Dhaka cops assessing status of AL's picked, rebel candidates; govt, AL claim to be unaware of DMP letter

Apart from performing regular duties, officers-in-charge of police stations in the capital had been busy assessing the popularity of the Awami Leaguebacked councillor candidates and AL rebels for the last one week, said DMP

If, going by the assessment reports, the AL finds a rebel candidate more popular than the party-backed candidate, it might change its decision at the last moment and endorse the popular one, AL insiders said.

The police officers were assigned by deputy commissioners to gauge the popularity of the candidates in the April 28 elections, and send reports to a specified email and fax numbers by 12:00noon yesterday.

Now Home boss says sexual harassment in Baishakh celebration not found in video footage

State Minister for Home Asaduzzaman Khan yesterday said he found no evidence of sexual assault on women during the Pahela Baishakh celebrations on the Dhaka University campus in the released footage of CCIV camera-5.

Talking to the BBC Bangla, he, however, said, "Someone has pulled a woman by her scarf [and the scarf fell on the ground]. A man close by collected the scarf and returned it to her."

The Daily Star examined the one-hour footage of camera-5 and grabbed 50 screenshots of women being sexually assaulted.

River pollution, food shortage contribute to the declin

To us Bangalees, hilsa isn't just a fish. It's an integral part of our culture and heri-

tage. Be it fried or cooked with mustard, hilsa is a must in Pahela Baishakh cele-

brations. But they aren't anymore safe in our rivers, home to world's 60pc hilsa.

Hilsa's capacity to spawn in Bangladesh rivers has decreased significantly over the past few years, meaning we will get to have less of this mouthwatering fish in the coming years if the trend continues.

Researchers are working to find exactly why this mystique fish is spawning fewer eggs, but they believe river pollution, loss of their navigability, food shortages and saltwater intrusion due to climate change are to blame.

On an average, a matured hilsa spawns some 15 to 18 lakh eggs at a time, but it has come down to eight to 12 fish. Moreover, BFRI test has found that lakh in recent years, according to a ammonia, a colourless compound of research by Bangladesh Fisheries nitrogen and hydrogen, is increasing in Research Institute (BFRI).


"We have been doing the count since

2011 and found this clear change in hilsa's spawning pattern," said BFRI Director Anisur Rahman, who is leading the government-funded research that began in 2011 and is ongoing.

A matured hilsa releases maximum 21 lakh and minimum three lakh eggs at a time. But a very small number of them are hatched out, and even a smaller number of fry survives and becomes mature to spawn, Anisur added.


