passes away

the first diplomats who risked the lives of his wife and two children to bravely disengage from the Pakistan government and declare allegiance to the Mujibnagar government in 1971, is no more.

Breathing his last due to old-age complications in the capital's United Hospital yesterday at 5:50pm, the 78year-old left behind his wife, four daughters and a host of well-wishers to mourn his

Expressing deep shock, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, in a message, recalled the invaluable contribution of Shehab, also a member of the Awami League sub-committee on foreign affairs, to the Liberation War. She conveyed profound sympathy to the bereaved family.

Then second secretary at the Pakistan high commission in New Delhi, Shehab and assistant press attaché Amzadul Haque severed the ties after the Mujibnagar government's formation on April 17.

Hailing from Chittagong, Shehab earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in history from Dhaka University. Before joining the then Pakistan foreign service in the 1960s, he briefly taught at government colleges.

Shehab retired in 2001, having served as ambassador to the US, Mexico, Guatemala, Columbia, France, Spain, Unesco, World Tourism Organization, Kuwait, Yemen, Poland and Hungary and as deputy high

commissioner to the UK. Becoming a secretary to the government in 1993, he participated in many international conferences and UN General Assembly sessions.

Rajshahi MP 'threatens to get RU VC sacked'

Chemistry professor accused of assaulting university school's vice-principal for rebuking son caught smoking

Allegedly becoming irate on being asked to meet later, a Rajshahi lawmaker yesterday barged into the Rajshahi University (RU) vice chancellor's (VC) office, forcing postponement of a meeting, thumped a table and shouted expletives, threatening to get the latter sacked.

"I require no permission to enter the Prime Minister's Office and you deny me from entering your office! ... Now Awami League is in power...I will see how you remain in the VC post," the office sources, requesting anonymity, quoted Omar Faruque Chowdhury as saying.

The Rajshahi-1 (Tanore, Godagari) lawmaker, also the district Awami League president, had first sought an audience over the phone around 1:00pm while VC Prof Muhammad Mizanuddin was holding the meeting, said the sources. When the VC asked to meet him later,

Omar initiated the abuses. Accompanied by

three others, he barged inside 10 minutes later and left after threatening the VC, they added. Pro-VC Prof Chowdhury Sarwar Jahan and Rajshahi University Teachers

Association General Secretary Prof Rezaul Karim Badal were present, said the sources. Denying the allegations, Omar told The

Daily Star that he had gone there and only talked about lessening a fine the RU authorities imposed on a private medical college.

US expresses support for war crime trials

The US supports bringing to justice those who committed atrocities in the 1971 Liberation War, recognising that it is an important process for Bangladesh to undertake, said US Department of State Acting Spokesperson Marie Harf.

Supporting the ongoing war crimes trials, Harf said Bangladesh has decisions to make on its own.

In reply to questions during a regular briefing at the State Department in Washington DC on Monday, Harf stressed further improvements to the International Crimes Tribunals' processes to meet domestic and international obligations.

In a survey in 37 out of the total 41 wards, The Daily Star found that AL has single candidates only in four wards, while BNP has got 15 single candidates.

There are as many as seven candidates from the same party in one ward.

...we are trying to have single candidates in the rest of the wards," Chittagong city BNP President Ameer Khasru Mahmud Chowdhury told The Daily Star.

AL Chittagong south district President Moslem Uddin Ahmed said they were persuading some candidates to abandon campaigns and work for the mayor candidate. In Jamal Khan area (Ward 21), three ruling party leaders

The third AL-affiliated candidate in the ward, MA Naser, said Bijay contacted him for discussion but he turned him down. "Why will I talk to him?.... I'm well ahead of them," Naser said.

Promises also include better waste management and public transport services, reclamation of occupied footpaths, playgrounds, improvement of open spaces, safety for women, development of slum dwellers' living condi-

Besides, the tribunal sought by May 17 the investigation report, if any, over war crimes allegations against former BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami lawmaker Mawlana Sakhawat Hossain.

Prosecutor Rezia Sultana Chaman submitted a report on the probe's progress and sought more time, stating that the investigation officer was unwell.

The tribunal also asked the prosecution to press formal charges on May 10 against five Kishoreganj war crimes suspects -- Nasir Uddin Ahmed, his brother Shamsuddin Ahmed, Gazi Abdul Mannan, Hafizuddin and Azharul Islam.
