The Arctic Tern

first read about the arctic tern while researching bird migration. It is a special bird because it flies more distance in migration than any other bird. How? In the spring, it breeds in or near the arctic circle, including countries like Greenland and Iceland. As the northern summer wanes, it flies southward all the way to Antarctica, reaching there in October when summer begins in the southern hemisphere. Thus, while the arctic circle suffers through winter, the terns enjoy a warm and bountiful environment in the south. When autumn arrives there in March and April, the terns fly northwards to reach the arctic circle in time for the arrival of summer.

In exchange for its hard work flying over 25000 miles every year the arctic tern enjoys perpetual summer.

When I came to visit Iceland last week, I wanted to see this legendary bird. I drove to Lake Myvatn in northeast Iceland and went bird-watching on a cold and windy morning. I quickly found the tern, elegant in white and grey, a black hood stretching from its beak to its nape, its beak a bright red beak. It was hovering like a helicopter over the lake's water, and when it saw a small fish it dived and caught it with a great deal of acrobatic

grace. After a week here, I have seen hundreds of terns. They are busy constructing nests all over this island, getting ready to breed. The nests are lumps of grass, hay and soil on the ground and they are guarded jealously. The athletic bird is exhilarating to watch but difficult to photograph because of its speed. Its small size (about 8 inches, 100-200 grams) can mislead, but watching its life-force I lose all doubt about its capacity for marathon flying. Arctic terns have been studied

extensively. For example, a bird ringed in Greenland in June was found four months later in October in South Africa. During its long flight, it does not fly in a straight line. Instead, while heading towards Antarctica, it flies southeast into Europe from America and then heads south. It does this in order to follow ocean currents rich in food supply. The bird returns year after year to the same place for breeding. With its aggressive personality it snatches food away from slower birds by buzzing over their head to distract and frighten them.

Arctic terns have a relatively long life span of up to 34 years. In their lifetime they fly a distance longer than

that from the earth to the moon. I saw many birds in Iceland, including ducks, swans, geese, songbirds and seabirds. But none enchanted me as much as the arctic

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One rally but too much suffering

After crippling traffic jams on workdays, the weekend was supposed to bring Dhaka city commuters some respite. But yesterday did not, especially for those travelling to Shahbagh's Shishu Park, Ramna Park, and adjacent areas through Kazi Nazrul Islam Avenue.

Buses, cars, and other vehicles had to remain stuck even up to one hour at Shahbagh, Bangla Motor and Farmgate, thanks to a rally arranged to congratulate Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina at Suhrawardy Udyan in the afternoon, for her government's political and diplomatic successes including India's ratification of the 1974 land boundary agreement.

The reception, by Jatiya Nagorik Committee, started at 3:30pm.

Traffic police sources said the congestion got intensified from noon when people started rushing to the venue. "We had to halt vehicular movement for security concern," said a high official of traffic police.

Heavy showers in the afternoon also contributed to the gridlock, said pedestrians and passengers at Farmgate.

Vehicles were stuck on Kazi Nazrul Islam Avenue and adjacent roads, while crowds of passengers waiting to catch a bus home swelled at Karwan Bazar and Farmgate in the evening.

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Modi's Visit BNP wants PM, chief to discuss

BNP yesterday called upon Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to discuss Bangladesh-India bilateral issues with party chief Khaleda Zia and its experts before Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to Bangladesh.

"Based on the outcomes of the discussion with BNP's chief, the prime minister will tell her Indian counterpart that the demands which she placed are not of the ruling Awami League, but every party of the country endorsed those," BNP spokesperson Asaduzzaman Ripon told a press briefing at the party's Nayapaltan central office in the capital.

Key issues like the land boundary agreement, sharing of the Teesta river waters, and sub-regional connectivity will feature prominently during Modi's two-day visit starting on June 6.

4 more bodies recovered

Four more bodies were recovered yesterday from the river Meghna in Sadar upazila of Narsingdi after a boat capsized during a storm on Thursday,

increasing the death toll to seven. Earlier on Thursday, three bodies were recovered. Of the total seven, five

were members of a family. The deceased were identified as

Sumaiya, 9, and Omainy, 4, his daughters; Farzana Aktar, 8, daughter of Swapan Miah; Falani Begum, 60, wife of Rudro Miah; and Noor Begum, wife of Sahazuddin of Bogargoth village.

The engine-run boat with around 70 passengers was going to Bogargoth in the upazila from Narsingdi's Puranchar area.

The boat was caught in the storm around 3:00pm and sank in the middle of the river in Bogargoth area. Most of the

A team of divers from the Fire Service and Civil Defence in Narsingdi and Dhaka recovered the bodies.

Ruhul Amin Mollah, warehouse inspector of Narsingdi Fire Service, said the rescue operations were hampered due to the tremendous current and waves of the river till 10:00pm on Thursday.

However, the boat could not be recovered yet, he added.
