River connectivity by this year

Dhaka, Delhi yet to fix fees and charges

Bangladesh may provide river transit to India on a limited scale this year after the two sides fix transit fees and charges.

A joint committee comprising officials of both countries would be formed soon to make recommendations for the fees and charges within two months, said shipping ministry officials.

Once those are settled, the facility might be given to India on a limited scale, they

"It will require large-scale dredging of river routes if India is to be provided with full-fledged river transit facility," said one of the officials on condition of anonym-

At a meeting in New Delhi in April, shipping ministry officials of the two countries agreed to make mutually beneficial arrangements for the use of waterways, roads and railways for bilateral trade and passage of goods between two places in one country through the territory of the other.

India would pay Bangladesh transit fees, while Nepal and Bhutan would pay fees to both Bangladesh and India, said the officials of Bangladesh shipping ministry.

At present, India pays Bangladesh Tk 10 crore annually for using the latter's water-

Under the new arrangement, fees and charges would be set in accordance with the policy of the World Trade Organisation.

A Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) has been drafted under the Extension of Protocol on Inland Water Transit and Trade (PIWTT) signed during the recent Dhaka visit of Indian Prime Minister Narendra

The SOP contains details of the transit routes, ports of call and other related

Dhaka, however, will have to sign a separate deal with Delhi for using India's river routes to move goods to Nepal and Bhutan. Twelve ports, six each in Bangladesh and

India, have been proposed as ports of call where ships would load or unload cargos and undergo repairs.

Those are Mongla, Khulna, Sirajganj, Narayanganj, Pangaon and Ashuganj in Bangladesh, and Kolkata, Haldia, Karimganj, Pandu, Silghat and Farakka or Bandle in India.

No condition for \$2b new Indian credit

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday told parliament that there were no terms and conditions in spending \$2 billion Indian credit and the government would use the amount

independently. "Bangladesh is an independent country. We do not take any assistance from any country with conditions. There is no condition in accepting the credit from India," she said in reply to lawmakers' queries.

"We will be able to spend the money on our own, considering our own necessity," she added.

Hasina also informed the House that her government would identify the sectors and projects, which will be implemented with the Indian credit.

"Earlier we got \$1 billion from India which was spent in developing infrastructure and other development projects," she said.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING BY SEA

Women are sexually abused all the way

Afia (not her real name) was not accompanied by any of her family members, but she showed no signs of jitters. While many in the vessel turned pale in panic due to want of food and water in the perilous sea, the beautiful young girl held her nerves.

Everything had apparently been neatly arranged, the 18-year-old thought. Her would-be-groom had already paid the brokers a hefty sum

of money and was waiting near the Thai-Malaysia borders to greet her.

Turning her head as if to get a glimpse of the Myanmar coastline she left behind 10 days ago, Afia heaved a sigh of relief: the miseries back home wouldn't touch her anymore. Just a few days and she would get married in Malaysia!

But the situation on the other side -- at a jungle camp in Sadao district of bordering Thai province of Songkhla where her fiancé went to receive her --

was beyond her imagination. As soon as he reached there from Malaysia, guards of the camp confined him to a cage at gunpoint.

Without allowing Afia, who landed nearby two days later, to see her would-be-groom, the traffickers herded her along with a few hundred others towards a large cage made of wood and barbed-wire and covered with thin plastic sheet.

A few days later, one of the guards

Repatriated migrants sent home

Two Rohingyas identified, arrested

As many as 144 human trafficking victims headed for home yesterday, two days after they were repatriated from Myanmar.

The Cox's Bazar district administration finished the process of sending the victims home after completing legal formalities. By 6:30pm, all the 144 left the temporary camp at Cox's Bazar Cultural Centre. The Myanmar Border Guard Police on

Monday handed over 150 trafficking victims, preliminarily identified as Bangladeshis, to Border Guard Bangladesh. Of them, 55 are from Narsingdi. They were rescued by Myanmar navy on May 21 while being trafficked to Malaysia on a boat.

However, detectives identified two of the 150 victims as Rohingyas from Myanmar. They are Hamid Hossain, 26, and Md Idris, 19.

Hamid is a refugee registered at Kutupalang Rohingya refugee camp in Ukhia upazila of Cox's Bazar. Hailing from Maungdaw of Myanmar, Idris had entered Bangladesh illegally several years ago and had been staying here ever since, said police. Law enforces detained 25-year-old Saker

Ullah, suspecting him to be a Rohingya. "We will interrogate him further," said Tofail Ahmed, additional superintendent of police in Cox's Bazar. The Detective Branch of police also

arrested three others from the 150. One of

them is suspected trafficker Uzzal Hossain.

The two others are Shafiul Islam of Kutubdia in Cox's Bazar and Saddam Hossain of Jessore. They are fugitive convicts in separate cases.

Entrepreneurs belonging to third gender, who are often looked down upon, will get bank loans from now on under the central bank's financial inclusion drive. Bangladesh Bank has directed all banks

to extend credit facility to entrepreneurs who are classed as hijras or hermaphrodites under the small and medium enterprise category of customers.

The central bank issued a circular in this regard on Tuesday.

Politics changes for ruling AL

Friendly opposition in JS, none on streets

The ruling Awami League seems to have become dependent on the strategy of its main opponent, the BNP, to carry out its own political activities.

When the BNP had been enforcing a blockade and frequent hartals from January to March to cripple the Shiekh Hasina-led government, the AL was active and carried out programmes to counter the rival's street agitation.


But the AL found its programmes redundant as soon as the rival BNP postponed its agitation at the end of March and stepped into the battle of ballots in the mayoral polls.

The change in BNP's strategy also changed the AL's course of actions. The ruling party then focused on the April 29 city polls to ensure victory for its

mayoral candidates. After the city polls, the BNP, which has become almost dysfunctional due

to its organisational weakness, could not come up with any fresh agitation programme.
