FROM PAGE 16 36 proposals that included relocating the hill-dwellers vulnerable to landslides, constructing retaining walls, taking up afforestation programmes and erecting barbed-wire fences around the hills.

Though no latest figure on the number of people at risk of mudslides was available, the district administration office last year identified a total of 30 hills in the port city as vulnerable to landslides with around 666 families residing on the slopes of 11 of them. As for the rest of the hills, the number of people living on the slopes and foot of the hills remained unaccounted for.

"The actual number of the families living on the hill slopes now is at least three times higher than the year old list mentions," claimed Delwar Mojumder, former president of the Chittagong chapter of the Institute of

Engineers, Bangladesh. "They [the administration] have made a list of poor families living in the danger zones but they are not doing the same for those who are illegally renting out the hilly lands to the poor. The middle men, who under the aegis of politicians are occupying and renting out the land

Additional Deputy Commissioner (Revenue) Mohammad Ellius Hossain of Chittagong, also member secretary of the HMC, said they would start an eviction drive from next week. He hoped to have the lists of the families living on the hills in the meantime.

The camp at Onzia, interestingly, did not figure in a 2013 list of major insurgent camps in Myanmar prepared for the Ministry of Home Affairs. An Army spokesperson said that the Army was aware the camp did not house NSCN-K personnel but added that the target was an umbrella of organisations rather than a specific group.

The second Army attack targeted two adjacent NSCN-K facilities at Ponyo, near the Myanmar town of Lahe, just across the border from the Mon district in Nagaland. around Taga, a senior military source said, appeared to be largely normal, with no signs that groups had begun to disperse in anticipation of further attacks.

Sources said that Khaplang is said to have approached the Myanmarese authorities for "protection of his cadres" as they were residents of the country.

A high-level meeting, led by Home Minister Rajnath Singh was held at North Block to discuss the aftermath of the strike. It was attended by NSA Ajit Doval, Defence minister Manohar Parrikar, Vice Army Chief Lt Gen Philip Campos. At the meeting, it was decided to be prepared for a retaliatory attack by the insurgent groups.

"A two-pronged strategy will be note strikes and the other is being defensive, as we expect retaliation," said a senior government official. A high security alert has also been sounded across northeast after reports that NSCN-K militants have entered India for revenge attacks.
