DU SEX ASSAULT CU students demand punishment for all culpable

Two alliances of student bodies yesterday demanded immediate arrest and punishment for the perpetrators who sexually assaulted women during Pahela Baishakh celebration on DU campus, and also for the policemen who attacked students demonstrating against the sex offenders earlier this month.

Students under the

banner of Pragatishil Chhatra Jote and Samrajyabad Birodhi Chhatra Oikko, Chittagong University unit, brought out a procession on the campus to press home their six-point demand including immediate resignation of DU Proctor Amzad Ali, full-fledged security on public university campuses, formulation of sexual SEE PAGE 4 COL 1

Justice seeking students, cops face off again

Demonstrators and police chased each other yesterday at the capital's Doyel Chattar and High Court areas where the latter put up barricades, halting a procession trying to lay siege to the home ministry with five demands, including arrest of perpetrators of the Pahela Baishakh mass molestation of females.

Pragatishil Chhatra Jote and Samrajjobad Birodhi Chhatra Oikya, an alliance of 13 student organisations, first brought out a procession on the Dhaka University campus and then staged a sit-in at the HC old gate after facing the barricade of at least 200 armed personnel and armoured personnel carriers.

The protesters criticised the role of the home minister and law enforcers.

Snehardi Chakrabarti Rintu, general secretary of a faction of Samajtantrik Chhatra Front, said, "The home ministry totally failed to ensure people's safety. They are afraid of meeting us face to face. They can not stop agitated youths."

On April 14, some youths sexually assaulted around 20 females on the DU campus for an hour, but the proctor and police on duty nearby allegedly did not respond on time.

Moreover, Bangladesh Chhatra Union activists were beaten up by cops on May 10 when they tried to besiege the Dhaka Metropolitan Police headquarters protesting the

Patriarchal mindset, culture of impunity must go

Discussants tell ActionAid Bangladesh programme about preventing sexual harassment of women

Patriarchal perception of men and women and the culture of impunity which protects perpetrators of sexual harassment must change to prevent the crime against women and make public spaces safer for them, said discussants at a programme yesterday.

"All of us are not alert about sexual harassment and often do not speak up against it, fearing for our own security and honour," said Annisul Huq, newly elected mayor of Dhaka North City Corporation, adding that this attitude needs to change.

ActionAid Bangladesh organised the programme at Chhayanaut Bhaban in the capital's Dhanmondi celebrating the global launch of "International Safe Cities for Women Day 2015". The day was celebrated in 20 coun-

tries to ensure safety for women and raise awareness about the existence of sexual violence against women in urban public spaces.

ActionAid Bangladesh Country Director Farah Kabir said a Department for International Development-funded three-year multi-country project was initiated to address these issues and under which a baseline survey on Safe City for Women was conducted from June to September, 2014.

According to the survey, in which 800 women, 200 men and 200 boys from different income groups took

part from Dhaka, Chittagong, Barisal, Rajshahi, Khulna, Sylhet and Narayanganj, 88 percent of women said they faced sexual harassment from passers-by, male passengers in public transports and customers at shops.

Eighty-one percent of the respondents said they would not approach police for help while 65 percent opined that police would blame women rather than take action against perpetrators.

Annisul was presented a memorandum where amenities and services for women including public toilets, proper lighting of roads and gendersensitive policing were demanded.

Access to midwives can prevent maternal deaths

Midwives are the gatekeepers of maternal and newborn healthcare system, and majority of Bangladesh's maternal deaths could be prevented if pregnant women had access to skilled birth attendants during childbirth, said speakers at a roundtable yesterday.

They said safety of new mothers and their babies largely depends on availability of midwives, as they are the first trained personnel to tend to pregnant women.

The roundtable titled "Midwifery-led Maternal Health" was organised by The Daily Star and United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) at the daily's office in the capital.

"Nearly 58 percent childbirths take place without skilled birth attendant often leading to many preventable complications.

Deploying midwives across the country and ensuring that childbirths take place in healthcare facilities can reduce the risks," said UNFPA's maternal health specialist Dr Shamina Sharmin while presenting the keynote paper.

Citing a UN estimate, she said a majority of Bangladesh's 5,200 annual maternal deaths are caused by these preventable complications.

Zahid Malegue, state minister for health, said the government, realising the importance of midwifery, approved 3,000 posts for midwives across the country.

He further said that over 525 midwives would be graduating from nursing institutions by the end of this year.
