





Shastri to be most paid coach?

Current India team director Ravi Shastri is to be named the next coach of the Indian cricket team.

According to reports, Shastri could also become the highest paid cricket coach in the world with a deal estimated to be worth Rs 7 crore-a-year.

The 53-year-old was paid Rs 4 crore-a-year by the BCCI for his role as a TV commentator and had a Rs 6 crore-a-year contract as team director.

Duncan Fletcher, in comparison, was being paid Rs 4.5 crore by the BCCI.

The BCCI is likely to announce the name of the new coach at the end of the Bangladesh tour. In case Shastri becomes the new coach, he would first become the first Indian to hold the job after 2000.


Put in to bat on a pitch

The second day of the one-off Test between Bangladesh and India might have been officially called off right before tea at 1:45 pm

The way the rains pounded in against the covers laid down on the ground, the decision, despite a good drainage system at the venue, was inevitable. At around half past ten yesterday morning, a dark cloud cover had

Bangladesh's team management hoped to resolve the issue ahead of the India Test. And that was the reason why a special emphasis was placed on the likes of Shafiul Islam and Rubel who had to follow their respective rehab schedules during the short break after the Pakistan series.

While Shafiul was deemed to have recovered from a hand injury, his personal decision

not to take part in the Bangladesh Cricket League's final round might have stalled his progress into the Test squad. Rubel, on the other hand, as per coach

Chandika Hathurusingha's words, was rested in a bid to keep him fresh for the ODIs. They also didn't want to take the risk of playing the pacer, who has just recovered from a side strain, on a flat Fatullah track.

"I am good at the moment. I have recovered. There's nothing to worry," Rubel told The Daily Star yesterday over phone from team hotel when questioned about the state of his fitness levels. "I won't say that I am

not fully fit, but for a Test match one needs to have an extra amount of preparation," he further explained.

The pacer, who has been punching in extra hours in the gym lately, hopes to turn his fortunes in the coming weeks.

"Bangladesh does not get to play too many Tests, so there's no doubt that I am not disappointed to miss out. But there's

If the Tigers manage to win at least one match in that series, they will overtake the West Indies, who are currently ranked seventh in the ICC rankings.


