# Route to lot of hopes

Shipping deal to cut costs, time significantly

Bangladesh and India yesterday signed the coastal shipping agreement which would help reduce the time spent in shipping ping goods, cut costs and lessen the load on busy roads.

The freight charge for carrying one tonne of rice to Bangladesh from India would be between \$30 and \$35, whereas it costs \$90 now, said SK Mahfuz Hamid, managing director of Gulf Orient Seaways, a local shipping company.

Importers have to pay the high charge since the ships reach Bangladesh via Singapore or Colombo as they could not ply directly between the two countries.

Now, importers need to pay \$1,700-\$2,400 as freight charge per container, with 4,000-5,000 tonne capacity, and have to wait 30 to 40 days to get their goods.

Hamid said the importers would need to pay only \$400 for carrying the same amount of goods and they would reach Bangladesh in eight days.

"Definitely, the less freight charge will have a positive impact on the prices of commodities, as Bangladesh mainly imports basic commodities from India," he told The Daily Star over the phone.

Bangladesh imports onion, rice, lentils, cotton, industrial raw materials and machinery from India. Bangladeshi shipping companies would also be benefited as they would SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

#### Hasina, Modi flag off two bus services

As part of establishing a greater connectivity between Bangladesh and India, trans-border bus services on two new routes were inaugurated yesterday.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and her Indian counterpart Narendra Modi, who came to Dhaka yesterday on a two-day visit, flagged off Kolkata-Dhaka-Agartala and Dhaka-Shiliguri-Guwahati bus services.

The two premiers exchanged tickets and symbolically boarded the buses for some time on the premises of the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) in the capital.

They wished the travellers a happy journey before giving the go-ahead to the three buses, with the slogan -- Bharat-Bangladesh Souhardya Jatra [India-Bangladesh Friendship Journey] -- imprinted on their sides, by waving green

The visit of West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee seemed more about showing diplomatic courtesy than real fortitude to foster relations between the two countries through signing the Teesta water-sharing deal.

She came separately, stayed at a separate hotel and skipped many events, clearly indicating that she was not part of the Indian delegation accompanying Prime Minister Narendra Modi on his maiden visit to Bangladesh.

She was also scheduled to leave early, yesterday evening, without even attending the official banquet hosted by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina last night.

However, Mamata had a meeting with Modi yesterday and was present during the signing of the Land Boundary Agreement and the inauguration of Dhaka-Guwahati and Kolkata-Dhaka-Agartala direct bus services.


Mamata arrived in Dhaka on Friday night and went to Radisson hotel where she received a call from Sheikh Hasina, requesting the chief minister to stay in Bangladesh one more day and also to attend the banquet. She did attend the banquet but left for Kolkata on a 9:40pm flight.

At her hotel, Mamata passed time with the members of her entourage, gossiping at the lobby. She was at the hotel when Modi was visiting the National Memorial in Savar and Bangabandhu Memorial Museum in Dhanmondi upon his arrival in the morning, according to journalists based in Kolkata.

She had her first meeting with Modi at Hotel Sonargaon at 3:15pm. From there, the two went to the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) where 22 deals and MoUs were signed or renewed and the bus services inaugurated.

As they walked out of the hotel to leave for the PMO, Modi asked Mamata to travel with him in his car, which she did.



# Regional links to open new doors for economy

Allowing transit through each other's territories, Bangladesh and India yesterday renewed the bilateral trade agreement which is believed to usher in a new era of regional trade.

Under the deal, Bangladeshi vehicles will carry goods to Bhutan and Nepal

through Indian territories. And India will transport cargo through Bangladesh, particularly from the mainland to its northeastern states.

The tenure of the agreement has been extended from three years to five years, having the option of auto renewal. The first India-Bangladesh trade deal was signed in 1972.

"Today, we have unveiled some of the pathways to this future," Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi said after the deal renewal in Dhaka.

"Connectivity is the catalyst for deeper engagement. Bangladesh's decision to allow transit of power equipment and food grains to the SEE PAGE 10 COL 4

### 26 held with 15 arms

Arrestees are followers of Nizam Hazari

Rab seized 15 firearms from vehicles of a motorcade at Lalpur area of Feni yesterday evening and arrested 26 people, apparent followers of Awami League lawmaker Nizam Uddin Hazari of Feni-2, in this connection.

Following a tip-off, a Rab team intercepted a convoy of three microbuses at Lalpur around 7:30pm and found five foreign-made shotguns, a gun, five pistols, four locallymade light guns, 133 bullets, six machetes

and two Chinese axes inside the vehicles.

Major Mozammel Hossain, in-charge of Rapid Action Battalion-7 Feni camp, said leaders and activists "of a political party" were returning from Sonagazi upazila in convoy after attending a rally there, reports UNB.

Our Feni correspondent reports: Ruling party activists blocked the Dhaka-Chittagong highway, Feni-Noakhali highway at Dagonbhuiyan, and Feni-Sonagazi road at different spots protesting the arrest of their party men.

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
