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# 1,100-year-old temple found in Dinajpur

Archaeologists have unearthed an Hindu temple believed to be over 1,100 years old at Bochaganj upazila of Dinajpur.

"This is a small temple and was built sometime between the 8th and 9th centuries during the Pala period," said Prof Swadhin Sen, leader of a Jahangirnagar University team digging out the temple in Maherpur village.

Khademul Nabi Badal, chairman of Chhatoil union, said the land under which the "historic archaeological beauty" was found, was leased to a local for farming a few months ago.

While cleaning bushes from the land last month, villagers suddenly noticed some ancient-looking bricks and guessed that there could something of archaeological interest underground.

Learning about the matter, the union chairman instantly informed it to Swadhin, a teacher of JU's Archeology department, who along with his team was working at another "archaeological" site in nearby Basudevpur village.

Prof Swadhin's team consisted of a group of students of the Archeology department and experienced excavators from Mahasthan of Bogra.

The temple was discovered after the team dug the site for days, said Badal.

# Save migrants drifting at sea

UN urges Asian nations to keep ports, borders open

The UN, US and rights bodies yesterday urged regional governments to take swift action to save migrants as around 6,000 Rohingyas and Bangladeshis are still believed to be stranded in the sea in Southeast Asia.

United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon expressed alarm that some Southeast Asian countries might refuse entry to several thousand people believed to be stranded on smugglers' boats in the Andaman Sea and Straits of Malacca.

The UN chief urged the leaders in the region to keep their borders and ports open

for these migrants.

"The secretary-general is concerned about the crisis evolving in the Andaman Sea and Straits of Malacca where several thousand people are believed to be stranded on smugglers' boats," says a statement issued on Thursday in New York through his spokesperson.

Ban also urges the governments concerned to ensure that obligation of rescue is upheld and prohibition on 'refoulement' is maintained. Refoulement is forcible return of individuals to their country of origin where they could face persecution.

He got in touch with some like-minded local youths, according to investigators.

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# RAIN RELIEF Electrocuton, lightning kill three

A boy was killed by a lightning strike, and two other people died after being electrocuted in the capital's Sher-e-Bangla Nagar and Lalbagh during downpours yesterday afternoon.

The boy, Badal, 14, was hit by the thunderbolt when he along with his friends was playing cricket near Chandrima Udyan around 5:00pm. He died on the spot, said Syed Muniruzzaman, a sub-inspector of Sher-e-Bangla Nagar Police Station.

In another incident, a woman and a child were electrocuted at Rasulbagh in Lalbagh during their bathing in the rain.

The dead are Ruma, 28, and Rifat, 5.

The two were electrocuted when the puddle where they were bathing came into contact with a live electric wire somehow around 5:30pm, said Motaleb Munshi, a sub-inspector of Lalbagh Police Station.

They were declared dead on arrival at Dhaka Medical College Hospital, he added.

# 'Lessons have still not been learnt'

Says UN human rights expert group about Rana Plaza disaster

The United Nations Working Group on business and human rights yesterday said that "the lessons of the Rana Plaza disaster have still not been learned."

The experts' warning comes after a new tragedy in the global garment industry involving the death of more than 70 factory workers in a fire at a shoe factory in Manila this week, according to a press release issued

in Geneva.

"The tragic death of factory workers, mainly women, is a stark reminder of the urgent need for action to protect workers in the garment industry, despite the Bangladesh Accord for Fire and Building Safety, created two years ago, on the same date as the Manila shoe factory fire," said Michael Addo, who currently heads the expert group.
