Eviction from DCC footpaths July 1

Small-scale drives at Gulistan, Farmgate on June 1, 12

Two city corporations of Dhaka will conduct small-scale eviction drives on footpaths at Gulistan and Farmgate on June 1 and 12 to reduce traffic congestion and ease movement of pedestrians, Road Transport and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader announced yesterday.

He said they would first hold meetings with those occupying footpaths and then launch citywide eviction drives on July 1.

The decision came at a meeting of Dhaka Transport Coordination Authority (DTCA), chaired by the minister at Nagar Bhaban.

Mayor of Dhaka North City Corporation Annisul Huq told The Daily Star that they would not free the footpaths overnight but rather gradually.

Arrangements will be made to rehabilitate the evicted hawkers, he said.

He said the main goal was to curb traffic congestion.

The mayor also said the corporation would pull down all illegal billboards Speaking on waste management, Annisul

Huq sought a list of empty lands of different departments including railway, Local Government Division, and Roads and Highway Department so that the lands could be used as parks, playgrounds or garbage transfer stations after their reclamation from grabbers.

The minister asked the authorities concerned to provide the lists of the lands to two mayors by the next 15 days.

Narayanganj city Mayor Selina Hayat Ivy and lawmaker Shagufta Yasmin also spoke.

Rizvi, Dudu sent back to jail

Bail, remand prayers rejected

A Dhaka court yesterday rejected remand and bail petitions in seven separate arson cases against BNP leaders Ruhul Kabir Rizvi Ahmed and Shamsuzzaman Dudu and sent them back to jail.

However, the court allowed police to interrogate the BNP leaders at the jail gate within May 31.

Police sought a 60-day remand for Dudu in six cases, and a 27-day remand for Rizvi in three cases.

All the cases were filed this January for damaging, torching vehicles and throwing petrol bombs on buses during the non-stop blockade and hartal enforced by the BNP-led 20-party alliance.

Metropolitan Magistrate M Imdadul Haque passed the order yesterday.

Meanwhile, another Dhaka court adjourned till July 2 the hearing of charge framing against BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir and 45 others in a case filed for torching a bus in front of the Prime Minister's Office on April 29, 2012.

Movement to prevent suicides launched

Muhammad bin Alim, a potential asset and a valuable life to the country and his family, would have turned 15 yesterday had he not ended his life on September 15 last year.

Brighter Tomorrow, a social movement to prevent suicide, was launched on Alim's birthday to save life, the most valuable thing on earth, from untimely and unwanted endings, said Joyoshree Zaman, mother of Alim and Chirasree Zaman, who also committed suicide with her brother.

"I do not want another person to go through the pain I am going through," said Zaman.

"We want to campaign against suicide ety as causes of suicide. and make people aware of the causes and ways to prevent it," she told The Daily Star.

The movement would also provide counselling and support for families which have suffered from suicides.

Jatiya Press Club, psychiatrist Helal Uddin Ahmed said on average 28 people commit suicide every day in Bangladesh.

Based on World Health Organization (WHO) data, the suicide rate in Bangladesh in 7.8 per 100,000 deaths, he said, adding that Guyana has the highest suicide rate in the world.

"The suicide rate among Bangladeshi males is 6.8 and among females is 8.7," he said and mentioned domestic torture and marriage complications as some major reasons of suicide.

The doctor also mentioned hasty urbanisation, loss of moral values and the growing idea of individualistic and self-centric soci-

SC tells Bar Council to hold polls on Aug 13 with updated voter list

The Supreme Court yesterday ordered the Bangladesh Bar Council authorities to hold its election on August 13 after updating the voter list. Attorney General

Mahbubey Alam, who is the ex-officio chairman of the bar council, and its Secretary Altaf Hossain have been asked to publish the list by July 12.

The apex court passed the order after disposing of three appeals filed challenging an High Court order that halted the polls scheduled to be held on May 27.

Following two writ petitions filed by Supreme Court lawyer Eunus Ali Akond, the HC on May 21 stayed the election for three months and also issued two rules questioning the procedures of the election.

Later, the bar council authorities and six lawyers submitted the three appeals before the SC seeking a stay on the HC order.

Yesterday, the SC also asked the HC to dispose of its rules in eight weeks.

SC gives defence, state 4 weeks for statements

Prosecution starts closing arguments at tribunal against Patuakhali's Forkan
