, for three times -- March 10, 15 and April 5.

Artificial clouds to end droughts


