

Ford set to return as Indiana Jones

Harrison Ford could star in a fifth Indiana Jones film. Lucasfilm President Kathleen Kennedy has confirmed the series is being brought back to the big screen and the 72-yearold actor could be expected to reprise his famous role.

Now he has wrapped shooting "Star Wars: The Force Awakens" - in which he returns as Han Solo, the actor might once again play the daredevil archaeologist in the upcoming film.

The Indiana Jones franchise, created by Lucas and directed by Steven Spielberg, began in 1981 with "Raiders of the Lost



Ark" and was followed by three more movies about the whip-wielding archaeologist. The films have earned a combined £1.32 billion at the box office worldwide.

While Harrison is set to appear in the new film, it's unlikely it will be as the lead character, as Chris Pratt was being eyed to be the main star recently.

Ford is still recovering after being involved in a plane crash in March which saw the 72-year-old star was rushed to hospital with head injuries.

Prime minister Sheikh Hasina termed Rabindranath the poet of the humane soul, as she inaugurated the three-day Rabindra festival at the Shahzadpur Pilot School in Sirajganj on Friday morning, marking the 154th birth anniversary of the Nobel laureate poet.

Earlier, the prime minister laid foundation stone for Rabindra University.

Chaired by cultural minister Asaduzzaman Noor, the prime minister spoke as the chief guest of the festival, where she focused the humane role of Rabindranath Tagore. "Tagore loved his people. Being a Zamindar, he focused the sorrows of the people. He came forward to remove the trouble of his people," The prime minister said.

Tagore himself introduced banking for the farmers, donating his entire amount of Nobel Prize, the PM said, adding that the poet assisted poor farmers in this region contributing huge land for the cattle farmers.

"Tagore was a revolutionist, so he could leave the Knighthood of the British emperor. As a result of Tagore's feelings for the people and the contribution for the Bangalis, Bangabandhu selected 'Amar Sonar Bangla' as national anthem," the PM said.

Among others, health minister Mohammed Nasim, education minister Nurul Islam Nahid, lawmaker Hasibur Rahman Shopon and cultural affairs secretary Aktary Momtaz spoke on the occasion. Later, artistes performed in a cultural

"Tagore's creations are his gift to us"

Mahadeb Ghose is a noted Tagore singer. On Tagore's birth anniversary, we got his perspective of the bard:

What attracts you to Rabindra Sangeet? Mahadeb Ghose: The love and emotion that I have for Rabindranath and his songs came naturally. But as a singer, I like the harmony between his words and tunes since his lyrics and tunes together create melodies. His songs are raga-based but they are distinct, as Tagore impeccably used ragas in his melodies. He always prioritised tunes instead of confining himself to rigid boundaries. Also the variety of his songs is unmatched in the world of Bangla music. Starting from Puja to Prem, Prokrit and Prarthona, Tagore's songs



are closely interlinked to Bengalis, their emotions, and this land.

What sets Tagore apart?

Mahadeb Ghose: The way he perceived the essence of our culture and heritage is clearly visible in his songs. Not only that, Tagore brought universality to Bangla songs, inter-

twining local tunes with foreign tunes. His songs are perfect example of internationalism and harmony. Tagore never neglected his native tunes, but he mixed them with foreign tunes and created something beauti-

Does Tagore continue to inspire us today? Mahadeb Ghose: He left his footmark wherever he went. In many parts of the world, including Japan and some part of Europe, Tagore is highly esteemed. Even today, he is inspiring generations. Shantiniketan hosts students from around the world and through such institutions, Tagore's songs and philosophy have spread globally. His songs, writings and philosophy will keep attracting many more people in the future. I believe his creations are his gift to us.

Taylor Swift kicks off "1989" tour in Tokyo



Taylor Swift started her 1989 Tour at Tokyo Dome in the city's Suidobashi district on Tuesday night. The 55,000 seat cylindrical stadium was packed to the hilt, and organisers placed lightemitting wristbands on every seat so the entire crowd illumi-

Swift opened with "Welcome to New York", using a mock NYC backdrop and featuring her retinue of all-male dancers. For the third track, Swift launched into "Blank Space" and extended the number by using a vocal loop of her singing to repeat the word "Tokyo" and harmonize with herself.

year changed my life and I wanted to come here to say thank you." Later in the show, Swift ventured out on to the walkway, elevated high above the crowd. Standing alone with an acoustic guitar, Swift mused, "A lot of people find themselves with these blurred lines or mixed messages, not knowing if the person loves them back. In a perfect world it's like you tell your love simply. You only have two options...either you leave...or you stay." With that she leapt into "You Are in Love"

Swift explained her decision to start the tour in Tokyo: "This

Still up on the crane, the singer then let loose with "Love Story", and the crowd reacted loudly. Back on the main stage, Taylor broke out her electric guitar for "We Are Never Ever Getting Back Together" as the Dome rocked.

Switching instruments, she sat down at the piano and told the crowd, "I'm looking out at an ocean of people that have been singing along all night and that's so beautiful that you would do that even if you don't speak English! It makes me feel so wistful and romantic that you would do that." All the dancers and Taylor boogied on the catwalk high

above the floor as it rotated and moved forward for the finale "Shake It Off". Confetti rained on the audience more than once, bringing to a close to the nearly two-hour performance.

"Heroism shouldn't be about beating up 10 people" ... Irrfan Khan

Bollywood actor Irrfan Khan says that the concept of heroism should change in Bollywood. The 48-year-old says that there are many things that a hero should do, rather than just fight on screen. "Heroism shouldn't be about beating up 10 people on screen. I feel we need to change this concept in films," says Irrfan. And that's not the only problem he has

with the film industry. Irrfan says that the approach to biopics, a raging trend in Bollywood, needs to change. "Sometimes in the name of a biopic, you make one layered cinema. Sometimes you glorify the guy who you are making a film on. If you turn an interesting man's story into a commercial film, that spoils it," says the actor, who earned a lot of praise for his biopic, "Paan Singh Tomar"



(2012). "Biopics can never become old. They are unique because everyone has a different drama in their life. So we can go on making these. The only thing is how you make it," says the actor, who will next be seen in Shoojit Sircar's "Piku", alongside Amitabh Bachchan and Deepika Padukone.

Meanwhile, the actor is also preparing for his latest Hollywood project, Ron Howard's "Inferno", and even took a trip to Budapest to prepare for the film. "It was a wonderful trip. We did look tests, readings and had long discussions with the writer and other actors...There were reading sessions and costume trials," says Irrfan. The film also stars Tom Hanks and Felicity Jones.
