BCL men in thick of dirty things

Bangladesh Chhatra League played a leading role in occupying many polling centres and rigging votes for Awami League-backed candidates in yesterday's city polls, according to findings by The Daily Star.

Some BCL insiders had earlier told this newspaper that they had plans to take control of polling centres.

The Daily Star reporters yesterday visited at least 325 of the 2,701 centres in Dhaka and Chittagong cities, and saw how the BCL established their dominance in and outside the polling centres.

As voting began in the morning, BCL men turned up at most of the centres and gradually

In a number of polling centres The Daily Star monitored, policemen and other law enforcers stood by or did little as ruling party men were out to rig the polls to Dhaka and Chittagong city corporations yesterday.

The Daily Star witnessed how the police looked the other way during incidents of ballot stuffing, intimidation of voters, and attacks on journalists by the supporters of the Awami

League-backed candidates.

Deployed for election duty, the army was kept as a reserve force inside the cantonment and never called in during the election violence yesterday.

The two returning officers of the city corporations in Dhaka, with authority to call in the army, claimed that the situation did not require putting the striking force in action. Voters at several of the 325 centres

this paper monitored also alleged that cops were not around when they

needed them. The 80,000 lawmen in the three city corporations were hardly seen helping voters.

They were inactive when pro-AL student body Bangladesh Chhatra League men and supporters of other AL-backed candidates' gathered and staged showdowns at the gates of polling centres intimidating voters.

Manjur quits race, politics

: He pulls out of polls being frustrated with his party decision, says AL

In a shocking move, BNP-backed · Manjur Alam pulled out from the : mayoral race a few hours after the polling started in Chittagong City · Corporation yesterday, saying he was frustrated at the "massive voterigging" there.

But in a more dramatic turn of events, he announced retirement from politics for good, without citing any specific reason behind his decision.

"This politics does not suit me anymore," he said at an · impromptu and brief but intriguing press conference at his election office in the city's Dewanhat at 11:15am. "It's my sixth election and now I am quitting [the election

race]. I am also retiring from politics, " said Manjur, flanked by BNP Vice Chairman Abdullah Al Noman and Amir Khosru Mahmud Chowdhury, president of the city unit BNP. When journalists asked the immediate past CCC mayor

· why he was making such an extreme move, Manjur became emotional.

"I don't want to say anything about it. I want to make an end here. I am not involved with politics anymore. I am resigning from my political post now. I will not do politics SEE PAGE 12 COL 1

Nepal quake toll keeps rising

PM warns it could hit 10,000; UN says 8m victim of disaster

Hungry and desperate villagers rushed towards relief helicopters in remote areas of Nepal yesterday, begging to be airlifted to safety, four days after a monster earthquake killed more than 5,000 people, reported AFP. The government has yet to assess the full

scale of the damage wrought by Saturday's 7.8 magnitude quake, unable to reach many mountainous areas despite aid supplies and personnel pouring in from around the world.

Prime Minister Sushil Koirala told Reuters the death toll could reach 10,000, as information of damage from far-flung villages and towns has yet to come in. That would surpass the 8,500 who died in a 1934 earthquake, the last

disaster on this scale to hit the Himalayan nation.
